Pastor's Note

CHURCH ANNIVERSARY AND AN ANNUAL REPORT

Today we mark the actual date of the 113th Anniversary of the Dedication of our parish church of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes: November 24th, A.D. 1910. It was the "new church" for St. Mary's Parish of Newton & Needham and at its dedication St. Mary's Parish took a new name, *Mary Immaculate of Lourdes*. Since the day of the dedication fell on Thanksgiving Day, it is fitting that we offer the

Mass of celebration for the Anniversary of the Dedication of a Church each year at one of our parish Masses on Thanksgiving Day. This will be our 9 AM Mass for this Thursday, a traditional Latin Low Mass.

It is an occasion both to give thanks to God for another year of life in this parish-church and to be mindful of our present duty to maintain this patrimony which our Catholic forebears built and sustained at such great sacrifice. Today I am presenting to you, the parishioners of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes, this year's Annual Report for the parish and for our Parish Cemetery of St. Mary's.

Photocopies of the Annual Report are available in the pamphlet rack of the main vestibule of the Church. The Parish posted an increased Offertory of 10% this past Fiscal Year, which continues the positive trend from last year. Taken together with our two utility collections (Air Conditioning/Heating), and our sacramental and candle shrine offerings, this total makes up 55% of FY 2013's income. We also received two large unexpected bequests from deceased parishioners, one munificent donation from one of our parish families, and several other spontaneous generous gifts. This provided us with another \$214,354-38% of our total income. Our net deficit of \$224,332, however, was aggravated by another transfer of \$134,916 to St. Mary's Cemetery in order to help the Cemetery meet its costs. Our capital repairs were \$30,855 and went to repairs on the church roof and bell tower.

On the operating cost side, we have kept expenses down (outside of the Cemetery) to either very small increases or actual decreases.

I thank you as the pastor of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes for the increased giving even as the economy remains in what the economists describe as a "mild depression".

As we look at the trends in our present Fiscal Year, we have a reasonable expectation that we have a workable arrangement (over...)

(continued from page 3) now in place at St. Mary's Cemetery. Our parishioner and outside contractor Ron Goguen is taking very good care of our Cemetery. We have also benefited from the expertise of our professional cemetery consultant Tom Daly from Cemetery Helpful Solutions who has twice agreed to extend his contract with us in our effort to improve the running of St. Mary's. Once the Cemetery's budget is stabilized, this will stem the heavy losses from our parish savings account which we have incurred over the past two years.

Although we do not have a sustainable financial plan for the parish yet, things are trending in the right direction (increased Offertory, control of costs), we still have savings to cover our deficits, the parish buildings are in good condition, the parish debt is zero, and our Parish Finance Council is actively working to find a plan to sell or lease our unused former parish center of St. Elizabeth's which will likely recover much of the financial losses caused by the Cemetery.

Any discussion of our parish stewardship though cannot be separated from the way in which the Archdiocesan parish re-organization plan *Disciples in Mission* may be applied to Mary Immaculate of Lourdes. In last year's Report, I explained that the Planning Commission had informed me that Mary Immaculate's place had not been decided. I had interpreted this as a positive sign that my own letters, the joint letters signed by two groups of parishioners, and various individual letters sent by some others of our parishioners had impressed upon the members of the Commission the total unsuitability of their plan for this parish. In this I was much mistaken.

In August I received another letter from the director of the Pastoral Planning Commission, informing me that Mary Immaculate of Lourdes was to be joined in a Pastoral Collaborative with St. Bernard's Church in West Newton, whose official name is now Corpus-Christi/St. Bernard Parish. When I asked for further clarification on how such a plan could be reconciled with the special apostolate of the


traditional Latin Mass in place here, I was informed by another letter in October that, since the Latin Mass can now be said anywhere, the canonically open status of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes will be revoked and that it will be up to the future pastor of the Mary Immaculate of Lourdes—Corpus-Christi/St. Bernard collaborative to decide whether or not to continue offering it. I then wrote another letter as a response-to-their-response. This letter went unacknowledged. After a month, I followed up with an e-mail inquiry. The reply I received was that the final decision had been made, the matter was closed, and there would be no further discussion with me.

On Wednesday, November 13th, I convoked a meeting with a new Parish Pastoral Council and presented them with all of the correspondence related to this matter. We had a very thoughtful discussion and the consensus was that the Parish Pastoral Council should continue to make representation to the powers-that-be in this Archdiocese on the things that are most important to us as a parish community.

In the meantime, we should continue work at the building up the kind of parish that reflects the descriptive words of Pope Paul VI which we have adopted as our Parish Mission Statement:

"What then is a parish? It is the smallest section of the one universal flock which has been entrusted to Peter by the Lord. Under the authority of a responsible priest who has received the care of souls from his bishop, the parish is, within the Church of Jesus Christ, the first community of Christian life; it is a community cut to human dimensions, in which the shepherd can know his flock and the flock can know their shepherd ..."

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 4:31-37

The stories of Jesus' exorcisms seem mythological to many people today. Sometimes, even Catholics are surprised to learn that demons are real. This passage (among many others in the Bible) is a good corrective for such thinking.

After being violently expelled from

Nazareth, Jesus continues to preach in the synagogues of Galilee. As Robert Tannehill notes in his commentary on Luke, we can safely assume that Jesus' message at the synagogue in Capernaum was likely very similar to the message he preached in Nazareth: that He was the promised Messiah, sent to bring healing, salvation, and mercy to sinners, and freedom for the oppressed (cf. Luke 4:18-19; Tannehill 95-96).

Upon hearing Jesus' message, a demonpossessed man in the congregation disrupts the service to oppose Him. We should note that the demon, while confrontational, is fearful. He dreads the possibility that Jesus had "come to destroy" him (cf. v. 34). Indeed, this is *exactly* what Jesus had come to do, because the devil and his minions constantly oppress man, and are the ultimate source of all the evil in the world. As St. John explains in his first letter, "The Son of God was revealed to destroy the works of the devil" (cf. 1 John 3:8). The demons know they're doomed, which is why we

need not cower in fear of them, even though we must resist their temptations. I highly recommend reading 1 Peter 5:7-11, because we need to be reminded to rely on the grace of our Blessed Lord, who has authority over the evil one.

At Capernaum, Jesus does not enter into a long-winded dialogue with the demon, nor does He engage in a drawn-out ritual. Such was the common practice of the exorcists of the day, as the Ignatius Study Bible notes. Had Jesus done this, it might have suggested that He and the demon were equally matched opponents. In actuality, demons are finite creatures, who cannot begin to rival the infinitely powerful and eternal God before whom they tremble. Jesus delivers the demon-possessed man with one command. The crowd is amazed at Jesus' authority (v. 36), just as they were amazed at the authority of His teaching (v. 32). From this point forward, St. Luke frequently highlights the powerful unity of Jesus' words and deeds, as both Tannehill and the Navarre Study Bible note.

To what degree are we attentive to the words of the Lord? Do we really believe that He is more powerful than the devil? Throughout our day, let us make acts of faith, trusting in God's providential care for us. According to St. Athanasius in his biography of St. Antony the Great, the first desert monastic, St. Antony recommends two things regarding our struggle against temptation: (1) making the sign of the cross, and (2) calling on the Name of Jesus. The devil has *no* authority before our Lord, who is immediately present to us at all times, and especially when we invoke His Name for help (cf. Phil. 2:10-11, Heb. 4:14-16, two more passages I highly recommend for your prayerful devotion). Likewise, the devil flees when we physically invoke the sign of our faith, the Holy Cross, by which Christ decisively defeated him. Let us make more frequent use of these two sources of grace. Deo Gratias! Thanks be to God!


See some of the most enchanting paintings from art history on Sunday, November 24th at 12:30 PM in the Lower Church Hall. Gwyneth Holston, a Catholic

LATIN MASS TEXTS: THE LAST SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Jeremias 29: 11, 12, 14 The Lord saith: I think thoughts of peace, and not of affliction: you shall call upon Me, and I will hear you; and I will bring back your captivity from all places. *Psalm* 84: 2 Lord, Thou hast blessed Thy land: Thou hast turned away the captivity of Jacob. *V. For as lightning cometh out of the east, and appeareth even into the west, so shall also the coming of the Son of man be. Wheresoever the body shall be, there shall the eagles also be gathered together. And immediately after the tribulation of those days, the sun shall be darkened, and the moon shall not give her light, and the stars shall fall from heaven, and the powers of heaven shall be moved; and then shall appear the sign of the Son of man in heaven, and then shall all the tribes of the earth mourn; and they shall see the Son of man coming in the clouds of heaven with much power and majesty; and He shall send His angels with a trumpet and a great voice, and they shall gather together His elect from the four winds, from the farthest parts of the heavens to the utmost bounds of them. And from the fig-tree learn a parable: when the branch thereof is now tender, and the leaves come forth, you know that summer is nigh. So you also, when you shall see all these things, know ye that it is nigh even at the doors. Amen I say to you that this generation shall not pass till all these things be done. Heaven and earth shall pass away, but My words shall not pass away.


ABOUT OUR PARISH

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
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
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
