Pastor's Note



SEPTEMBER PARISH CALENDAR

J like very much the bracketing of the American Summer between Memorial Day and Labor Day, thus dedicating a solid part of the calendar year to all of the good things associated with the

word "summertime". It is after Labor Day that we can pick-up-the-pace again, with (we hope!) renewed energies and a sense of purpose.

In the life of the parish our summer extends liturgically up until the Ember Days which consecrate the coming autumn season (this year they fall on September 23rd, 25th & 26th). There is in the these Masses, still observed in the 1962 Missal, an echo of the Jewish High Holy Days from the Old Testament and the Life of Christ. The Jewish people's celebration of them this year is September 14th, 1st day of Rosh Hashana, September 23rd, Yom Kippur/ Day of Atonement, and September 28th, Succot/Feast of Tabernacles.

September also gives us several important feastdays: The Nativity of Our Lady, September 8th, Holy Cross Day, September 14th, The Seven Sorrows of Our Lady, September 15th, St. Matthew the Apostle, September 21st, and the culminating feast of the month: St. Michael's Day, September 29th, also known in older English as *Michaelmas*.

Our first September activity as a parish family is our **annual end-of-summer Parish Picnic** which is scheduled for next Sunday, September 13th, beginning at 12 noon after the 10:30 AM Mass. *Please see the notice on Page 6*. This is a wonderful occasion for us to come together as a parish community in Christian fellowship. With a Confirmation Mass scheduled for the Sunday after, we cannot have a rain-date this year, so, pray for good weather on the 13th! Sunday, September 20th, His Excellency Most Reverend Walter Edyvean will visit our parish to confer the Sacrament of Confirmation on several of our parishioners. This will take place at the 10:30 Mass and the Confirmation will be done according to the Extraordinary Form.

Our children's Religious Education program for the 2015-2016 school year begins in the fall. Notices about the start-dates will appear in the parish bulletin. As in the past two years, our lay Pastoral Associate David Allen will be offering his survey course on the Catholic Faith. *Please see the notice on Page 6*. The course is especially suited for adults who are interested in becoming Catholics or for baptized Catholics who were never catechized or received little instruction in their faith, but anyone is welcome to take the course. The first class is Sunday, October 4th.

The Parish Pastoral Council will have its first meeting for the year on Wednesday, September 16th, 7-8:30 PM. I am very grateful to all of these parishioners who have committed to the sacrifice of their time for the sake of the up-building of our parish life. We are, I hope, in the final stages of the "Sale Pending" of our former parish center the St. Elizabeth's Center. When it is accomplished I will inform the parish.

Finally, we look forward to the assistance of a Jesuit deacon during the coming year. **Mr. Juan Carlos Rivera, SJ,** will be ordained to the diaconate at St. Ignatius Church, Boston College, on Saturday, October 3rd. He has received permission from his Superior to help us at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes during these months of his transitional diaconate leading up to his ordination to the priest in June, 2016. Please pray for his special intention as he prepares himself during these days of September for ordination to the first stage of Major Orders, the diaconate.

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 22:39-46

Jesus' Agony in Gethsemane reiterates certain themes in the Last Supper discourse. For example, Jesus tells the disciples in v. 40, "*Pray that you may not undergo the test*," recalling the devil's intention to sift the disciples like wheat (v. 31), and indicating that this time has now begun.

Jesus also prays to be excused from his turn of drinking from the chalice of suffering (v. 42), which is linked to the chalice of "*the new covenant in* [*His*] *Blood*" at the Passover meal (v. 20), although each has its own distinctive meaning, as the commentaries indicate. Finally, Jesus demonstrates His loving servitude, the elect model of ministerial leadership for his disciples (v. 27), by freely and fully submitting His will to the will of the Father: "*not My will but Yours be done*" (v. 42). Thus, Gethsemane is in direct continuity with the Last Supper, and flows out of Jesus' self-gift at that first Mass in the Cenacle.

A unique feature of the Lucan account of Gethsemane is the angelic apparition sent "to strengthen Him" (v. 43). This heavenly moment is typical of St. Luke's repeated depictions of Jesus at prayer, wherein the efficacy of His prayers is often confirmed by a sign or a revelatory teaching. St. Luke is also unique among the evangelists in his visceral description of Jesus' intense suffering: "He was in such agony and he prayed so fervently that His sweat became like drops of blood falling on the ground" (v. 44). This is a symptom of extreme distress. The Litany of the Precious Blood recalls this moment in one of its petitions: "Blood of Christ, falling upon the earth in the Agony, save us."

Jesus' Precious Blood shed in the Agony brings the weight of His Passion (and its

implications for our lives) to the fore. If we pause to think seriously on this scene, and mentally place ourselves near Jesus during His suffering, we can begin to see our anxieties with better perspective. We can also see more distinctly the priority that must be given to our spiritual life: the Agony helps us to sense a deeper call to union with Jesus in the Mass, and to union with His will in subsequent daily activities and duties according to our state in life. The unparalleled intensity of Jesus' suffering also elicits our compassion, while at the same time calling us to show compassion to those suffering intensely within our own sphere of influence.

After this intense period of prayer, Jesus goes to the disciples, who are "*sleeping from grief*" (v. 45). Jesus again urges them to pray in light of the spiritual danger of the devil's wheat-sifting: "*Get up and pray that you may not undergo the test*" (v. 46). He gently, yet firmly reminds them of their duty, so as to strengthen their resolve to do God's will. We do well to heed Jesus' command for prayerful vigilance, since we are not exempt from temptation, either.


One very practical way to observe Jesus' command is to say the Office of Compline ("Night Prayer") before bed, in either form (Ordinary or Extraordinary). It is short, easy to learn, and can be found in part or in full in many Missals, as well as the popular *Magnificat* publication. An even easier method of praying at night, especially when one cannot sleep, is the Rosary. Jesus' exhortation to pray to avoid temptation is in direct continuity with the final petitions of the Our Father (cf. 11:4). His submission to the Father's will is likewise in direct continuity with the petition, "*Thy will be done.*" Each evening, let us join Our Lord in Gethsemane, and seek to be strengthened in our calling to carry out the will of the Father.
