#### **1914 CENTENARAY**

Last week, June 28th, marked the 100th anniversary of the event which triggered the First World War-the "Great War" as it was called before Adolf Hitler unleashed the dogs of war again in 1939. The event was the assassination of the Archduke Franz Ferdinand, the heir to the Hapsburg Monarchy, and his wife Sophie by a Serbian nationalist while they were on an official visit to Sarajevo, Bosnia-Herzegovina. Over the next month of July 1914 a series of high-stakes bluffs, miscalculations, deliberate provocations, and miscommunications among the interested European governments led to the outbreak of a general war between Germany and Austria-Hungary on one side, and Russia, France, Great Britain, and Serbia on the other. The war

commenced at once with a cataclysmic violence nobody was prepared for.

In 2004, at the time of the 90th commemoration of the outbreak of war, a 96 year old woman I used to the visit at the Deutches Altenheim in West Roxbury told me of her vivid memories of that time. She was a six-year-old girl. Although her family had emigrated to the United States, her mother had gone back for a summer visit. Their extended family was in a German settlement area near Sarajevo so she remembered the assassination as the adults were all talking about it. When the war broke out she and her mother were trapped in Europe. It took her father in America several months to arrange a way for them to travel to a still-neutral country and sail back to the U.S.


People across Europe were taken by awful surprise. It was not just an impression a 6-yearold girl. In his memoir Gabriel Chevalier, who was a front-line French soldier throughout the long war 1914-1918, describes the outbreak of war in the midst of a glorious summer holiday:

The fire was already smouldering somewhere down in the depths of Europe, but carefree France donned its summer costumes, straw hates and flannel trousers, and packed its bags for the holidays. There wasn't a cloud in the sky—such an optimistic, bright blue sky. It would be so lovely out in the countryside or down by the sea...Trains were packed and the booking offices did a roaring trade in roundtrip tickets: the well-to-do were looking forward to a two-month holiday.

#### And then, it happened:

The proclamation is posted up on every town hall in the country...The whole of France stands on tiptoe to see the poster, all squeezed together in a fraternal huddle, dripping with sweat beneath a burning sun, and repeats the word 'mobilization' without understanding it. A voice goes off in the crowd like a firecracker: IT'S WAR! ("La Peur" (Fear), 1930) (**fr. Higgins**)

#### GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 10:1-16)

Jesus' commissioning of the seventy-two parallels His earlier commissioning of the twelve (cf. 9:1-6). As they prepare for His visits to neighboring towns, they are to travel lightly, practice poverty, and rely on the hospitality of the

people (vv. 4-11). He prefaces this instruction, however, with weighty words worthy of serious consideration: "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest...I am sending you like lambs among wolves" (vv. 2-3).

Jesus' words here about workers applies most nearly to the constant need for priests, who, like the seventy-two, are His ambassadors. Regardless of how many strategies we may have for increasing priestly vocations, the one that matters most is simply to ask our Lord for more priests. In the final analysis, priesthood is *His* gift to give, and He will provide for us the priests we need. Secondly, and just as importantly, the best seedbed for a priestly vocation is a pious Catholic home. Fr. Higgins has mentioned this recently both from the pulpit and in the bulletin: only when young men are seriously committed to our Lord will the priesthood be a strong contender in the choice of a vocation. Otherwise, there is little incentive, given our Lord's words about the spiritual warfare awaiting them in apostolic ministry (the "wolves"). Thus, we should also pray for God's mighty protection for our priests. Perhaps we could include a short list of them in our morning offering. This is an investment with inestimable returns.

At the end of His instructions to the seventytwo, Jesus warns of the judgment awaiting towns that reject them: "it will be more tolerable for Sodom on that day than for that town<sup>"</sup> (v. 12). God destroyed the city of Sodom with fire and brimstone in Genesis 19 for its immorality. Jesus then speaks words of judgment on the Galilean towns in which He has ministered, for their failure to repent (vv. 13-15). He associates His seventy-two ambassadors with Himself remarkably closely: "Whoever listens to you listens to Me. Whoever rejects you rejects Me. And whoever rejects Me rejects the one who sent Me<sup>"</sup> (v. 16). In no way are His words to be understood differently when applied to our Holy Father and the bishops when they teach official, saving doctrine.

Today's culture is quite similar to Sodom and the first-century Galilean towns in terms of immorality and impenitence, respectively. What are we to do in the face of such opposition to the faith? We can begin by ensuring that we be as pure, meek, and innocent as lambs, to borrow Jesus' analogy from v. 3 (cf. Mt. 10:16). And, like lambs, we also need to be willing to suffer like Jesus did, i.e., to make an oblation of self. St. Peter instructs us well on these matters in his first epistle: "Maintain good conduct among the Gentiles, so that if they speak of you as evil doers, they may observe your good works and glorify God...But if you are patient when you suffer for doing what is good, this is a grace before God. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example that you should follow in His footsteps...Always be ready to give an explanation to anyone who asks you for a reason for your hope, but do it with gentleness and reverence..." (1 Pet. 2:12, 20-21, 3:15-16)

Thus, we need ensure that we are conforming our minds and hearts to the Church's teaching, not only to live virtuously, but also so that we can articulate our faith clearly.


# WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY: "THE GOSPEL OF LUKE"


# **ABOUT OUR PARISH**

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## FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

**INTROIT: Psalm 26: 1, 2** The Lord is my light and my salvation: whom shall I fear? The Lord is the protector of my life: of whom shall I be afraid? My enemies that trouble me have themselves been weakened and have fallen. *Psalm 26: 3* If armies in camp should stand together against me, my heart shall not fear. *V*. Glory be to the Father.

**COLLECT** Grant, we beseech Thee, O Lord, that the course of this world may be so peaceably ordered by Thee, that Thy Church may joyfully serve Thee in quiet devotion. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Romans 8: 18-23 Brethren, I reckon that the sufferings of this time are not worthy to be compared with the glory to come, that shall be revealed in us. For the expectation of the creature waiteth for the revelation of the sons of God. For the creature was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him that made it subject in hope; because the creature also itself shall be delivered from the servitude of corruption, into the liberty of the glory of the children of God. Now when He had ceased to speak, He said to Simon: Launch out into the deep, and let down your nets for a draught. And Simon, answering, said to Him: Master, we have laboured all the night, and have taken nothing, but at Thy word I will let down the net. And when they had done this, they enclosed a very great multitude of fishes; and their net broke: and they beckoned to their partners that were in the other ship, that they should come and help them; and they came, and filled both the ships, so that they were almost sinking. Which when Simon Peter saw, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying: Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord. For he was wholly astonished, and all that were with him, at the draught of fishes which they had taken: and so were also James and John the sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. And Jesus saith to Simon: Fear not, from henceforth thou shalt catch men. And having brought their ships to land, leaving all things they followed him.




