

# **Pastor's Note**

## PRAYER AGAINST HELL

**L**ast Sunday, September 1st, our Holy Father Pope Francis, spoke with anguished emotion over the way in which the sins of wrath and revenge-seeking are bringing the world down into war and more war. World events may have worsened by the time you are reading this note.

In our prayer support for those who are working for peaceful and just resolutions of conflict we need to be mindful that the demonic influences are very much at work, seeking to incite men to kill each other through warfare. Recently the newspapers reported the obituary of a Polish Communist diplomat Janusz Lewandowski who had been instrumental in bringing North Vietnam and the US into a preliminary peace agreement in 1966. Things were falling into place for a meeting in Warsaw when the US launched a massive bombing raid near Hanoi. It is still a matter of debate why this bombing raid happened when the US government had indicated its agreement to the talks. Who didn't give the right orders and why? Can we not suspect the unseen hand of the real enemy, the devil, at work? Nothing ever came of that 1966 peace plan. At that time 6,250 Americans had died in the Vietnam conflict. 52,000 more were to die before it was all over, along with tens of thousands of Vietnamese, civilians and combatants.

It is important then to pray "against Hell" in our prayers for peace and reconciliation. The Mass is, of course, the perfect and most powerful prayer against Hell. The Holy Rosary is also very effective.

The Saint Michael prayer of Pope Leo XIII speaks directly to the danger of satanic attacks. Here is another "Prayer to Defeat Satan" which has the Imprimatur from Bishop Ackerman of Covington, Kentucky, 1973:

O Divine Eternal Father, in union with Thy Divine Son and the Holy Spirit and through the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I beseech Thee to destroy the power of Thy greatest enemy, the evil spirits. Cast them into the deepest recesses of Hell and chain them there forever! Take possession of Thy kingdom which Thou hast created and which is rightfully Thine. O Heavenly Father, grant us the reign of the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I repeat this prayer out of pure love for Thee, with every beat of my heart, and with every breath I take. Amen.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 2:22-38 Part 1

The Presentation of the Child Jesus in the Jerusalem Temple (or the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary, as it is alternately called) is another episode in St. Luke's Gospel that has depths of meaning. As we meditate on this

passage, let us pray as we do with the other Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary (all of which come to us from St. Luke), that "we may imitate what they contain, and obtain what they promise."

According to the Mosaic law, first-born sons had to be consecrated to the Lord, as the Navarre Study Bible notes (cf. Ex. 13). By presenting first born sons to the Lord, parents were given the opportunity to acknowledge God's ultimate lordship over their lives, and to render thanks for the birth of the child.

One of the first things that may strike us as odd when reading this passage is that Mary had to offer sacrifice for her purification, according to the law of Moses. What does this mean? According to Leviticus 12, all mothers who had given birth were ritually unclean. As one of my professors explained in class, we must be careful to note that this is about *ritual* impurity, not moral impurity. Jews considered life blood to be so sacred, that even when it was spilled in natural processes of life, (like child birth), it made one unfit for worship. Mary's purification was part of the normal process of her reintegration into the community's life of worship, and in no way does it undermine her Immaculate Conception. The turtle doves that she and Joseph offered indicate their poverty, since they were unable to afford a lamb. This, of course, underscores St. Luke's recurring theme of God's concern for the poor and the lowly. It likewise reinforces Jesus' solidarity with the poorest of the poor.

While the Holy Family was worshipping in the Temple, St. Luke tells us that a holy man named Simeon approached them, and prophesied about the Christ child. Receiving Jesus into his arms, he declared that he was ready to die, "according to [God's] word," because he had seen the Messiah. According to v. 26, the Holy Spirit promised him that he would "not see death before he had seen the Messiah of the Lord." Thus, we see three Lucan themes interwoven in the very first verse of Simeon's canticle: the importance of prayer, the role of the Holy Spirit, and the frequent motif of promise and fulfillment. Simeon's prayer is called the Nunc Dimittis, and like the Magnificat and the Benedictus, it explains who Jesus is, and the nature of His mission. It is prayed in the Church's Liturgy of the Hours every day in the office of Compline (Night Prayer).

In his canticle, Simeon calls the Christ Child the "salvation" sent by God, thus reiterating the meaning of the divinely revealed Name given to the Christ Child at his circumcision (Jesus means "God saves," as I explained in last week's column). Simeon then explains that this Child, who is the embodiment of God's salvation, has come for "all peoples" (cf. v. 31). It is obvious to us that Jesus came to save everyone. For the Jews of Jesus' day, however, it was groundbreaking, and even scandalous to suggest that God's Messiah would be sent to non-Jews as well as to Jews. In v. 32, Simeon calls Jesus "a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel." In so doing, he interprets the Old Testament prophets correctly in regard to their Messianic predictions. As the Ignatius Study Bible notes, Simeon rightly perceives that the Messiah would fulfill the universal salvific will of God (cf. Isaiah 42:6 and 49:6). In calling Jesus the "glory" of the Jewish people, he also indicates that the glory of God which dwelled in the

Tabernacle (and subsequently in the Temple), was now fully present and available to all people in the Christ Child. Simeon recognized that Jesus was truly Emmanuel, "God with us" (cf. Isaiah 7:14). More on the rest of this episode next week.
