Pastor's Note

"THE DAY OF ASHES"

In the Roman Martyrology, which lists the holy days of the year as well as the heavenly birthdays of the Church's official saints, the entry for Ash Wednesday reads as follows:

The Day of Ashes, and the beginning of the most holy fast of Lent...

This Wednesday we begin our Lenten fast in preparation for Easter 2012. Once again we will receive the blessed ashes on our foreheads as a reminder of our mortality and a sign of penance for our sins.

Lent is a time of spiritual retreat for the whole Church. Certain practices of abstinence, penance and fast are set out for us by Church law. The current disciplines are as follows:

Abstinence (from flesh meat): On Ash Wednesday and on all the Fridays of Lent through Good Friday. This abstinence becomes

obligatory for Catholics on their 14th birthday.

Penance: Some act of penance is required during the weekdays of Lent and all Fridays outside of Lent. This applies in general to all the faithful. For example, our freely-chosen, personal Lenten sacrifices fulfill this duty of penance on the weekdays of Lent. (On Fridays throughout the year, abstinence from meat fulfills the duty of Friday penance: if one chooses to eat meat, however, then some other act of penance must be done in its place.)

Fast: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are now the only two obligatory Catholic fast days of the year. On these days only one full meal is permitted. Two other smaller meals (more like snacks) may be taken in order to maintain strength which, when combined, are less than a full meal. The law of fast obliges Catholics between the ages of 18-59.

On a side note, the obligation to do penance is lifted, even on a Friday, for a First Class Feast or Solemnity. Three of these days regularly fall during the Lenten Season: March 17th, St. Patrick (Principal Patron of the Archdiocese of Boston), March 19th, St. Joseph, Spouse of Mary and Patron of the Universal Church, and March 25th, the Feast of the Annunciation.

It is sometimes said, rather flippantly, that we should not have to do penance because Life has suffering enough. The point of making sacrifices of lawful pleasures is not to add more suffering to our lives, but is rather three-fold: 1) to show some humility before God and acknowledge the spirit of human rebelliousness underlying sin...our sin, 2) to acknowledge God's divine sovereignty over every created good, and 3) to better train our wills for choosing the good and resisting temptations to sin. The forty days of Lent are a time for "good will training".

EPISTLE: I Corinthians 13. 1-13 Brethren: If I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And if I should have prophecy, and should know all mysteries, and all knowledge; and I should have all faith so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity, I am nothing. And if I should distribute all my goods to feed the poor, and if I should deliver my body to be burned and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing. Charity is patient, is kind; Charity envieth not, dealeth not perversely, is not puffed up, is not ambitious, seeketh not her own, is not provoked to anger, thinketh no evil, rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth with the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never falleth away; whether prophecies shall be made void, or tongues shall cease, or knowledge shall be destroyed. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child. But when I became a man, I put away the things of a child. We see now through a glass in a dark manner; but then face to face. Now I know in part; but then I shall know even as I am known. And now there remain faith, hope and charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.

GRADUAL: Ps. 76. 15-16 Thou art the God that alone dost wonders: Thou hast made Thy power known among the nations. *V*. With Thy arm Thou hast delivered Thy people, the children of Israel and of Joseph.

And they understood none of these things, and this word was hid from them, and they understood not the things that were said. Now it came to pass, when He drew nigh to Jericho, that a certain blind man sat by the wayside, begging. And when he heard the multitude passing by, he asked what this meant. And they told him that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. And he cried out, saving: Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me. And Jesus standing, commanded him to be brought unto Him. And when he was come near, He asked him, saying: What wilt thou that I do to thee? But he said: Lord, that I may see. And Jesus said unto him: Receive thy sight, thy faith hath made thee whole. And immediately he saw and followed Him, glorifying God. And all the people, when they saw it, gave praise to God.


On January 20th, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) reaffirmed a rule that virtually all private health care plans must cover sterilization, abortifacients, and contraception. The exemption provided for "religious employers" is so narrow that it fails to cover the vast majority of faith-based organizations, including Catholic hospitals, universities, and service organizations that help millions every year.

President Obama's February 10th offer of a limited and unclear compromise does not change the urgent need for legislation to correct such threats to religious liberty and conscience rights. The Respect for Rights of Conscience Act has been introduced in Congress (H.R. 1179, S. 1467) to ensure that those who participate in the health care system "retain the right to provide, purchase, or enroll in health coverage that is consistent with their religious beliefs and moral convictions." It is more important than ever that Members of Congress be urged to co-sponsor this measure—or thanked if they are already co-sponsoring the bill. 
