Pastor's Note

WHAT THE POPE SAID...WHAT IT IS REPORTED THE POPE SAID.

Ast week an extended interview which Pope Francis gave to Fr. Antonio Spadaro, S.J., the editor of the Italian Jesuit journal *Civilta Cattolica* was published. Much of the press went on a feeding frenzy over it. It was reported that the Pope had overturned the Catholic Establishment, that he had called the Church's defense of the right-to-life and traditional marriage "small minded rules" and "obsessions", which we had to get away from. It was claimed that he was repudiating the work of Pope Benedict's Papacy and setting the Church on a more progressive and accommodating course with contemporary thinking.

One has only to read a little bit of the actual text of Pope Francis's interview to realize what a monstrous distortion of his words and his expressed thoughts this kind of fragmented, sound-bite reporting is. They had to dishonestly cut-and-paste his words in order to make him seem to say things which, in context, he clearly never said.

One lesson re-enforced for us is how important it is to take the trouble to read the full transcript or the full text of what Pope Francis says, lest we pass judgment on our Pope based on what an internet news-flash headline says.

I would heartily recommend that people get a hold of the English translation of the Pope Francis interview published in the Jesuit Magazine America. It is readily accessible online: A Big Heart Open to God: The Exclusive Interview with Pope Francis. I recommend it not only because it is the corrective to media disinformation (and defamation), but also because it is a very moving and compelling way of address. The Holy Father gives us much to think about and to reflect upon in our hearts.


I quote the part of the interview which was used by the media to generate controversy:

We cannot insist only on issues related to abortion, gay marriage, and the use of contraceptive methods. This is not possible. I have not spoken much about these things, and I was reprimanded for that. But when we speak about these issues, we have to talk about them in a context. The teaching of the Church, for that matter, is clear and I am a son of the Church, but it is not necessary to talk about these issues all the time.

The dogmatic and moral teachings of the Church are not all equivalent. The Church's pastoral ministry cannot be obsessed with the transmission of a disjointed multitude of doctrines to be imposed insistently. Proclamation in a missionary style focuses on the essentials, on the necessary things: this is also what fascinates and attracts more, what makes the heart burn, as it did for the disciples at Emmaus. We have to find a new balance; otherwise even the moral edifice of the Church is likely to fall like a house of cards, losing the freshness and fragrance of the Gospel. The proposal of the Gospel must be more simple, profound, radiant. It is from this proposition that the moral consequences then flow.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE **BIBLE STUDY** Luke 2:39-52 Part 2

Temple at Jerusalem can be puzzling at first glance. Indeed, we resonate with "Why have you done this to us?" We know that Christ was and is without sin, and therefore, could not have been attempting to give his

parents a hard time. If anything, it is entirely likely that one of his relatives in the family "caravan" might have failed to communicate to Him that the group was leaving the city a certain time. The family travel plans also could have changed without Him knowing. It can be unsettlingly easy for a child to lose his way in a grocery store- how much more so a bustling city during its highest religious festal time of the year! All that St. Luke tells us is that "Jesus remained behind...but His parents did not know it," because they thought "that He was in the caravan" (vv. 43-44).

The fact that Jesus stayed behind raises some other points for our consideration. If Jesus was not "in the know" regarding the family travel logistics, how/ why did He not access his omniscience, being God? The mystery of the unity of Christ's divine and human natures in his one divine Person (the "hypostatic union") does *not* imply that His human intellect had the capacity to grasp everything that His divine intellect could. Christ willingly took on the intellectual

limitations of a human nature, when He assumed it at His conception (cf. Phil. 2:6-8). In other words, Jesus, in His human nature, learned His letters and His times tables just like the rest of us, even though, in respect to His divine nature, He already knew all that there is to know. Jesus did not rely on his divinity simply to avoid the frustrations and difficulties of daily life, as we can also see in the Temptation episode, where He refuses to use His divine omnipotence to turn stones into bread in order to satiate His hunger (cf. Luke 4:3-4). At the same time, there are other instances in which the Gospels reveal to us that Jesus was able to read others' thoughts, in order to lead them to conversion (cf. Luke 5:20-23, 7:39-40). A profound mystery indeed!

But what if Jesus did know about leaving the city, in regard to His human intellect, and willed to stay behind? What does this mean? As oftentimes The Finding of Christ in the happens in Scripture, what at first seems like a terrible or stressful event oftentimes yields a great blessing. What to Mary and Joseph was an anxietyinducing moment, turned out to be a watershed Mary's exclamation in v. 48, moment, in which Jesus revealed more fully who He was. Here again, as in the entirely of St. Luke's infancy narratives, Jesus identity as Son of God and Messiah is brought to the fore (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 534).

> Firstly, when St. Luke tells us that Jesus was "sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions," this does not mean that He was asking simple questions like "How many Commandments are there?". Rather, Jesus was engaging the rabbis in a professional study of the Torah at *their* level! To this day, Jews typically study the Torah with at least one partner. As the Ignatius Study Bible notes, they unlock the meaning of the text by posing probing questions to each other, and answering these questions by raising even more illuminating and challenging questions. St. Luke tells us that the rabbis "were astounded at His understanding and his answers (v. 47), because Jesus showed Himself to be no mere uneducated peasant, but a master teacher and interpreter of Scripture.

When Mary and St. Joseph finally discovered Jesus in the Temple, Jesus answered His mother's exclamation by calling God "my Father." For Jesus to call God his Father was to imply

co-equal divine status with God something blasphemous for a mere human, but not for the Second Person of the Trinity). As the notes of the New American Bible and the Ignatius Study Bible explain, Jesus was helping His parents to understand that His filial relationship to God the Father was more fundamental than His familial relationship to them. Jesus also explains that Mary and St. Joseph should have guessed that He would be in the Temple (implying that the Temple was His natural environment). The chief activity that occurred in the Temple was liturgical sacrifice. By calling the Temple His true home, Jesus identified Himself as the God to whom sacrifice was offered, as well as the sacrificial victim who could reconcile man with God. St. Luke tells us that Mary and St. Joseph did not grasp this at that time- and who can blame them? The meaning of Jesus' words are profound indeed, and worth years of contemplation! No wonder this episode is one of the mysteries of the Rosary.







BLESSED EMPEROR KARL VON HABSBURG Thursday, October 17th, 2013:

On Thursday, October 17th, at 5:30 PM, we will welcome His Excellency, Don Teodoro de Faria, Bishop Emeritus of Funchal, Madeira, to our parish for the celebration of a Pontifical High Mass in Honor of Blessed Karl von Habsurg, Emperor of Austria and Apostolic King of Hungary, who died exiled on Madeira in 1922 and was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 2004. As bishop of the diocese in which Blessed Karl died, Bishop Faria has long been active in his cause for sainthood. It was Bishop Faria who formally presented the petition of beatification to Pope John Paul II.





LATIN MASS TEXTS: Traditional Propers for the Dedication of St. Michael Archangel

INTROIT: Psalm 102. 20, 1. Bless the Lord, all ye His angels: you that are mighty in strength and execute His word, hearkening to the voice of His orders. Psalm: Bless the Lord, O my soul: and let all that is within me praise His holy name. V. Glory be to the Father...

COLLECT: Lord, Thou hast arranged the service of angels and men in wonderful harmony; grant in Thy mercy that those who always serve before Thee in Heaven, may be the protectors of our life on earth. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Apocalypse 1. 1-5. In those days, God signified the things which must shortly come to pass, sending by His angel to His servant John, who hath given testimony to the word of God, and the testimony of Jesus Christ, and what things soever he hath seen. Blessed is he that readeth and heareth the word of this prophecy, and keepeth those things which are written in it; for the time is at hand. John to the seven churches which are in Asia. Grace be unto you and peace from Him that is, and that was, and that is to come; and from the seven spirits which are before His throne; and from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, the first-begotten of the dead, and the prince of the kings of the earth, who hath loved us, and washed us from our sins in His own blood.

GOSPEL: Matthew 18:1-10 **A**t that time, the disciples came to Jesus, saying: "Who thinkest Thou, is the greater in the kingdom of heaven?" And Jesus calling unto Him a little child, set him in the midst of them, and said: "Amen I say to you, unless you be converted, and become as little children, you shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven. Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, he is the greater in the kingdom of heaven: and he that shall receive one such little child in My name, receiveth Me; but he that shall scandalize one of these little ones that believe in Me, it were better for him that a millstone should be hanged about his neck, and that he should be drowned in the depth of the sea. Woe to the world because of scandals: for it must needs be that scandals come; but nevertheless, woe to that man by whom the scandal cometh. And if thy hand or foot scandalize thee, cut it off, and cast it from thee. It is better for thee to go into life maimed or lame, than having two hands or two feet, to be cast into everlasting fire. And if thy eye scandalize thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee. It is better for thee having one eye to enter into life, than having two eyes to be cast into hell-fire. See that you despise not one of these little ones; for I say to you, that their angels in heaven always see the face of My Father who is in heaven.

OFFERTORY: Apocalypse 8. 3,4. An angel stood near the altar of the temple, having a golden censer in his hand, and there was given to him much incense: and the smoke of the perfumes ascended before God, alleluia.
