AUGUST IS MONTH OF THE IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY



FRONT COVER: The reliquary containing the chains which tradition says bound St. Peter when he was held prisoner by Herod Agrippa in Jerusalem and from which he was miraculously delivered by an angel (Acts of the Apostles 12:1-11). There are two chains, one of 23 links with a ring to attach the neck, and another piece of eleven links. They are venerated in the Basilica of San Pietro in Vincoli (St. Peter in Chains) in Rome. In the 1962 Missal there is a particular Mass for St. Peter's Chains celebrated on August 1st. The Collect for the Mass relates St. Peter's physical deliverance on that occasion to God's forgiveness of our sins: "O God, You broke the chains of blessed Peter to restore him safely to freedom; we pray You, break the bonds of our sins and in Your goodness keep us from all evil." IRAQI CHRISTIANS: PRAYER AND ALMSGIVING

Details of the mass expulsion of Iraqi Christians from their native home by the Islamic State continue to emerge. The London Economist reported on July 26th:

Few of the Christian women fleeing to safety in northern Iraq arrived wearing rings in their ears or on their fingers. Fighters of the Islamic State, the self-proclaimed new name of the Islamic State of Iraq and Greater Syria (ISIS), the jihadist group that captured Mosul last month, relieved them of just about everything valuable—except their lives.


A week ago the Christians in the city were told they had until July 18th to convert to Islam, pay a special tax, leave, or, in the words of a statement by the jihadists, they would have "nothing but the sword". But then the jihadists changed their mind: paying taxes was no longer an option. All Christians were told by the loudspeaker on July 18th that they had all to leave by the next day—or be killed.

The Arabic letter for N for Nassarah, meaning Christian, was spray-painted on their houses, with stencils declaring them to be "Property of the Islamic State". Monks from the monastery of Mar Behnam, near Qaraqosh, south-east of Mosul, were allowed to take only the clothes they were wearing. "You have no place here anymore," the jihadists are reported to have said...For the first time in over 1,600 years the city of Mosul will have been emptied of Christians. The Mar Behnam monastery dates from the 4th century. ("Iraq's Christians Nearly All Gone", The Economist, July 26th, 2014)

The parish Iraqi Community of Our Lady of Mesopotamia will gather for Mass here at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes on Saturday, August 16th, at 5:30 PM. This will be a special Mass of solidarity and the Community has invited other groups in the Archdiocese to join them here. This invitation is extended to the larger parish of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes as well.

In addition to the charity of prayers, the charity of alms is urgently needed. If you wish to make a donation to Iraqi Christians through the parish, please clearly mark it **FOR IRAQI CHRISTIANS**, and place it in the Collection basket or drop it off at the rectory. We will send whatever such donations we receive to the Iraqi diocese in New Jersey, and from there they will go to the rescue efforts on behalf of the destitute Christian refugees. (*Tr. Higgins*)

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 10:38-42)

€t. Luke's account of Jesus' visit to Mary and Martha's house reminds us of the joy of human friendship in our Lord's life. Christ, being the second Person of the Trinity, is relational by his very nature. But our Lord's life on earth was also characterized by

relationships: those of family and close friends with whom He could share good meals, hearty laughs, as well as pains and setbacks. Are we on that kind of wavelength with our Lord? Do we feel that at any given moment, Jesus is our close friend with whom we can share our "joys, prayers, works, and sufferings," to quote the Morning Offering?

As I wrote about in a previous bulletin, Mary and Martha are the same women from St. John's Gospel chapter 11, whose brother Lazarus Jesus raised from the dead. It is very likely that this Mary, Mary Magdalen mentioned in chapter 8, and the sinful woman mentioned anonymously in chapter 7 are all the same person.

Following the Ignatian method of reading Scripture, we can try to place ourselves within this scene, and imagine the joy of Mary, sitting at the Lord's feet, listening to Him teach, so very glad to have her close friend and Lord as the honored guest. We can also imagine the anxiety of Martha, who,

though grateful for Jesus' visit, is frustrated in her toilsome service, unaided by her sister. Martha's complaint seems legitimate: "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me by myself to do the serving? Tell her to help me" (v. 40). Rather than affirm her grievance, Jesus tries to unburden Martha of worry: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and worried about many things. There is need of only one thing. Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her" (vv. 41-42).

It is striking that Jesus critiques Martha's service, after having commended the extraordinary service of the Samaritan in the previous passage. We are not to understand from this admonition that the Lord devalues Martha's hard work. Like anyone, Jesus would surely be grateful for a well-prepared dinner and excellent hospitality. What He deems unnecessary is her worry and anxiety. We can almost hear Jesus' tone as he repeats Martha's name: a tone of correction, but also of serene reassurance.

How many times in the course of the day do we worry? We cannot help but have a healthy level of care and concern regarding various things. This, of course, is good. But to the extent that things cause us to be *preoccupied* while we are praying, or while we are spending time with family, then this is bad. Martha was preoccupied, and Jesus wanted to restore her equilibrium.

The "one thing needful" refers simply to Mary's meekness in spending quality time with Jesus. Yes, we are busy (who isn't?). But is every minute so terribly crucial that we cannot afford to "take five" and enjoy talking with the Lord? I doubt it. Being over-busy is a temptation that feeds anxiety. It can lead to idolizing our tasks and plans, which, though often important, are certainly not more important than God Himself, who gave us the faculties for accomplishing tasks in the first place. What He values above all is our love for Him, not how much we can accomplish. Mary teaches us that every minute spent with Jesus will never be in vain. Let us choose the "better part," which will never be taken from us.

And the lord commended the unjust steward, for as much as he had done wisely: for the children of this world are wiser in their generation than the children of light. And I say unto you: Make unto yourselves friends of the mammon of iniquity, that when you fail, they may receive you into everlasting dwellings."


