Pastor's Note


SAINT JOSEPH AND THE MASS

A little known fact is that the first liturgical change to come out of the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965) was the insertion of the name of St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, into the Canon of the Mass. This was a personal intervention of Pope John XXIII, an expression of his own great devotion to St. Joseph. Recently, Pope Francis approved the insertion of St. Joseph's name into the new Eucharistic Prayers II, III & IV in a decree *Paternas Vices*. Here is the text of that decree.

Exercising his paternal care over Jesus, Saint Joseph of Nazareth, set over the Lord's family, marvelously fulfilled the office he received by grace. Adhering firmly to the mystery of God's design of salvation in its very beginnings, he stands as an exemplary model of the kindness and humility that the Christian faith raises to a great destiny, and demonstrates the ordinary and simple virtues necessary for men to be good and genuine followers of Christ. Through these virtues, the Just man, caring most lovingly for the Mother of God and happily dedicating himself to the upbringing of Jesus Christ, was placed as guardian over God the Father's most precious treasure.

Therefore he has been the subject of assiduous devotion on the part of the People of God throughout the centuries, as the support of that mystical body, which is the Church. The faithful in the Catholic Church have shown continuous devotion to Saint Joseph and have solemnly and constantly honored his memory as the most chaste spouse of the Mother of God as the heavenly Patron of the universal Church. For this reason Blessed Pope John XXIII, in the days of the Most Holy Second Ecumenical Council of the Vatican, decreed that Saint Joseph's name be added to the ancient Roman Canon. In response to petitions received from places throughout the world, the Supreme Pontiff Benedict XVI deemed them worthy of implementation and graciously approved them. The Supreme Pontiff FRANCIS likewise has recently confirmed them. In this the Pontiffs had before their eyes the full Communion of the Saints who, once pilgrims in this world, now lead us to Christ and unite us with Him....the name of Saint Joseph is henceforth to be added to Eucharistic Prayers II, III, and IV, as they appear in the third typical edition of the Roman Missal, after the name of the (Fr. Higgins) Blessed Virgin Mary.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 2:21

♣t. Luke's account of Jesus' circumcision is a mere verse, but it merits volumes of reflection. To my knowledge, it is also the shortest Gospel passage of the liturgical year, read annually at the Latin Mass on the feast of

the Circumcision, and the following day, the feast of the Holy Name. In the Novus Ordo, this one verse is included in the longer Gospel reading for the feast of Mary, Mother of God.

For faithful Jews, circumcision is the definitive entrance into the Abrahamic covenant, and thus, into a distinct and privileged relationship with the One God and his chosen people. God gave the covenant of circumcision to Abraham in Genesis 17 as a sign of His three-fold promise to him: (1) to make him "the father of a host of nations", (2) "to be [His] God and the God of [His] descendants" forever, and (3) to give his descendants the land of Israel as their inheritance (cf. 17:4-8). God then proceeded to explain that "every male" Jew (and even Abraham's non-Jewish male slaves) had to be circumcised, because it was "the mark of the covenant" (cf. 17:11-13).

Perhaps someone might wonder why God chose to seal His covenant with Abraham in *this*

manner, of all the other ways He might have. done so. As my liturgy professor at St. John's, Fr. McManus explained, God was demonstrating to Abraham that even in the most intimate and natural processes of his life (conjugal relations and the transmission of life), he needed God's grace and blessing. After all, God had promised Abraham a son in his old age (cf. Gen. 15:1-6). Indeed, it was (and remains) a profound symbol of God's loving concern for and faithfulness to Abraham and his descendants. It likewise serves as a reminder that God is the author of life.

All of this constitutes the rich and ancient religious background into which Jesus was born. Presumably, He may have been circumcised in Bethlehem, since the ceremony was (and still is) performed eight days after birth (Mary and Joseph likely did not travel far, if at all). It was on this occasion that Jesus received His Name. This fulfills the instruction that the angel Gabriel had given to Mary at the Annunciation (cf. Luke 1:31). Here again, as in many places, the Lucan theme of promise and fulfillment resurfaces. We learn from St. Matthew's Gospel that the Name of Jesus means "God saves" (cf. Mt. 1:21). In Jewish culture, one's name encapsulates one's "identity" and "mission" (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 430, 432). Thus, Jesus' mission and identity are salvation.

It is extremely important that Jesus received His Name at his circumcision, for the following reason. As God progressively revealed Himself to the nation of Israel, the observance of the entire Mosaic law became inseparably bound to the religious and cultural identity that was bestowed in the covenant of circumcision. However, the people of Israel repeatedly failed to keep the law (this should remind us of ourselves). Therefore, by entering into the Jewish covenant whereby he was bound to keep the entire law, Jesus began the process of redeeming all mankind (cf. Catechism nos. 517, 527, 592). Only Jesus could keep the whole law, which is precisely what he claimed to do (cf. Mt. 5:17 -18; Catechism nos. 577, 578). As the Catechism explains, "The perfect fulfillment of the Law could be the work of none but the divine legislator, born subject to the Law in the person of the Son" (cf. Catechism no. 580).


We are very grateful for a large donation received from one of our parish families this summer for the support of our parish. These "angel donors" wish to remain anonymous.




