


Parish Mission Statement

Pastor's Note



SLEEP-REST-PRAY

On Tuesday of this week, September 29th, we celebrate the feast of St. Michael the Archangel, also known as "Michaelmas" (from the "Michael Mass"). Historically, Michaelmas was a Holy Day of Obligation in the Catholic Church.

Consequently, as with the other Church feasts which were days off from work, it developed its own popular cultural traditions of raucous feasting, so much so that it made it into this English rhyme on the hours of nightly sleep:

Nature gives five, Custom takes seven, Laziness takes nine, And Michaelmas eleven!

It is interesting to note here the widespread belief that *only* five-hours sleep was what nature required of us, and the rest was either superfluous or even sinful (as in sleeping off a Michaelmas Eve bender!) Without the knowledge of brain science that we have now, it was not illogical for people to surmise that sleep was just wasted time. Not surprisingly, you find an anti-sleep bias in religious life and devotion. The young Don Bosco, for example, in his private notes, resolved never to take more than five hours sleep per night.

In spite of this bias for sleep austerity in Catholic ascetical practices, however, there were many people who discovered from experience that sleep needs could not be over-ridden without dire consequences. St. Teresa of Avila said: One cannot pray well, if one does not sleep well and eat well.

Our contemporary culture—despite the advantage of scientific knowledge—does little to respect the true demands of sleep and rest for healthy human living. The prejudice of "sleep-is -for-wimps" is still held by a surprising number of people. For many of us, however, we approach it as, "Yes, I'd get more sleep if I could, but I just can't: I've got too much to do!"

One thing we could certainly try (if shortsleeping and lack of rest is a chronic problem, and more or less our "normal" state) is to make it a matter of examination-of-conscience. Why am I not getting the sleep I need to fulfill my responsibilities in life? Is it because I am trying to "do everything"? Am I letting others and the obligations they impose on me take over my life, when I should be setting limits? Is it part of a larger issue in my life of living against the laws of reality? Am I indifferent to the effect my sleep deprivation has on others-my hair-trigger temper, my forgetfulness, my inability to really focus and produce acceptable work, my unpunctuality and so forth? These are real failures in charity towards our neighbor, no less real for their going unrecognized as such.

And what about our relationship to God? How can we expect to have any prayer-life if, in the mere act of trying to calm ourselves down to pray, we find ourselves uncontrollably falling asleep!

Sleep and rest are positive goods, blessings from God which He intends us to use for our own good and that of others. We should strive to practice the basics of sleep hygiene, asking God's help in this. I offer as a consideration on the positive good of sleep this *Night Offering* of St. Getrude:

Lord Jesus, may I take this rest with the same love with which You sanctified sleep when Your most holy humanity slept for the praise of God the Father and the salvation of the whole human race. In union with Your divine love I pray that my sleep may bring an increase of divine blessing to all those in heaven, on earth, and in purgatory.

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 22:66-71

The first of Jesus' three trials occurs before the Sanhedrin, the collective group of religious authorities, both of priests and scribes. They had no authority to enforce civil law or to inflict capital punishment; their sphere was religious law only. The other two trials of Jesus are civil trials before

Herod and Pontius Pilate. Of course, we can hardly consider these three events *legitimate* trials, for they are egregious miscarriages of justice.

The Sanhedrin asks Jesus, "If you are the Messiah, tell us" (v. 67). This question is a pathetic formality, for Jesus had plainly told them on multiple occasions who He claimed to be. The Gospel of John in particular presents an astonishingly clear picture of Jesus' Messianic claims. Jesus' response is utterly fitting: "If I tell you, you will not believe, and if I question, you will not respond" (vv. 67-68). This pithy, yet powerful answer summarizes virtually all of the interactions between Jesus and the religious leaders. Their obdurate unbelief, and their inability to respond to Our Lord with repentance is a recurring motif in the Gospels. Jesus' words here are also embarrassing for them, for they had attempted on multiple occasions to stump Him, only to be stumped themselves. We see this particularly in the confrontations between Jesus and the religious leaders during the first few days of Holy Week (cf. 19:39-20:47).

Jesus continues His response: "But from this time on the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the power of God" (v. 69). Jesus is referring to the mysterious prophecy of Daniel 7:13-14, in which a glorious Messianic figure who is distinct from God nevertheless shares "glory" and "dominion" with God. According to the commentary in the Ignatius Study Bible, Jesus' words here also point to His coming "vindication" in heaven when He sits at God's right hand, in stark contrast to this false trial. The Sanhedrin knows exactly the passage to which Jesus refers, and so they ask Him to confirm their suspicions of blasphemy: "They all asked, 'Are you then the Son of God?' He replied to them, 'You say that I am'" (v. 70). There is no longer any doubt that Jesus was claiming to be the God-man of Daniel 7. Hence, their response: "What further need have we for testimony? We have heard it from His own mouth" (v. 71).

In his commentary on this passage, Robert Tannehill rightly links this episode with the later apostolic preaching in the Book of Acts. On page 329, we read the following: "Following Jesus' resurrection and ascension, and Peter's announcement of Jesus as the Messiah and Lord installed at God's right hand (Acts 2:29-36), there will be renewed effort to persuade even the Sanhedrin that the risen Jesus is God's Messiah (cf. Acts 4:8-12; 5:27-32)." Thus, Son of Man motif of Daniel 7 is integral to the apostolic witness to the resurrection, and the Sanhedrin is confronted once again with the same bold Messianic proclamation.

As we continue to journey with Our Lord in His Passion, and especially as we meditate on His trials before the Sanhedrin, Herod, and Pilate, let us pray for so many of our Christian brethren throughout the world who have little hope of vindication from their persecutors. Let us pray every day for their deliverance from enemies who calumniate and accuse them. May the example of these martyrs encourage us to be more faithful to Christ in our own sphere of life, and to be ready to defend our faith, should we be called to do so.
