Pastor's Note

OUR LADY OF RANSOM

A recent book, currently in the stores, is the survivor's account of a young Canadian woman, Amanda Lindhout, who was kidnapped by Islamist thugs in Somalia in 2008, and held for ransom. Her memoir of nearly 2 years in captivity (*A House in the Sky*) is not for the faint of heart. What happened to her, however, is not unique. Kidnapping for extravagant ransom sums is an increasing occurrence in the age of the world-wide Jihad, especially as it has enabled Islamist militias to bank-roll their armaments purchases.

Eight hundred years ago the taking of Christian captives for ransom by the corsairs of Muslim North Africa was a terrible reality of the day. The raiding took place on the seas and also on the coasts. (One plausible theory for the origin of the superstitious fear of black cats is that black cats were the favorite ship's cat of the pirates. When people saw them, it was usually a sign that a raiding party had landed and was lying in wait somewhere close by, ready to spring the trap.)

An apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary to St. Peter Nolasco and St. Raymond of Peñafort was the inspiration behind the establishment of a religious order for the redemption of Christian captives held in North Africa. St. Raymond Nonnatus (who died in A.D. 1240) went to Algiers as the Ransomer: that is, he came with the monies which had been collected as alms in order to try to buy the freedom of the enslaved Christians. Once he had exhausted his ransom money, he placed himself as a hostage so that even more Christians could be released.

According to the annals of the Mercedarian Order, Raymond used his opportunity, now that he too had become a captive, to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ to both Christians and Muslims. His evangelizing had great unction, and for this success he was treated with extreme cruelty. Two holes were bored through his lips and a padlock put in them to clamp his mouth shut. It was only opened by the jailer when it was time to feed him. Finally redeemed himself, St. Raymond Nonnatus died shortly after his return to Europe.

The historical memory of the necessary work of the Mercedarians and the particular sufferings of St. Raymond Nonnatus can help us to be mindful of the hidden suffering of captives and hostages throughout the world in our present day. The very least we can do is to pray for them. It also can draw us to reflect on what a perfect metaphor being taken into captivity is for the way in which Satan ensnares us into sin and thereafter binds us into his power. We look to Jesus Christ for deliverance, and the merciful intercession of our Blessed Mother Mary. As the Mass prayer for Our Lady of Ransom concludes: Grant, we pray Thee, O God, that we who love and honor [Mary] as the foundress of so great a work may, by her merits and prayers, be ourselves delivered from all sin and from the bondage of the evil one.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 2:39-52 Part 1

This passage links the episode of Jesus' Presentation in the Temple and the episode in which he is found in the Temple by Mary and Joseph twelve years later. In today's notes, I would like to focus on some background material that

flanks the account of the episode itself. One of the things that strikes me upon reading this passage, is St. Luke's clear and repeated indications that the Holy Family was a pious and observant Jewish family (see especially vv. 39-42, 51-52). In every way, they were seeking to accomplish God's will for their lives, specifically, in regard to the fulfillment of the law. We must be careful not to assume, however, that just because Jesus was God and Mary was immaculately conceived, that the Holy Family's striving after holiness was somehow easier than it is for the rest of us. If anything, we can probably assume that the devil tried to prevent the Holy Family from practicing their faith devoutly, from praying and reading the Scriptures together, from making the annual festal pilgrimages to Jerusalem, and from living together fruitfully and charitably. Thank God that they *did* indeed live charitably, virtuously, and devoutly, and preeminently more so

than any other family (we call them the *Holy* Family for a reason!).

Indeed, we must remember that Jesus, while fully divine, had a *full* human nature, just like Mary and Joseph. Jesus and Mary did not have Original Sin, but they were nevertheless fully human. Like us, they had to work at their faith for the long haul, so to speak, exerting effort in daily prayer and study of Scripture, synagogue and Temple observance, etc. The Holy Family, while singularly blessed, was also very much like our own families: sharing joys, sorrows, and normal daily activity, even tiring long-distance trips. As the lovely Christmas hymn "Once in Royal David's City" says in regard to Jesus, "Tears and smiles, like us, he knew."

All of this should encourage us, then, in our efforts as individuals and families, to continue striving toward holiness in everyday circumstances, and in the practice of our Catholic faith. When we find ourselves struggling to be faithful Catholic Christians, Jesus, Mary, and Joseph are truly in the thick of it with us, providing great encouragement and example, as well as profound measures of grace. THE SORROWS OF MARY

The devotion to the Sorrows of Mary appears towards the beginning of the 14th century. It is probable that Blessed Henry Suso (1295-1366) and other "Rhenish mystics" of the Dominican Order were a contributing factor. From the central scene of Calvary meditation is extended to the whole Passion: from the arrest of Jesus to His burial. And so as to be in line with the very popular devotions to the *Five Joys* of Mary, one counts *five sorrows*, then *seven sorrows*, to correspond to the seven Hours of the daily Office [Matins/Lauds, Prime, Terce, Sext, None, Vespers and Compline] and the *seven joys* of Mary.

With minor variations, the list of the *sorrows* of Mary suffered in the course of the Passion remained remarkably stable:

- 1. Jesus is arrested and struck.
- 2. Jesus is led to Pilate to be judged.
- 3. Jesus is condemned to death.
- 4. Jesus is nailed to the Cross.
- 5. Jesus gives up His Spirit and dies on the Cross.
- 6. Jesus is taken down from the Cross.
- 7. Jesus is wrapped and laid in the tomb.

So as not to overlook anything of the Gospels, there was a parallel list of seven sorrows that included the Infancy and Childhood of Jesus:

- 1. The Prophecy of Simeon.
- 2. The Massacre of the Holy Innocents and the Flight into Egypt.
- 3. Jesus lost in Jerusalem.
- 4. Jesus arrested and judged.
- 5. Jesus crucified and dying.
- 6. Jesus taken down from the Cross.
- 7. Jesus wrapped and laid in the tomb.

Another variation of this devotion was the life of Mary as she visited the places where her Son had lived and died (devotions inspired by the *Golden Legend* of Jacobus de Voragine).

The two lists of Mary's sorrows gave rise in the 14th century to all sorts of literary expression: Meditations, Prayers, Poems, etc. One image in particular—painted, then sculpted—caught the popular imagination, the *Pietà*, Mary holding on her knees the blood-stained Body of Christ. It was the time of the Black Death [bubonic plague] with its terrible epidemics (1347-1350, 1358-1360 1373-1375...). All the greater, therefore, was the impact of these sorrowful themes of Marian devotion....

In 1482 a parish priest of Flanders, John de Coudenberghe, began to preach a devotion to the *Seven Sorrows* under its present form:

- 1. The Prophecy of Simeon (Luke 2:34-35).
- 2. The Flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-21).
- 3. The Loss of Jesus for Three Days (Lk 2:41-50).
- 4. The Ascent to Calvary (John 19:17).
- 5. The Crucifixion and Death of Jesus (John 19:18 -30).
- 6. Jesus Taken Down from the Cross (John 19:39-40).
- 7. Jesus Laid in the Tomb (John 19:40-42).

The devotion brought into existence a *Confraternity of Our Lady of Sorrows*, which won approval from the Pope.



Glory be to the Father...

COLLECT: In Thy tender mercy, direct our hearts, we beseech Thee, O Lord, because without Thee we are not able to please Thee. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: I Corinthians 1:4-8 Brethren, I give thanks to my God always for you, for the grace of God that is given you in Christ Jesus, that in all things you are made rich in Him, in all utterance and in all knowledge, as the testimony of Christ was confirmed in you, so that nothing is wanting to you in any grace, waiting for the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ. Who also will confirm you into the end without crime, in the day of the coming of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL: Matthew 9:1-8 **A**t that time, Jesus entering into a boat, passed over the water and came into His own city. And behold they brought Him one sick of the palsy lying in a bed; and Jesus seeing their faith, said to the man sick of the palsy: Be of good heart, son, thy sins are forgiven thee. And behold some of the scribes said within themselves: He blasphemeth. And Jesus seeing their thoughts said: Why do you think evil in your hearts? whether is it easier to say: Thy sins are forgiven thee; or to say: Arise and walk? But that you may know that the Son of man hath power on earth to forgive sins (then said He to the man sick of the palsy): Arise, take up thy bed, and go into thy house. And her arose and went into the house. And the multitude seeing it, feared, and glorified God who has given such power to men.

OFFERTORY: Exodus 24: 4. 5. Moses consecrated an altar to the Lord, offering upon it holocausts, and sacrificing victims: he made an evening sacrifice to the Lord God for an odor of sweetness, in the sight of the children of Israel.

SECRET O God who, through the communion in this venerable sacrifice, dost make us partakers of the one supreme Godhead: grant, we beseech Thee, that having come to the knowledge of Thy truth, we may obtain it by worthy lives. Through our Lord.
