Pastor's Note

DEEDS OF MERCY

Christian Lent is consecrated by the three practices of Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving. It is not that we are expected to pray, fast, and perform deeds of mercy *only* during the six weeks of the year which encompass Lent: obviously these are practices which we should be living out all the time. They are ingredients of essential Christianity. But Lent affords us the opportunity to practice them with better concentration and renewed act of will. I want to speak more here about the practice of almsgiving.

If we interpret almsgiving just as "giving to charity" now and then in order to be considered (in our own eyes and in the eyes of others) a "good person" then we are looking at it too narrowly. Opening our wallets or our checkbooks to a good cause may or may not reflect the Christian spirit of doing a deed of mercy in order to relieve the wants of others. In Christianity, an alms or a "mercy-deed" is a material favor given to someone in want for the sake of the love of Christ.

It is therefore different from the support we are bound to give to the support of the Church or from the taxes we pay for the maintenance of civil society (although the portion of our tax money which is used to fund programs that help people who are impoverished or on low-income may be considered an alms-deed). It is also distinct from other kinds of worthy benefactions, such as supporting the arts or building a community playground.

In his Encyclical *Rerum Novarum* (1891), Pope Leo XIII summarized the principle of Christian almsgiving:


Man should not consider his external possessions as his own, but as common to all, so as to share them without difficulty when others are in need. Whence the Apostle says: Command the rich of the world to give with ease. This is a duty not of justice (except in extreme cases), but of Christian charity—a duty not enforced by human law. But the laws and judgments of men must yield to the laws and judgments of Christ the true God, who in many ways urges on His followers the practice of almsgiving.

We might outline the basic guidelines for our personal, private almsgiving as follows.

- 1. Alms are given out of our superfluous income and material goods—what is overand-above—not out of what we need to maintain ourselves at a decent level and meet our responsibilities in life.
- 2. Alms should not be done carelessly. For example, the *Apostolic Constitutions* of the early Church stated: *Alms must not be given to the malicious, the intemperate or the lazy, lest a premium should be set on vice.*
- 3. Our almsgiving should be done with discretion: taking care not to embarrass the persons receiving it nor upsetting them with our idea of good, but not theirs; it should be timely, cheerful, self-less, and abundant according to our means.

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY Luke 7:18-23

The account of Jesus' exchange with two messengers from St. John the Baptist challenges us to consider seriously all the empirical evidence that should lead us to make an act of faith. St. John (imprisoned at this point) sends messengers

to Jesus with the following question: "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" (v. 20). Jesus had just raised someone from the dead, and St. Luke tells us that when these messengers came to Jesus, He was already in the midst of healing many and performing exorcisms (v. 21). The obvious answer to their question would seem to be, "Yes!" Indeed, it seems odd that the forerunner would question the identity of the one He had so clearly and unwaveringly affirmed earlier (cf. John 1:29-34, 3:27-36). In fact, many commentators have agreed that St. John did not need assurance about Jesus' identity for himself. Rather, he sent these disciples to Jesus so that they might settle their own doubts by seeing Him and his works first-hand.

Jesus certainly helps these disciples in this regard. Rather than simply saying "yes" to their question, He enumerates the plentiful evidence that

clearly attests to His messiahship and divinity, giving them more than enough proof for them to come to the conclusion on their own. We can compare this enumeration with Jesus' own mission statement in 4:18-19. Here, the prophet Isaiah foretells a Messiah who will "bring glad tidings to the poor" and "recovery of sight to the blind," among other things. In 7:22, Jesus mentions these things, and more. He explains to the messengers, "Go and tell John what you have seen and heard: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have the good news proclaimed to them." As the commentary in the Ignatius Study Bible indicates, these are all things that Isaiah linked with the coming of the Messiah. Thus, we see the recurring Lucan theme of promise and fulfillment, which is centered on the other recurring Lucan theme of Jesus' identity as Son of God and Messiah.

The second-to-last item in Jesus' list is worth considering further: raising the dead. No mere man can do that on his own authority. Indeed, no one in the Old Testament except the prophets Elijah and Elisha had ever performed a resurrection, as the Ignatius Study Bible notes (cf. 1 Kings 17:17-24, 2 Kings 4:32-37). Interestingly enough, as the commentary also explains, it was the son of a widow that Elijah raised to life, which is exactly the same miracle Jesus performed immediately prior to this episode. Resurrection is a miracle surpassing all others in power and greatness. As we prepare to celebrate Jesus' resurrection at Easter, Lent is a challenge for us to renew our confidence in the resurrection. In our daily conduct, are we consciously "await(ing) a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will change our lowly body to be like His glorious body" (cf. Phil. 3:20-21)? If He has the power to do this (and He does, for He has proven it in His own resurrection), perhaps we can yield more fully to His lordship in all areas of our lives.

Jesus then tells the messengers in v. 23, "Blessed is the one who takes no offense at me." As I mentioned in a previous post, blessedness is a deeply seated kind of happiness that transcends merely feeling happy. It is the kind of happiness that rests secure in the certainty of a known reality. For St. Luke, the Blessed Virgin Mary epitomizes blessedness (cf. 1:42, 45, 48), because she, and all disciples who follow her, "hear the word of God

and act on it/observe it" (cf. 8:21, 11:28). The message to the messengers of St. John is the same message for us: the witness that Jesus has given is indisputable. Now the tennis ball is in our court: are we going to be like Mary, and truly hear and receive this good news about the resurrection? Is Jesus merely a nice compartmentalized part of our week, or is He someone to whom we entrust our whole life and our eternity?

WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY: "THE GOSPEL OF LUKE"



SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

INTROIT: Psalm 24: 6, 3, 22 Remember, O Lord, Thy depths of compassion, and Thy mercies that are from the beginning of the world, lest at any time our enemies rule over us: deliver us, O God of Israel, from all our tribulations. *Psalm 24: 1-2* To Thee, O Lord, have I lifted up my soul: in Thee, O my God, I put my trust; let me not be ashamed. *V. Glory* be to the Father.



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
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
