

VISITING A CEMETERY:

THE PLENARY INDULGENCE CAN BE GAINED ON EACH ONE OF THESE EIGHT DAYS. THE INDULGENCE IS APPLICABLE ONLY TO THE SOULS IN PURGATORY. ON OTHER DAYS OF THE YEAR THIS INDULGENCE IS A PARTIAL ONE.

REMEMBER THE DEAD

In a recent book entitled *Death and the Afterlife* by Samuel Scheffler, the author uses the concept of "afterlife" to refer to what happens to humanity here on earth after we're gone, and why that's important for us to hold on to in order to give meaning to our short existence. He takes it as a given that that there is no such thing as a supernatural afterlife as religious faith conceives of it and so there is no use even bothering to refute it. "Scheffler is assuming that we, like him, are good atheists," says one of his reviewers. (Amia Srinivasan, "After the Meteor Strike", London Review of Books, 25 September 2014.)

This total, numb disbelief in any personal survival after the event of bodily death is, as we know, very widespread. How could it be otherwise unless people have a strong, vital religious faith in a God who "is not God of the dead, but of the living"? (Matthew 22:32) We Catholic Christians affirm the immortality of the individual soul, the continuation of a person's life in the state of eternity, and the resurrection of the body because we believe that God has clearly revealed those truths to the world. (It is very important to pay attention to the words of the Creed we are saying every Sunday and Holy Day at Mass.) We don't believe it because we can appeal to any proof in nature. Religious believers very frequently experience a sense of their loved ones' continued existence in the life beyond the grave-through dreams, signal memories, an outcome which has the unmistakable mark of that person's care and presence, and the like. They have these experiences not because they are out of touch with reality, but because they are open to the grace of the Communion of Saints.

It is a sad enough thing to disbelieve in God and so conclude that death is oblivion. Sadder still is to block off all grace of the faithful departed. Remember our dead!

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH





GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 13:1-9)

As often happens with famous people, crowds want to hear how they might answer a juicy question posed to them. In chapter 13, some people in the crowds ask Jesus to comment upon a sacrilegious act of Pontius Pilate, in which he slaughtered some Galileans and mixed their

blood with the Jewish animal sacrifices. Jesus does not address the situation, and instead, speaks to issues of guilt and repentance. In vv. 2-3, He asks them the following: "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!" Jesus reinforces His point by referring to another fatal occurrence, explaining that those who died were not guiltier than those who lived, again citing the need for repentance on the part of all.

Jesus had just spoken about repentance and judgment at the end of chapter 12, yet the people did not appear to see the relevance of such a teaching. Their logic, as the commentaries explain, was the following: Since no grave evil had befallen them, they saw no need for repentance for themselves, whereas the others who died *must* have needed to repent, since they were obviously being "punished."

What Christ teaches, as Tannehill notes in his commentary on St. Luke, is that tragedy does *not* serve as a comparative measure for determining levels of innocence or guilt. Every person needs to be converted, regardless of his circumstances.

As He so often does, Jesus tells a parable to illustrate His point. In this parable of the barren fig tree, we can see God's justice as well as His patience with sinners: "There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?' He said to him in reply, 'Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future. If not, you can cut it down."

As the owner is understandably frustrated at the fruitless plant, and would be completely justified in cutting it down, so also is God's judgment against sinful man completely just. At the same time, just as the gardener advocates on behalf of the tree and is willing to give it further opportunity for growth, so also is God super-abundantly patient with us, especially when we do not deserve it. He eagerly gives us abundant means for authentic conversion. St. Paul teaches us that God "wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4). One could also see Our Lady, the Saints, and our Guardian Angels as an extension of the advocacy of the gardener, for they constantly mediate on our behalf. All of this should console us, especially when the devil tempts us to think that our sufferings are vindictive stirrings of a capricious God.

St. Gregory the Great sees in the three years a symbolic application to the three ages of salvation history: the first year represents the age prior to the Law, the second year represents the age of the giving of the Law, and the third year represents the age of grace in the Church. We have the extremely good fortune of living in the third age! Let us take full advantage of *all* the means of grace Christ gives us in his Church and become fruitful disciples (cf. Jn. 15:1-17).


FOOD DRIVE to help the Newton Food Pantry November 1st-16th

LATIN MASS TEXTS: 21st Sunday after Pentecost

INTROIT: Esther 13: 9, 10-11 All things are in Thy will, O Lord; and there is none that can resist Thy will: for Thou hast made all things, heaven and earth, and all things that are under the cope of heaven: Thou art Lord of all. *Psalm 118: 1* Blessed are the undefiled in the way; who walk in the law of the Lord. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Lord, we pray Thee, keep Thy household the Church in continual godliness; that through Thy protection it may be free from all adversities, and devoutly given to good works, to the glory of Thy holy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Ephesians 6: 10-17 Brethren: Be strengthened in the Lord, and in the might of His power. Put you on the armour of God, that you may be able to stand against the deceits of the devil. Therefore, take unto you the armour of God, that you may be able to resist in the evil day, and to stand in all things perfect; stand therefore having your loins girt about with truth, and having on the breastplate of justice, and your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace; in all things taking the shield of faith, wherewith you may be able to extinguish all the fiery darts of the most wicked one. And take unto you the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit which is the word of God.

But that servant falling down, besought him saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And the lord of that servant, being moved with pity, let him go, and forgave him the debt. But when that servant was gone out, he found one of his fellow-servants that owed him a hundred pence: and laying hold of him, he throttled him, saying: Pay what thou owest. And his fellow-servant falling down besought him, saying: Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all. And he would not; but went and cast him into prison till he paid the debt. Now his fellow-servants, seeing what was done, were very much grieved; and they came and told their lord all that was done. Then his lord called him, and saith to him: Thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all the debt, because thou besoughtest me; shouldst not thou then have had compassion also on thy fellow-servant, even as I had compassion on thee? And his lord being angry delivered him to the torturers until he paid all the debt. So also shall my heavenly Father do to you, if you forgive not every one his brother from your hearts. 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
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

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
