

Pastor's Note

"THE DAWN FROM ON HIGH SHALL BREAK UPON US"

This Advent Bishop James Conley of Lincoln, Nebraska announced that in his Cathedral Church the priests would celebrate the Mass *ad orientem*, that is, "facing east" and not facing the people in the congregation as has become the custom since the 1960s, He explained the meaning of this Advent change:

Since ancient times Christians have faced the east during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass to remember to keep watch for Christ. Even in Churches that did not face the east, the priest and people stood together in the Mass, gazing at Christ on the crucifix, on the altar and in the tabernacle, to recall the importance of watching for His return. The symbolism of the priest and people facing "ad orientem"—to the east—is an ancient reminder of the coming of Christ.

More recently, it has become common for the priest and people to face one another during the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The priest stands behind the altar as he consecrates the Eucharist, facing the people. The people see the face of the priest as he prays, and he sees their faces. These positions have important symbolism too. They can remind us that we are a community—one body in Christ. And they can remind us that the Eucharist, at the center of the assembly, should also be at the center of our families, and our lives.

But the symbolism of facing together, and awaiting Christ, is rich, time-honored, and important. Especially during Advent, as we await the coming of the Lord, facing east together—even symbolically facing Christ together at the altar and on the crucifix—is a powerful witness to Christ's imminent return. Today, at a time when it is easy to forget that Christ is coming—and easy to be complacent in our spiritual lives and in the work of evangelization—we need reminders that Christ will come....

In the "ad orientem" posture at Mass, the priest will not be facing away from the people. He will be with them—among them, and leading them—facing Christ, and waiting for His return. "Be watchful!" says Jesus. "Be alert! You do not know when the time will come." … May we "face the east" together, watching for Christ in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and in our lives. KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH

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GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 14:15-24) By David Allen

As Jesus continues teaching during dinner at a Pharisee's house, one of His fellow dinner guests exclaims, "Blessed is the one who will dine in the kingdom of God" (v. 15). We would make such an exclamation, too, if we were to take the time to consider Jesus' words seriously, and to

contemplate the eternal happiness of heaven. Sadly, we can be distracted from this goal all too easily through the excuses of sin (cf. Ps. 141:4). We can even risk losing heaven entirely through mortal sin. Jesus' parable of the great feast addresses this sobering reality.

Jesus tells of a king who throws a huge dinner party, and invites many (vv. 16-17). In modern times, if we were invited to dine with an important political figure or a celebrity, we would likely go without much hesitation. It's a big deal! Curiously, the people in the parable all make excuses: business, personal assets, family matters (vv. 18-20). Imagine how insulting it would be to refuse an invitation to dinner with Pope Francis, because you would rather spend time in a Roman café with friends, or because you felt it would be a more profitable use of time to meet with your financial advisor to discuss taxes! Making excuses is foolish behavior.

The dinner party in this parable represents heaven, and the master represents God, who invites many. As St. Paul teaches us, God "wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4). This does not mean that everyone will be saved, but rather, that all are invited. God respects the freedom of the recipients of His invitation to make their excuses. Hell, or eternal exclusion from the banquet, is a free choice (v. 24). The master in the parable is angered at the behavior of those whom he invited, and proceeds to issue an order to his servants to bring impoverished and sick people into the banquet (v. 21). After doing this, the master repeats his request with greater insistence, desiring that his "home may be filled" (v. 23). We see here the generosity of God, who lovingly bestows the honor of His friendship on any and all, making no distinction between poor and rich. The master in this parable exemplifies the kind of generosity to the poor that Jesus had recommended to His dinner host earlier (cf. vv.12-14).

As we celebrate Advent and Christmas, we are conscious of the need to be ready for Christ' second coming. We must examine ourselves to see if we are making excuses in sin, and then go to Confession. As St. John Chrysostom exhorts us, "Enter the Church and repent...for here is the physician, not the judge. Here one is not investigated, one receives remission of sins." The Collect for Wednesday of the Second Week of Advent is a helpful meditation in this regard:

"Almighty God, who command us to prepare the way for Christ the Lord, grant in Your kindness, we pray, that no infirmity may weary us as we long for the comforting presence of our heavenly physician. Who lives and reigns with You in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen."

On the basis of this kind of prayer during Advent, we can approach Our Lord on Christmas, and pray this Collect:

"O God, who gladden us year by year as we wait in hope for our redemption, grant that, just as we joyfully welcome Your Only Begotten Son as our Redeemer, we may also merit to face Him confidently when He comes again as our Judge. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen."
