OCTOBER IS THE MONTH OF THE HOLY ROSARY

THE YEAR OF FAITH 2012-2013

Thursday of this coming week, October 11th, 2012, marks the beginning of Pope Benedict's "Year of Faith" for the whole Catholic Church. The date October 11th is the 50th anniversary of the opening of the ecumenical council of the Church known as "Vatican II", held in Rome from 1962-1965. (The First Vatican Council, also held in Rome, from 1870-1871, defined the dogma of Papal Infallibility.) The Year of Faith then is something of a retrospective on an historical event which, at the time, seemed to be inaugurating a new era of growth and fervor for the Catholic Church. Ten years from the opening of the Council, however, in 1972, with the entire Church convulsed in upheaval, Pope Paul VI said publicly: "The smoke of Satan has entered into the Church."

The commemoration of a joyful event then—the opening of the Second Vatican Council—cannot

be separated from the "auto-destruction" (as some have called it) of the Catholic Church in the years that immediately followed. French Dominican Yves Congar, one of the theological advisers at the Council, likened the Second Vatican Council to the Church's "October Revolution". This is not a comforting analogy. The "October Revolution" was Lenin's Bolshevik Party takeover of Russia in the autumn of 1917 and the establishment of the new revolutionary order of Communism. The Russian "October Revolution" meant a complete (and violent) break with the past.

In his book *A Crisis of Saints* Fr. George Rutler (who will be speaking here at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes on Wednesday, October 17th, at 6 p.m.) comments on the inappropriateness of self -congratulation over the fruits of the Council given the actual state of the Church half-acentury later:

Ours was to have been a time of renewal in the Church, but sometimes it seems to have been a baptism of tentative virtue and a confirmation of the fatuities of the Aquarian Age. Clerics of the 1960s who had not seen real flames talked of a New Pentecost which has not come. Some in their graying years keep scanning some horizon beyond the horizon and persist in speaking of the Second Vatican Council as The *Council.* As they age, they ache when they are called naïve. But naïve they have been. It was perhaps in view of this that the late Cardinal Siri of Genoa said that it would take centuries to undo the damage after Vatican II. He paid a price for saying that, exacted by banal optimists who would have confused the Holy Spirit with UNICEF or Eleanor Roosevelt. Siri did not challenge the authenticity of the Council, but he rejected a conciliar triumphalism which in its romance saw nothing blasphemous in treating Vatican II as if it were Pentecost II.

Father Rutler served as an Episcopalian priest for nine years before he was received into the

Catholic Church in 1979. He has authored 15 books on theology, history, cultural issues and lives of the saints, including The Curé of Ars Today,

Coincidentally, and A Crisis of Saints. He is the host of the EWTN program "Christ in the City" where he discusses the possibilities of encountering Christ in fast-paced city life. Fr. Rutler holds degrees from several colleges including Oxford University and the Gregorian and Angelicum Universities in Rome. He was honored by the New York Council for his assistance to the dying at the World Trade Center on September 11th, 2001. Fr. Rutler has been pastor of the Church of Our Savior parish in New York City since 2001.

"If 'Roman Catholic' was used in a diminishing way by anti-Catholics in times past, it has become a declaration of Catholics who want to be Catholics. Cardinal Vaughan said that Roman Catholic is a right term when it 'insists that the central point of Catholicity is Roman, the Roman See of St. Peter.' The Roman Catholic Church is not Catholic because of Rome; it is Catholic because of Peter, who shed his blood in Rome. Where Peter is, there is the Church. 'Ubi Petrus, ibi ecclesia.' A council, for instance, does not have to be in Rome to be ecumenical; it does need the approbation of Peter." -Fr. Rutler "A Crisis of Saints"

Committee Against Physician Assisted Suicide

"Disabled and Dignified: Dr. Marcia Angell wishes her dying father had a more peaceful death ("Deserving of Dignity," September 23rd). My father also committed suicide at age 92 by tossing himself out the window. He was deeply depressed and didn't want to bother his only living relative, his disabled daughter, born with spina bifida and a wheelchair user. I am the daughter. As Dr. Angell said, a lot of disabled people have to do without or give up autonomy when it comes to their physical care. Does that make us any less valuable as people?

I have chosen to stay alive despite lapses in my 'dignity'—a word I find appalling in the context of determining the manner of how one actually dies. I plan to live in spite of society and if the time comes when I am near death, I hope palliative care will be around to assist me, rather than a doctor with a pill. -Karen Schneiderman, Jamaica Plain"

Better ways to care for the dying

Surely I shall never forget my first encounter with Mother Teresa of Calcutta. It was in November of 1970 and I was teaching at Catholic University. We had received notice that the uni-



versity was awarding an honorary doctorate to a missionary nun in the Caldwell Auditorium. Realizing that few people would bother to attend, I decided "to make the sacrifice" in solidarity with a fellow religious. showed up. Cardinal

Only a handful of people Patrick O'Boyle pre-

sided and Eileen Egan, an early follower of Dorothy Day who was at Catholic Relief Services (CRS) was charged with introducing the nun to the assembly. None of us had ever heard of Mother Teresa of Calcutta.

Eileen Egan described her first meeting with Mother Teresa in the streets of the slums of Calcutta. She described seeing a wheelbarrow containing the filthy body of a dying man covered with open sores filled with maggots. She said that it seemed that the wheelbarrow moved on its own. Then she spied the diminutive nun pushing it. She learned that Mother and her sisters, for twenty years had been gathering the dying people abandoned in the streets, carrying them to an old former Hindu temple and taking care of them so that they could die surrounded by love.

I remember looking around the auditorium and seeing many people crying as Eileen Egan described Mother Teresa's ministry to the dying. Soon the world was to learn about this amazing religious

woman thanks to English journalist Malcolm Muggeridge's film and book, both called "Something Beautiful for God."

Mother Teresa is part of a long tradition of caring for the dying in our Church. In our own country we have the moving testimony of Rose Hawthorne, the daughter of Nathaniel Hawthorne from Massachusetts. Rose founded a religious order in the early 1900s to care for people dying of cancer. Here in the archdiocese, the Little Sisters of the Poor and the Carmelites Sisters for the Aged and Infirm are excellent current examples of the Church's tradition of loving care for the dying.

In our community the hospice movement is an extraordinary service to those at the end stages of life and their families. Hospice was founded by a nurse in England, Cicely Saunders. She had worked as a volunteer at St. Luke's Home for the Dying Poor. She founded hospice to deal with the "total pain" of those who are dying. This includes not just physical suffering but the psychological and spiritual suffering people experience at the end of life. In 1971, Florence Wald left her position as dean of the Yale School of Nursing, to bring hospice to the United States.

Hospice was one of the first programs to use modern pain management techniques to care compassionately for the dying. Today there are almost 5,000 hospice programs in the United States with an organized team approach to professional care giving and 1.4 million people are enrolled in hospice care each year.

Hospice is not a place, but a concept of care. Eighty percent of hospice care is provided in the patient's home, a family

member's home or a nursing home. Hospice cared for my Dad when he was dying. In my family, we are all grateful for the excellent care that hospice provided. The nurses and hospice workers truly ministered to the whole family.

Taking care of people at the end of their lives, giving palliative care to address the physical pain and bringing reassurance to people dealing with fear and frustration is truly doing something beautiful for God. How many times do we pray to our Blessed Mother, "Pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death." At the hour of our death, we need prayers and support. In popular devotion, Saint Joseph is called the patron of a happy death because by tradition it is said that he died surrounded by the loving embrace of Jesus and Marv.

We all want what is best for our loved ones, especially at the end of life's journey. It is my hope that this series of reflections, to be posted on my blog and published in The Pilot, will demonstrate that physician assisted suicide is an assault on human dignity. It must never be seen as a viable alternative to hospice and palliative care that address not only people's pain but also their fears and frustration.
