

however, baffles. This window depicts the religious profession of St. Brigid, the secondary patron saint of Ireland, at the hands of the Bishop Saint Mel, who was one of the disciples of St. Patrick. The pairing of these windows reflects the Irish-Catholic pride of Father Danahy the pastor who oversaw the building of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes Church in 1909-1910.

St. Brigid founded her monastery at Kildare and took an active part with Bishop Conleth in preaching the Gospel. Veneration of St. Brigid at one time had spread to Europe as well as in Ireland. She died about the year A.D. 525. In her Mass and Office, we find the following Collect:

Lord, You inspired in Saint Brigid such wholehearted dedication to Your work that she is known as Mary of the Gael; through her intercession bless our country; may we follow the example of her life and be united with her and the Virgin Mary in Your presence. Through Christ Our Lord. Amen.

GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 16:1-13)

Most of us can agree that the parable of the dishonest steward, as well as its application, are not entirely clear upon a first reading. In the previous parable, the prodigal son squanders his inheritance, but repents and is forgiven. In this parable, however, the man caught

"squandering" his master's money (v. 1), is *not* repentant, yet is "commended" by his master for his shrewdness in handling his exit from the job (v. 8). What can this possibly mean?

The thrust of what the dishonest steward did is this: even after being caught mismanaging his master's money, he cheats him one last time by lowering the debts owed by certain of the master's clients (vv. 5-7). He does this so that he can elicit favors from them later. As he explains, "...when I am removed from the stewardship, they may welcome me into their homes" (v. 4). The master praises the steward's crafty plan for avoiding destitution.

Christ comments upon this strange parable with the following exhortation to the twelve in vv. 8 -9: "For the children of this world are more prudent in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. I tell you, make friends for yourselves with dishonest wealth, so that when it fails, you will be welcomed into eternal dwellings." Jesus is not asking His disciples to commit fraud. "Dishonest wealth" is just an idiom for money, and refers back to the money in the parable that the steward used in a *dishonest way*.

The point of the steward's shrewdness is this: if he was eager enough to cheat his master and loose the debts of the poor in a dishonest way- and just to get a roof over his head for a short while- so much the more should Christ's disciples be eager in dispensing their money to the poor for the sake of heavenly rewards. As Theophylact explains in his commentary on this passage, man instinctively prepares for his future in temporal matters, but not sufficiently in eternal ones.

Jesus' instruction is similar to His earlier exhortation in 14:12-14, where He recommends generosity to the poor in view of heavenly rewards. Unlike money, the charity done towards the poor will last forever, and plays a crucial role in our entrance into heaven. As Jesus goes on to explain in vv. 10-12, faithfulness with money should always be exercised with a view towards the weightier rewards of heaven. Similarly, as Jesus' parable in Mt. 25:31-46 indicates, service to the poor is service to Him, and is not limited to almsgiving. It includes all the spiritual and corporal works of mercy, which even the poorest can practice.

Catholics believe that good works springing from the supernatural virtue of charity are integral to meriting heaven (cf. Catechism nos. 2006-2011). These works are never disconnected from Christ's grace, but are extensions of His kingship in the world. God has created us for these good works, and chief among them is almsgiving (cf. Eph. 2:10; Catechism nos. 1434, 2447).

Jesus concludes His teaching on these matters with the following challenge in v. 13: "No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and mammon." In other words, greed (the service of mammon) is a form of idolatry. Jesus is not critiquing the necessary and daily prudence with which we must manage our finances. Rather, Jesus addresses the sinful tendency to grasp onto money, i.e., greed. As we near Lent, let us be in our guard against this sin, and seek to make an

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almsgiving plan to which we can reasonably commit for all of Lent.

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LATIN MASS PROPERS: SEPTUAGESIMA SUNDAY

INTROIT: Ps. 17. 5, 6, 7 The sorrows of death surrounded me, the of hell encompassed me: and in my affliction I called upon the Lord, and He heard my voice from His holy Temple *Psalm 17. 2-3* I will love Thee, O Lord, my strength: the Lord is my firmament, my refuge, and my deliverer. *V.* Glory be to the Father. **COLLECT** Graciously hear, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the prayers of Thy people, that we who are justly afflicted for our sins, may be mercifully delivered by Thy goodness for the glory of Thy name. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: I Corinthians 9. 24-27; 10. 1-5 Brethren: Know you not that they that run in the race, all run indeed, but one receiveth the prize? So run that you may obtain. And every one that striveth for the mastery refraineth himself from all things: and they indeed that they may receive a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible one. I therefore so run, not as at an uncertainty; I so fight, not as one beating the air: but I chastise my body, and bring it into subjection, lest perhaps when I have preached to others, I myself should become a castaway. For I would not have you ignorant, brethren, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all in Moses were baptized, in the cloud and in the sea: and all did eat the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink: (and they drank of the spiritual rock that followed them: and the rock was Christ). But with most of them God was not well pleased.

GRADUAL: Psalm 9. 10-11, 19-20 A helper in due time in tribulation: let them trust in Thee who know Thee: for Thou hast not forsaken them that seek Thee, O Lord. *V*. For the poor man shall not be forgotten to the end: the patience of the poor shall not perish forever: arise, O Lord, let no man prevail. **TRACT:** Psalm 129. 1-4 Out of the depths I have cried to Thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice *V*. Let Thine ears be attentive to the prayer of Thy servant. *V*. If Thou, O Lord, wilt mark iniquities: O Lord: O Lord, who shall abide it? *V*. For with Thee there is merciful forgiveness, and by reason of Thy law I have waited for Thee, O Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 20. 1-16 At that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of heaven is like to a householder who went out early in the morning to hire labourers into His vineyard. And having agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the market place idle, and he said to them: Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just. And they went their way. And again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour: and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: Why stand you here all the day idle? They say to him: Because no man hath hired us. He saith to them: Go you also into my vineyard. And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith to his steward: Call the labourers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first. When therefore they were come that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: and they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us that have borne the burden of the day and the heats. But he answering said to one of them: Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what it is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thy eye evil, because I am good? So shall the last be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen.

OFFERTORY: Ps. 91. 2 It is good to give praise to the Lord, and to sing to Thy name, O Most High. **SECRET** Having received our offerings and prayers, we beseech Thee, O Lord, cleanse us by these heavenly mysteries, and graciously hear us. Through our Lord.

COMMUNION: Ps. 30. 17-18 Make Thy face to shine upon Thy servant, and save me in Thy mercy: let me not be confounded, O Lord, for I have called upon Thee.




ABOUT OUR PARISH
