


Parish Mission Statement

Pastor's Note



WATERLOO, NAPOLEON, AND THE CURE D'ARS

Chis year 2015 is the bicentennial of one of history's great battles: the Battle of Waterloo. On June 18th, 1815, the French military-dictatorturned-emperor Napoleon

Bonaparte suffered a complete defeat near the village of Waterloo, in the present-day country of Belgium, at the hands of the British and Allied forces. A few weeks ago a tremendous battle re-enactment took place there as part of the bicentennial commemorations. Waterloo has entered into popular understanding as a symbol of overreach and grand ambition thwarted. When it's said that somebody has had his "Waterloo", it means that, like Napoleon, somebody has been pulled off his high-horse.

This year is also the bicentennial of the priestly ordination of St. Jean Marie Baptiste Vianney, the "Cure" (that is, the Pastor) of Ars. As the deposed Napoleon was underway on a British navy ship to exile on the island of St. Helena in the South Atlantic off the coast of Africa, the 29 yr. old, five-foot-one deacon Vianney was preparing for his ordination and First Mass.

He was ordained at the Grand Seminaire in Grenoble—alone, without friends or relatives to watch. France was under military occupation, propping up the restored Bourbon monarchy. He offered his First Mass privately, on a sidealtar, with two Austrian military chaplains offering their daily Masses on adjacent altars. Three years later, in 1818, he was sent to be the pastor of the farm commune of Ars, outside the city of Lyons, a parish of 260 souls. Nobody else wanted to go there and M. Vianney was thought to be too incompetent for anything else. When the vicar-general gave him his assignment he said: "There is not much love of God in that parish: you will put it there."

And that is just what St. Jean-Marie Baptiste Vianney, the Cure of Ars did. His labored in that little parish for the rest of his life until his death on August 4th, 1859. After ten days of mourning he was buried on the Vigil of the Assumption, just after the 44th anniversaries of his priestly ordination and his First Mass.

By the end of his life people were coming from all over France to make pilgrimage to Ars, to see this priest who was so clearly a Man of God. By miraculous means God gave unction to the Cure of Ars to survive with little food and little sleep so as to make him able to hear people's Confessions for up to 15 hours a day! At the height of the phenomenon which was the "Pilgrimage to Ars" the wait-time for pilgrims to make their confessions to the Cure was seven days. When a pilgrim came to Ars he got a ticket with a number.

And what was the secret of his success? There was none: he wasn't trying to be successful. He had no pastoral plan. He was not trying to launch any program or use any method to coax people back to church. He was simply a priest: prayer, the Sacraments, the Mass, preaching the basic truths of the Gospel, teaching the truths of the faith. And because he himself was a simple, good man God's grace shone through him, and used him as an instrument of conversion for many thousands of souls in his generation.

We can worry a lot about the Church's weakness in the present day: how powerless it is in the political arena, how far from God our society seems, but that worry is not of God. Our worry should be centered about being converted to God, each of us, personally, and to respond to that real faith projected so humbly and so compellingly by the holy Cure of Ars.

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 22: 31-34

As we continue in our study of St. Luke's Last Supper discourses, we come now to a particularly significant exchange between Our Lord and St. Peter in vv. 31-34: "Simon, Simon, behold Satan has demanded to sift all of you like wheat, but I have prayed that your own faith may not fail; and once you have turned back,

you must strengthen your brothers.' He said to Him, 'Lord, I am prepared to go to prison and to die with You.' But He replied, 'I tell you, Peter, before the cock crows this day, you will deny three times that you know Me.'"

Jesus' words here follow immediately upon His promise to the twelve, that they will "sit on thrones judging the twelve tribes of Israel" (v. 30). In fact, it is precisely due to the Apostles' importance as pillars of the Church that the devil wants to sift them as wheat.

We have heard about wheat sifting before. St. John the Baptist uses it as a metaphor for the just judgment of God (cf. Mt. 3:12, Lk. 3:17). As the commentary in the Ignatius Study Bible indicates, wheat sifting involves jabbing at a clump of wheat with a pitchfork and throwing it into the air. In so doing, the wind blows the chaff away, while the wheat falls to the ground. In his commentary, St. Bede the Venerable understands the wheat sifting to mean that the devil will "shake" and "tempt" the Apostles. In his commentary on St. Luke, Robert Tannehill explains the image similarly: the Apostles "will be shaken up so as to reveal the chaff that is still mixed with the good grain" (Tannehill, 320). In other words, the devil will be unsparing.

What is most intriguing, however, is Jesus' singular attention given to St. Peter as He relates this information. He could have addressed them all, but chooses to address St. Peter within their hearing. The New American Bible translates the Greek well, highlighting St. Peter: ("your own faith") vs. the other apostles as a group ("all of you"). The commentaries note this linguistic point, in particular. While alluding to St. Peter's triple denial, Jesus also gives him the solemn charge to "strengthen [his] brothers" after he repents.

All Christians would likely agree that Jesus' words here indicate that St. Peter has a particular form of headship in the first generation of the Church. Catholics, however, interpret Jesus' words as having enduring value for St. Peter's successors. The office of the papacy is Jesus' gift to His disciples in every age, so that they might be strengthened in the "*catholic and apostolic faith*," in the words of the Roman Canon (cf. Catechism nos. 552). The Maronite divine office for the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul expresses this idea well with the pithy phrase, "*The faith of Peter is our faith*!" This phrase articulates the heart of Catholic ecclesial identity.

St. Peter protests to the idea that he would have to be in a position to "turn back" to Jesus, yet Jesus foretells his triple denial. Herein we see the long-suffering of Our Lord, who, though grieved by sin, nonetheless shows great tenderness to St. Peter. Jesus looks beyond his wretchedness, and shifts the attention to his future role of giving stability to the Church.

St. Bede the Venerable again provides insight with his commentary on this passage, taking on the voice of Our Lord: "As I by prayer protected your faith that it should not fail, so do you remember to sustain the weaker brethren, that they despair not of pardon." St. Peter's solidarity with penitents, in light of his own pardon, is a poignant reminder to us of the Church's unfailing ministry of mercy in Confession, one element of the "power of the keys" (cf. Mt. 16: 19, Catechism no. 553). The story of St. Peter gives us hope for mercy: no matter how badly we have sinned, as long as we approach Our Lord with


sincere repentance, we should not despair of our salvation.


WEEKLY BIBLE STUDY: EPISTLES OF ST. PAUL—EPHESIANS

LATIN MASS PROPERS: THIRTEENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Psalm 73: 20, 19, 23 Have regard, O Lord, to Thy covenant, and forsake not to the end the souls of Thy poor: arise, O Lord, and judge Thy cause, and forget not the voices of them that seek Thee. *Psalm 73: 1* O God, why hast Thou cast us off unto the end: why is Thy wrath enkindled against the sheep of Thy pasture? Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Almighty and everlasting God, grant unto us an increase of faith, hope and charity: and that we may obtain what Thou dost promise, make us love that which Thou dost command. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Galatians 3: 16-22 Brethren: To Abraham were the promises made, and to his seed. He saith not: And to his seeds, as of many; but as of one, and to thy seed, which is Christ. Now this I say, that the testament which was confirmed by God, the law which was made after four hundred and thirty years, doth not disannul, to make the promise of no effect. For if the inheritance be of the law, it is no more of promise. But God gave it to Abraham by promise. Why then was the law? It was set because of transgressions, until the seed should come, to whom He made the promise; being ordained by angels in the hand of a mediator. Now a mediator is not of one: but God is one. Was the law then against the promises of God? God forbid. For if there had been a law given, which could give life, verily justice should have been by the law. But the Scripture hath concluded all under sin, that the promise by the faith of Jesus Christ might be given to them that believe.
