Pastor's Note

SEPTUAGESIMA AND PRE-LENT

Two Sundays ago on February 2nd we marked the end of the Christmas Cycle with the celebration of the Feast of Candlemas. Today we mark the beginning of the Easter Cycle with Septuagesima Sunday. Septuagesima is the Latin word for "seventieth". Ten Sundays from today will be Easter Sunday.

From today until this year's Ash Wednesday (on March 5th) we observe a period of "pre-Lent" called Septuagesima. The resurrection acclamation of "Alleluia" is suppressed at Mass and in the Divine Office from today until the singing of the Gospel Acclamation on Easter Eve. The liturgical color is violet as it is during Lent and Passiontide.

In the 1970 Calendar Reform of Paul VI, this pre -Lent liturgical observance of Septuagesima was eliminated. The "Alleluia" continues to be sung until Ash Wednesday and the liturgical color

remains green for the intermediate season.

It is still "pre-Lent", however,—Easter is 10 Sundays away—and it is still the proper time for us to begin to prepare ourselves for the observance of Lent in the right way. The chief purposes of Lent are for us to renew our Christian faith and to strengthen our wills for Christian daily living in anticipation of celebrating the "Feast of Feasts" at Easter. We renew our faith by increasing our religious observances: for example, attending daily Mass during Lent, attending Lenten devotions like the Stations of the Cross, or religious conferences, making a retreat or a day of recollection, choosing to read the Bible or a book of spiritual reading. We strengthen our wills for Christian daily living by submitting to the Church's discipline for Lent (days of fast and abstinence on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, observing abstinence from meat on Fridays), and adding to these our own freely-chosen, personal "Lenten sacrifices" which consist of the giving up of a lawful pleasure or pleasures during at least the week-days of Lent. These may be adapted to each person's age, health, state-inlife, inclination, disposition, and special inspiration from God so that everyone can be a part of it. These Lenten sacrifices should be real enough so as to make us feel the "pinch" of inconvenience, but not so impractical that they compromise the performance of our duties in life nor so ostentatious that they draw undue attention to ourselves.

So, now is the time to avail ourselves of making a plan for Lent 2014. Do not wait to the morning of Ash Wednesday! The soul-killing, flat-lining mood of secularism takes away both fast and feast. It is all dully the same. That should not be so for the Christian faithful.

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 6:37-42

As Jesus continues His Sermon on the Plain, He exhorts us to refrain from judging, lest we become hypocrites. As He says, "Stop judging, and you will not be judged" (v. 37). In vv. 41-42, He uses a parable to elaborate His teachings,

addressing them with this question: "Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own?" He then explains, "Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye." Thus, we should be attentive to our faults and deficiencies in virtue, before we locate them in others.

Notice that while Jesus commands us not to judge, He does not prevent us from removing the splinter from another's eye. Indeed, Jesus teaches that we refrain from judging *persons*, whose status before God is unknown to any except God himself. We do well to remember that none is blameless before the judgment seat of God. This, however, does not excuse us from our responsibility to identify evil when we see it. Many people feel that identifying sin necessarily means that one is passing an incriminating judgment upon a person. This attitude often feeds into a general sense of

permissive license in our culture, which quickly relativizes all moral certitude. Anyone can readily comprehend, however, that judgment upon sinful actions is neither a judgment upon someone's heart, nor is it a malicious attack upon their person.

For example, a parent can (and should) call out a teenager for doing something harmful or senseless, and do it in such a way that does not harm the teenager's dignity. Jesus himself provides the model for making the all-important distinction between persons and actions. In John 8:11, after saving a woman caught in the act of adultery from being stoned to death, He says to her, "Neither do I condemn you. Go, and from now on, do not sin any more." Jesus separates the woman, for whom He shows great compassion, from her sins, which He tells her to stop doing. Thus, Jesus does not teach us to ignore or approve of others' faults, but to beware lest we identify their faults without first identifying our own.

Jesus' admonition to forgive, so that we will be forgiven (v. 37), relates to the following petition in the Lord's Prayer: "and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us." We will not have the capacity to receive forgiveness, unless we are willing to extend it to others. In St. Luke's account of the Lord's Prayer, this petition is expressed thus: "and forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone in debt to us" (11:4). Most of us will likely have to pause here and take stock of our lives. Jesus makes it quite clear that forgiving others is a necessary precondition for receiving forgiveness from God.

Jesus encourages our liberality with forgiveness, as well as material goods, following from His earlier instructions (cf. vv. 30-36). As He says, "Give, and gifts will be given to you" (v. 38). What is the meaning of this image: "good measure, packed together, shaken down, and overflowing," etc.? As some commentaries explain, this is a commercial expression: in Jesus' day, grain merchants would measure out portions of grain by folding up their robe or tunic into a makeshift "pouch," and pouring a certain measure into the garment. A good and just merchant would seek to provide his customer with a proper amount by packing it down and shaking it in his tunic pouch, so that there would not be any space gaps, and so that the customer could get his "bang for his buck," so to speak. For us, it would be

like having cereal boxes that are actually full of cereal all the way up to the top. Jesus equates Himself with the kind of merchant that gives a full and generous portion of grain, provided we both give and forgive. He promises to reward our generosity with even more generosity, that is, spiritual graces on earth and especially in heaven. We see this clearly in the lives of the saints. With God, giving and forgiving is a win-win situation.



SEPTUAGESIMA SUNDAY

INTROIT: Ps. 17. 5, 6, 7 The sorrows of death surrounded me, the of hell encompassed me: and in my affliction I called upon the Lord, and He heard my voice from His holy Temple *Psalm 17. 2-3* I will love Thee, O Lord, my strength: the Lord is my firmament, my refuge, and my deliverer. *V. G*lory be to the Father. COLLECT Graciously hear, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the prayers of Thy people, that we who are justly afflicted for our sins, may be mercifully delivered by Thy goodness for the glory of Thy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: I Corinthians 9. 24-27; 10. 1-5 Brethren: Know you not that they that run in the race, all run indeed, but one receiveth the prize? So run that you may obtain. And every one that striveth for the mastery refraineth himself from all things: and they indeed that they may receive a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible one. I therefore so run, not as at an uncertainty; I so fight, not as one beating the air: but I chastise my body, and bring it into subjection, lest perhaps when I have preached to others, I myself should become a castaway. For I would not have you ignorant, brethren, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all in Moses were baptized, in the cloud and in the sea: and all did eat the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink: (and they drank of the spiritual rock that followed them: and the rock was Christ). But with most of them God was not well pleased.

GRADUAL: Psalm 9. 10-11, 19-20 A helper in due time in tribulation: let them trust in Thee who know Thee: for Thou hast not forsaken them that seek Thee, O Lord. *V*. For the poor man shall not be forgotten to the end: the patience of the poor shall not perish forever: arise, O Lord, let no man prevail. TRACT: Psalm 129. 1-4 Out of the depths I have cried to Thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice *V*. Let Thine ears be attentive to the prayer of Thy servant. *V*. If Thou, O Lord, wilt mark iniquities: O Lord: O Lord, who shall abide it? *V*. For with Thee there is merciful forgiveness, and by reason of Thy law I have waited for Thee, O Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 20. 1-16 At that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of heaven is like to a householder who went out early in the morning to hire labourers into His vineyard. And having agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the market place idle, and he said to them: Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just. And they went their way. And again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour: and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: Why stand you here all the day idle? They say to him: Because no man hath hired us. He saith to them: Go you also into my vineyard. And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith to his steward: Call the labourers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first. When therefore they were come that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: and they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us that have borne the burden of the day and the heats. But he answering said to one of them: Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what it is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thy eye evil, because I am good? So shall the last be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen.

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
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
