UPDATE ON DOMINIC PIO GUNDRUM



KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 6:12-19

In this passage, St. Luke tells us that Jesus took some time to be alone in prayer with His Father, and not just for an hour or so, but for the *entire night*. I'm willing to bet that many of us do not utilize night-time hours for prayer when we lie

awake in bed, unable to fall asleep. Instead, we're often worrying about what happened during the day, or about what might happen on the morrow. Why not pray a Divine Mercy Chaplet, or the Rosary? To understand exactly why Jesus spent the whole night in prayer (Jesus at prayer is a major recurring theme in Luke) we should look at what He did the following morning. In v. 13, St. Luke tells us that He chose his twelve disciples, "whom He also named apostles." In other words, Jesus began the foundation of His Church (cf. Eph. 2:20). This was a watershed moment in His mission to reach all mankind.

Perhaps we can imagine some of the things Jesus might have been thinking about as He prayed all night long: the strengths and weaknesses of these men, their faithlessness during his Passion, but ultimately, all the good they would later do after His Ascension. We must be especially conscious of the fact that Jesus chose both Peter and Judas with the

full knowledge of what they would do to Him. Later in the Gospel, in 22:31-32, Jesus reveals some of the content of His prayers during the Last Supper. Here, He turns to Peter and says, "Simon, Simon, behold Satan has demanded to sift all of you as wheat, but I have prayed that your own faith may not fail; and once you have turned back, your must strengthen your brothers." Jesus is no pessimist, nor is He an optimist. He is a realist. He knows Peter is a sinner destined for sainthood. In particular, He highlights the importance of his pastoral charge for the rest of the Church.

This passage from the Last Supper is crucial in our understanding of the Petrine office, i.e., the papacy. Every pope is a sinner, just like Peter. However, the charism or gift of Peter's role in the Church is to confirm the rest of the believers in the faith. Not one pope has failed to teach and uphold Catholic Orthodoxy. This is what the Church teaches in her doctrine of papal infallibility (Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 890-891). Sadly, not every pope has been a good Christian, diplomat, governor/legislator, or preacher. Thankfully, many popes have been exemplary saints, evangelists, and governors. Most importantly, all popes have been orthodox. In the words of the Roman Canon, they are those "who, holding to the truth, [have] hand[ed] on the Catholic and Apostolic faith." It is constitutive to being Peter.

After choosing the twelve, St. Luke then tells us that Jesus taught hundreds of people, and healed them of their diseases (v. 18). The scene back then is similar to the way in which people stream to Gillette Stadium from all over New England to see the Patriots play. Foxborough would have little significance for the rest of New England apart from the Patriots. Likewise, Galilee would have had no other reason to draw such crowds apart from the presence of Jesus of Nazareth. When we receive Holy Communion, we should approach the Lord with the same kind of desire of the people in this passage. They all "sought to touch Him, because power came forth from him and healed them all" (v. 19). Approached in faith and received with repentance, Jesus in the Sacred Host purges us of venial sin (less serious sin), just as He healed the people long ago in Galilee. Let us continue to seek Him and His healing grace for our physical and spiritual ailments. (David Allen)

And Jesus hearing this marveled, and said to them that followed Him: Amen I say to you, I have not found so great faith in Israel. And I say to you, that many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven: but the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into the exterior darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. And Jesus said to the centurion: Go, and as thou hast believed, so be it done to thee. And the servant was healed at the same hour.


