# **Pastor's Note**

# PILGRIMAGES TO JERUSALEM: THE TEMPLE OF SOLOMON

(This is a summary of my First Conference for our Lenten Mission series held during the Stations of the Cross on Friday nights.)

Our Lenten Mission for this Year of 2015 is entitled "Pilgrimages to Jerusalem". Pilgrimage to the Holy City of Jerusalem is an

important part of sacred history in both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible. It is also overlain with a higher, mystical significance: "pilgrimage" is an image of our life on earth; "Jerusalem" is an image of the dwelling of God, that is, the paradise of Heaven.

We first encounter Jerusalem with the appearance of a King and priest named Melchisedech in the 14th Chapter of Genesis, who is the King of Salem. He goes to meet Abram/Abraham after a great battle victory. Bringing bread and wine, Melchisedech blesses Abram and Abram gives him a tenth of all his goods. St. Paul and the Fathers of the Early Church saw in Melchisedech a figure of Jesus Christ. Like Christ, Melchisedech is both king and priest; he brings gifts of bread and wine (a foreshadowing of the Holy Eucharist), and he has no origin or lineage, suggesting an eternal priesthood. Melchisedech's name means "King of Justice" and the name of his kingdom "Salem" means "peace". Jesus Christ is indeed the "King of Justice" and where He dwells, it is the *Ur-salim*, or, as we translate it, "Jerusalem".

When King David conquered the heights of Jerusalem, which had been occupied by the heathen Jebusite tribe, he brought up to Mount Moriah the famous Ark of the Covenant which had accompanied the Israelites since the time of their 40-year sojourn in the desert. To his son and successor Solomon fell the task of building a magnificent Temple with an inner sanctuary called the "Holy of Holies" to house the Ark. All this took place about 1,000 years before the birth of Christ.

The Temple was, sadly, disfigured by sin and idolatry long before its destruction by fire at the hands of the King of Babylon. Among the faithful remnant who survived, however, the memory of the Divine Presence on the Temple Mount of Jerusalem, the "City of Peace" would not be lost. The longing for it would only grow stronger with each passing generation: a visible sign of the Kingdom of God. (Fr. Higgins)

# GOSPEL OF SAINT LUKE BIBLE STUDY (Luke 17:11-19)

ne of the hidden benefits of fasting and abstinence in Lent is the cultivation of thankfulness. When we fast and abstain from lawful pleasures, we become more keenly aware of possessing these things in the first place, along with many other things for which we often

forget to verbalize our thanks. When we come to this awareness, we should follow the prompting of the Holy Spirit and make a simple act of thanksgiving in our prayers. Time and again, the Psalms tell us that explicitly thanking God is an exceedingly *good* thing for us to do.

In the episode of the cleansing of the ten lepers, the issue of thanksgiving is prominent. Having besought Jesus for mercy for their debilitating and socially ostracizing disease, Jesus tells them, "Go show yourselves to the priests" (v. 14). This simple command is in accord with the Mosaic Law, which prescribes that those who are healed of leprosy show themselves to the priest, who inspects them in order to certify their healing publicly (cf. Lev. 14:2-32). Jesus elicits from the lepers an act of faith via an act of obedience, that is, they are to respond to His command as if they were already healed. Rather than perform a complex healing

ritual, he gives a simple command, much like the prophet Elisha with Naaman the Syrian (cf. 2 Kings 5). As Jesus explains at the end of the episode, "your faith has saved you" (v. 19). In other words, their faith was instrumental for receiving divine grace and healing.

Curiously, only one leper returns to thank Jesus, once he realizes that he has been cleansed (v. 15). St. Luke notes in v. 16 that the leper "fell at the feet of Jesus." Kneeling is an act of humility, thanksgiving, and worship. St. Peter kneels before Jesus after the miraculous catch of fish (cf. Luke 5:8). St. Luke also notes in v. 16 that the man "was a Samaritan," which is a striking detail, for Samaritans hated Jews (and vice versa). This is an important example of Jesus' mission reaching beyond the confines of the people of Israel, a particularly important truth for St. Luke's mixed Jewish-Gentile audience. God's grace can transcend all human boundaries, even the seemingly insurmountable ones, and it always calls upon us to render him our thanks.

The following prayer, entitled the "General Thanksgiving," is taken from the Daily Office of the Book of Common Prayer, and subsequently approved by the Holy See for use in the liturgical books of the Anglican Use Parishes. It is a comprehensive prayer that gives God explicit thanks for everything He so generously bestows upon us. I have prayed this prayer since boyhood, and I humbly submit it for your consideration and devotion this Lent:

"Almighty God, Father of all mercies, we Thine unworthy servants do give Thee most humble and hearty thanks for all Thy goodness and loving-kindness to us and to all men. We bless Thee for our creation, preservation, and all the blessings of this life; but above all for Thine inestimable love in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ, for the means of grace, and for the hope of glory. And, we beseech Thee, give us that due sense of all Thy mercies, that our hearts may be unfeignedly thankful; and that we show forth Thy praise, not only with our lips, but in our lives, by giving up ourselves to Thy service, and by walking before Thee in holiness and righteousness all our days; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with Thee and the Holy Ghost, be all honor and glory, world without end. Amen."

each Friday during Lent, with a Sermon, Holy Communion outside of Mass and Exposition and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.


Fr. Higgins' sermon series for this year is entitled:

# LATIN MASS PROPERS: SECOND SUNDAY IN LENT

INTROIT: Psalm 24: 6, 3, 22 Remember, O Lord, Thy depths of compassion, and Thy mercies that are from the beginning of the world, lest at any time our enemies rule over us: deliver us, O God of Israel, from all our tribulations. *Psalm 24: 1-2* To Thee, O Lord, have I lifted up my soul: in Thee, O my God, I put my trust; let me not be ashamed. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT: O God, who seest that we have no power whatever from ourselves; keep us both outwardly in our bodies and inwardly in our souls; that we may be defended from all adversities which may happen to the body and from all evil thoughts which may hurt the soul. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: 1 Thessalonians 4: 1-7 Brethren: We pray and beseech you in the Lord Jesus that, as you have received from us, how you ought to walk and to please God, so also you would walk, that you may abound the more. For you know what precepts I have given to you by the Lord Jesus. For this is the will of God, your sanctification: that you should abstain from fornication, that every one of you should know how to possess his vessel in sanctification and honour; not in the passion of lust, like the Gentiles that know not God: and that no man overreach nor circumvent his brother in business: because the Lord is the avenger of all these things, as we have told you before and have testified. For God hath not called us unto uncleanness, but unto sanctification: in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GRADUAL: Psalm 24: 17-18 The troubles of my heart are multiplied: deliver me from my necessities, O Lord. *V.* See my abjection and my labour, and forgive me all my sins. TRACT: Psalm 105: 1-4 Give glory to the Lord, for He is good: for His mercy endureth for ever. *V.* Who shall declare the powers of the Lord: who shall set forth all His praises? V. Blessed are they that keep judgment and do justice at all times. *V.* Remember us, O Lord, in the favour of Thy people: visit us with Thy salvation.

GOSPEL: Matthew 17: 1-9 **A**t that time Jesus taketh Peter and James, and John his brother, and bringeth them up into a high mountain apart: and He was transfigured before them. And His face did shine as the sun: and His garments became white as snow. And behold there appeared to them Moses and Elias talking with Him. And Peter answering, said to Jesus: Lord, it is good for us to be here: if Thou wilt, let us make here three tabernacles, one for Thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias. And as He was yet speaking, behold a bright cloud overshadowed them. And lo, a voice out of the cloud, saying: This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased: hear ye Him. And the disciples hearing, fell upon their face and were very much afraid. And Jesus came and touched them, and said to them: Arise, and fear not. And they lifting up their eyes saw no one, but only Jesus. And as they came down from the mountain, Jesus charged them, saying: Tell the vision to no man till the Son of Man be risen from the dead.

OFFERTORY: Psalm 118: 47, 18 I will meditate on Thy commandments, which I have loved exceedingly: and I will lift up my hands to Thy commandments, which I have loved.

SECRET: Peacefully look down, we beseech Thee, O Lord, upon these sacrifices, that they may both increase our devotion and contribute to our salvation. Through our Lord.
