A CORRECTION

In one of my recent Pastor's Notes I wrote about Pope Francis's consoling words to a little boy whose dog had died. In his column All Things Catholic John Allen set the record straight. On November 27th, Pope Francis gave a talk about redemption and said it means, "the bringing of all things into the fullness of being." An Italian newspaper speculated that Pope Francis was including pets in that redemption, and quoted a famous line from Pope Paul VI to a boy who had lost his dog that "we will see our animals again in heaven." Like a game of "telephone", as the story reached the English-language media it was reported that Pope Francis had spoken the line to the grieving boy. "From there it was a short leap," Mr. Allen writes, "to styling it as another example of a maverick pontiff breaking the mold. Once again, a great story with the small flaw of being factually wrong." (John Allen: With Pope Francis the Hype often Misses the Mark, Boston Globe, December 28th, 2014.)

OCTAVE OF CHRISTIAN UNITY

Each year from January 18th-25th the Church observes an Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. The Prayer Octave begins and ends on feasts of the Princes of the Apostles, Peter and Paul. January 18th was formerly observed as the Feast of St. Peter's Chair at Rome (now it is on February 22nd) and January 25th is the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. Let us join our prayers to the intentions of this Octave: for the true unity of all who call themselves Christians in faith and charity.

KNOW YOUR CATHOLIC FAITH

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GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 15:8-10)

The parable of the lost coin, the second in a series of three parables in Luke 15, replicates both the substance of the first (the parable of the lost sheep), as well as its concluding refrain about rejoicing. In vv. 8-10, Jesus says the following: "Or what woman having ten coins and losing one

would not light a lamp and sweep the house, searching carefully until she finds it? And when she does find it, she calls together her friends and neighbors and says to them, 'Rejoice with me because I have found the coin that I lost.' In just the same way, I tell you, there will be rejoicing among the Angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Most of us can relate to the woman's situation in the second parable. Perhaps we have lost something valuable once- a ring, a gem, an important document, a priceless memento from a grandparent- and we were at our wit's end scouring around for it until we found it. In the parable, the woman's coin was more than a mere numismatic rarity. According to the notes in the Ignatius Study Bible, one coin represented a day's wages. Our families and friends would not be overly concerned if we misplaced a favorite earring or tie clip, but they would be concerned if we lost the money from our paycheck in an online bank account scam. They would likewise rejoice with us if the situation was rectified and our money returned.

The determination with which the woman sought the coin is an image to us of how highly God values man and goes in search of him. In response to the Pharisees' criticism about sinners (v. 2), Christ's parables demonstrate that not even one human being is worth losing, no matter how immoral that person may be. God will do all in his power to provide sufficient graces for their salvation, and will wait eagerly for their response of faith and repentance.

In his commentary on this passage, St. John Chrysostom delves into the deeper meaning of the analogy of coins. Christ compares man to coins, for just as coins bear the stamp of the emperor, and therein have value, so also does every human being have innate dignity and intrinsic value by reason of their being made in the image and likeness of God.

In his Eucharistic Prayer for the Byzantine Divine Liturgy, St. John Chrysostom acclaims God for his untiring efforts in saving mankind, very much in the spirit of this parable:

"You brought us forth from non-existence into being, and raised us up again when we had fallen, and left nothing undone until You had brought us to heaven and bestowed upon us Your future kingdom."

The tone in this liturgical text is a joyful one, paralleling the rejoicing at the conclusion of these Lucan parables.

If, after we leave the confessional, we are sometimes tempted to hold onto the guilt of our sins, we should try our best to think on the determination and the joy of Our Lord, who spares no effort in finding us, and rejoices greatly once he has. We should likewise think about the joy of our Guardian Angels, whom Christ has told us rejoice at our homecoming (vv. 7, 10).

Rejoice with them that rejoice, weep with them that weep: being of one mind towards one another; not minding high things, but consenting to the humble.

And the wine failing, the mother of Jesus saith to Him: They have no wine. And Jesus saith to her: Woman, what is that to Me and to Thee? My hour is not yet come. His mother saith to the waiters: Whatsoever He shall say to you, do ye. Now there were set six water-pots of stone, according to the manner of the purifying of the Jews, containing two or three measures apiece*. Jesus saith to them: Fill the water-pots with water. And they filled them up to the brim. And Jesus said to them: Draw out now, and carry to the chief steward of the feast. And they carried it. And when the chief steward had tasted the water made wine, and knew not whence it was, but the waiters knew who had drawn the water: the chief steward calleth the bridegroom, and saith to him: Every man at first setteth forth good wine: and when men have well drunk, then that which is worse: but thou hast kept the good wine until now. This beginning of miracles did Jesus in Cana of Galilee; and manifested His glory, and His disciples believed in Him.


ABOUT OUR PARISH

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
