THE SERVANT-KING

A swe follow the liturgy of Advent we notice how the announcement of the Great King's arrival moves along an unexpected

path. In the days before His royal entrance into the world He humbles Himself and takes the form of a slave by taking on our human nature. When at last we see Him come into the world it is as a poor Babe in Bethlehem. No glory. No outward sign of His divine power.

How different it might have been. We would have expected, from the prophecies, that the Great Messiah would come in an overpowering way, righting all the injustices of the world, slaughtering enemies, demanding submission. In the event, however, it was the very opposite. In a recent book entitled <u>Stranger to History: A</u> <u>Son's Journey Through Islamic Lands</u> by Aatish Tasheer, the author—whose mother was an Indian Sikh and father a Pakistani Muslim treats the contemporary issues of resurgent Islam clashing with secular modernity through the prism of his own travel-experience in Islamic lands. The root problem, he concludes, is the efforts at *"the violent imposition of religious perfection on the modern world*, *driven to illogic."*

Historically we can find parallels in Christianity to this practice-the attempt to impose by violence religious perfection on a larger society which doesn't want it-very close to home: the New England colonies of Puritans first at Plymouth and then at Masschusetts Bay in Boston. At Plymouth, without the guiding hand of their original minister John Robinson who had died in Holland before he could come to them in the New World, "the passion and fervor that had enabled [the Pilgrims] to survive those first grim years threatened to darken into a mean-spirited fanaticism." (Nathaniel Philbrick: Mayflower: A Story of Courage, Community and War, A.D. 2006.) Their fellow settlers in the colony who were not Puritans complained against them for being, "contentious, cruel and hard hearted, among your neighbors, and towards such as in all points both civil and religious, jump not with you." Zeal had become zealotry.

Christ came as our Savior without wielding any sword, in utter meekness. In so many ways His Messiahship was a discontinuity with the national-religious heroes of Israel's past, which is why so many Jews of His own generation could not accept Him. He does not impose Himself on us against our will. The gentle rule of His Social Kingship is not to be confused with the clumsy attempts of moral-order police states to correct the ills of their societies by main force. We must think deeply on the Mystery of the Servant-King and what its implications are. *(Fr. Higgins)*






CHRISTMAS FLOWER DONATIONS

for by various families of the city and later became a thirdorder Dominican. In 1558, 238 years after her death, it was discovered that her body was miraculously incorrupt. We welcome this new group to our parish, working in collaboration with our Lay Dominicans. The December monthly meeting coincides with the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, December 12th.

LATIN MASS TEXTS Traditional Propers Second Sunday of Advent

Vestments: Violet

INTROIT: Psalm 30: 30 People of Sion, behold the Lord shall come to save the nations: and the Lord shall make the glory of His voice to be heard, in the joy of your heart. *Psalm 79: 2* Give ear, O Thou that rulest Israel: Thou that leadest Joseph like a sheep. Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Stir up our hearts, O Lord, to prepare the ways of Thine only-begotten Son; that through His coming we may attain to serve Thee with purified minds. Who with Thee liveth and reigneth.

EPISTLE: Romans 15: 4-13 Brethren, What things soever were written, were written for our learning: that, through patience and the comfort of the Scriptures, we might have hope. Now the God of patience and of comfort grant you to be of one mind one towards another, according to Jesus Christ; that with one mind and with one mouth you may glorify God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. Wherefore receive one another, as Christ also hath received you unto the honour of God. For I say that Christ Jesus was minister of the circumcision for the truth of God, to confirm the promises made unto the fathers but that the Gentiles are to glorify God for His mercy, as it is written: Therefore will I confess to Thee, O Lord, among the Gentiles and will sing to Thy name. And again He saith: Rejoice, ye Gentiles, with His people. And again: Praise the Lord, all ye Gentiles; and magnify Him, all ye people. And again, Isaias saith: There shall be a root of Jesse; and He that shall rise up to rule the Gentiles, in Him the Gentiles shall hope. Now the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing: that you may abound in hope, and in the power of the Holy Ghost.

GRADUAL: Psalm 49: 2-3, 5 Out of Sion the loveliness of His beauty: God shall come Manifestly. *V*. Gather ye together His saints to Him, who have set His covenant before sacrifices.
