

# SEPTEMBER IS THE MONTH OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS



FRONT COVER: Byzantine icon of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the title of today's liturgical feast, which takes precedence over the regular Sunday Mass for the day—the 14th Sunday after Pentecost in the 1962 Missal and the 24th Sunday of the Year in the 1970 Missal.

### A FAMOUS MISQUOTATION

**A**n oft-quoted phrase of the 18th century British statesman Sir Edmund Burke is: *The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing.*" In his recent book *The Intellectual Life of Edmund Burke, From the Sublime and Beautiful to American Independence,* scholar David Bromwich reminds the reader that Burke, in fact, never said those famous words attributed to him. What he did say was this:

When bad men combine, the good must associate: else they will fall, one by one, an unpitied sacrifice in a contemptible struggle. The emphasis in the authentic quotation is on the association of good men co-operating with each other in order not only to prevent the organized evil-doing from prevailing, but also to avoid being overwhelmed as an individual by such forces. The emphasis in the more famous misquotation is on the energy of reaction.

Not surprisingly it is the authentic Burke quotation which gives us better guidance: *"when bad men combine, the good must associate..."* How might we apply the insight?

One obvious way is to apply it to our participation in the community aspects of our Catholic faith-life. The identification with a parish and the building up of a Christian community life within that parish is very clearly a way to foster good association. Towards the end of his life Fr. John Hardon, S.J., lamented that in his experience he had seen that it was very difficult for orthodox Catholics to work together. Strong personalities and strong opinions, and a sense of being in an adversarial relationship vis-à-vis the larger culture, can work against the upbuilding of stable, doctrinally sound Catholic parish communities. The "fighting-mode" is too entrenched.

Another application is to use it to counter the smug assertion people make about being *"spiritual, but not religious"*. How they love to dredge up the sins of "organized religion", but they never give a fair-shake to the good deeds which the social reality of the Church makes possible. If it is difficult enough for people in the Church to hold firm and find their way when the combination of bad men has reached critical mass, what chance do all the spiritual individuals have on their own? They fit very well Edmund Burke's prediction:

They will fall, one by one, an unpitied sacrifice in a contemptible struggle.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 12:1-12)

Deaving triggered the hatred of the Pharisees (cf. 11:53-54), Jesus then speaks to His disciples, bolstering their confidence in the face of future persecutions and martyrdoms. We do well to remember that it is not abnormal if we encounter rudeness, hostility, or

difficulty of some kind when seeking to share our faith in word and deed. We can find encouragement in Jesus' words for our own situation.

The first step Jesus lays out for His disciples is for them to avoid "the leaven- that is, the hypocrisy- of the Pharisees" (v. 1). If the apostles were to be faithful in their ministry, they needed purity of heart (cf. Mt. 5:8). Likewise, if we are to have credibility as followers of Jesus, we need to be purged of this sin, too, lest it inflate our ego to an unmanageable size.

Jesus then enjoins upon them boldness in their presentation of His word: "There is nothing concealed that will not be revealed...what you have whispered behind closed doors will be proclaimed on the housetops" (vv. 2-3). Jesus seems already to be alluding to their hiding out in the Upper Room "for fear of the Jews," and yet, after the Resurrection, their patient and prayerful waiting for the Holy Spirit also (cf. Jn. 20:19, Acts 1:13-14; 2:1-11). He continues: "I tell you, my friends, do not be afraid of those who kill the body but after that can do no more...Be afraid of the one who, after killing, has the power to cast into Gehenna" (vv. 4-5). As the commentaries indicate, God is the one being referred to here, not the devil. The irreversible destiny of our immortal soul is of far greater importance than the temporal fate of our mortal body. We should have a greater reverential fear for God as our Judge, rather than for our enemies.


Iesus assures the disciples of God's providence with tender imagery of His care for sparrows, and of His knowledge of the most minute details of our lives, such as the number of hairs on our head (vv. 6-7). God is sovereign, not the Church's persecutors. On this basis, Jesus again shifts the disciples' attention to the importance of one's status before Him on the Day of Judgment: "I tell you, everyone who acknowledges Me before others the Son of Man will acknowledge before the angels of God." He also presents the chilling possibility of the converse: "But whoever denies Me before others will be denied before the angels of God" (vv. 8-9). One can imagine St. Peter's fright and shame, recalling these words as he wept bitterly after denying the Lord (cf. 22:62). Authentic repentance, of course, can change such a fate, as it did for St. Peter.

In this vein, Jesus speaks about blasphemy and forgiveness: "[e]veryone who speaks a word against the Son of Man will be forgiven, but the one who blasphemes against the Holy Spirit will not be forgiven<sup>"</sup> (v. 10). St. Augustine teaches that "impenitence," or the stubborn refusal to repent constitutes the unforgivable sin of blasphemy against the Holy Spirit. Likewise, it was not entirely clear to everyone that Jesus was the Christ when He walked the earth, as the notes in the Orthodox Study Bible explain. After the Resurrection, however, the Holy Spirit opened peoples' eyes to the truth through the preaching of the Gospel, so that they might repent (cf. Acts 2:22-41). In view of this, Jesus promises the Holy Spirit to His apostles in vv. 11-12 for testifying to the truth. God respects man's freedom to reject Him, but He greatly desires man's contrition and repentance (Ez. 18:23).




Mary's Mantle Prayer Shawl Ministry: <u>TODAY!</u>

## EXALTATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

**INTROIT:** Galatians 6: 14 But it behooves us to glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ: in whom is our salvation, life, and resurrection; by whom we are saved and delivered. *Psalm* 66: 2 May God have mercy on us, and bless us; may He cause the light of His countenance to shine upon us, and may He have mercy on us. *V*. Glory be to the Father.

**COLLECT** O God, who year by year dost gladden us by the feast of the Exaltation of the holy Cross: we beseech Thee, grant unto us, who on earth have known its mystery, to be found worthy to enjoy the rewards of its redemption in heaven. Through the same our Lord Jesus Christ.

**GRADUAL:** Philip 2: 8-9 Christ became obedient for us unto death: even the death of the cross. *V*. Wherefore God also hath exalted Him, and had given Him a name which is above every name. ALLELUIA: Alleluia, Alleluia. *V*. Sweet the wood, sweet the nails, sweet the load that hangs thereon: for thou alone, O holy Cross, wast worthy to bear the King and Lord of heaven. Alleluia.

Jesus therefore said to them: Yet a little while, the light is among you. Walk whilst you have the light, that the darkness overtake you not. And he that walketh in darkness knoweth not whither he goeth. Whilst you have the light, believe in the light; that you may be the children of light.




