




Parish Mission Statement


"What then is a parish? It is the smallest section of the one universal flock which has been entrusted to Peter by the Lord. Under the authority of a responsible

Pastor's Note

ALL SAINTS DAY AND SAINTS OF MATRIMONY

Of all the coverage given to the Synod on the Family this past month in Rome, little attention was focused on the canonization of a married couple Louis and Zelie Martin, who were the parents of St. Therese of Lisieux. Pope Francis canonized them at St. Peter's on Sunday, October 18th, while the Synod on the Family still had another week to go.

We would do well to consider what Mother Church is saying to us through the canonization of the Martin parents. They are the first married couple canonized together in the history of the Church. They were canonized because they lived lives of heroic sanctity according to their state in life as a married couple in the world. At a time when the truth about marriage is obscured in public discourse

and in the degraded customs of the day; at a time when the breakdown of marriage and family life is such a social problem, we Catholics need to be encouraged by Saints of Matrimony.

The Martins were blessed with nine children in their marriage. Four of these children died in infancy or early childhood. Of the five daughters who lived to adulthood, four became Carmelite nuns, the fifth a Religious Sister of the Visitandines. St. Therese, the "Little Flower", was the youngest. The Mother died young of cancer in 1877. The Father suffered from a lingering brain disease which led to his being confined to a mental asylum for three years before his death in 1894. They lived devout Catholic lives and their family life sowed the seeds for five vocations to the consecrated religious life. Their lives, however, were heavily marked by the cross.

Much of the details of their Catholic family life we know from St. Therese's autobiography *The Story of a Soul* and the gratitude she bore her parents for the loving religious home they provided: "Throughout my life it has pleased God to surround me with affection; my earliest recollections are of tender caresses and smiles. And if He allowed so much love to be lavished upon me, He also endowed me with a warm and sensitive heart to return it. Of my affection for Papa and Mamma it would be difficult to convey an idea, and being very demonstrative I showed my love in a thousand little ways, though the means I employed make me smile now when I think of them."

Given human frailty and the hardships of life, there is no marriage—no matter how much the couple may love each other—that can be said to be safe in itself from break-up or growing estrangement. It takes the grace of God to persevere. It takes the help of Catholic Saints of Matrimony, both by their example and their heavenly intercession, to bolster the morale of Catholic spouses on their journey of life together. (Fr. Higgins)

SCRIPTURE STUDY



ST. LUKE CHAPTER 23:44-56

St. Luke's narration seamlessly and masterfully links Jesus' death to the fulfillment of His promise to St. Dismas moments before (v. 43: "Today you will be with Me in Paradise"). As Jesus nears the moment of His death, the veil closing off the Holy of Holies in the Temple is

"torn down the middle" (v. 45). This miraculous event indicates two things: (1) that Jesus' death atones for all of mankind's sin, and (2) that this atonement consequently opens the way for man to have communion with God. In other words, man can now "be with [him] in Paradise." As the author of the Epistle to the Hebrews explains, "through the blood of Jesus we have confidence of entrance into the sanctuary by the new and living way He opened for us through the veil, that is, His flesh" (cf. Heb. 10:19-20).

Jesus' final word on the cross in St. Luke's Passion account demonstrates His complete abandonment to the will of God: "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit" (v. 46, cf. Ps. 31:6). Whereas Our Lord quotes Ps. 22:1 in anguish ("My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"), here He quotes Ps. 31:6 as an act of hope. This word of Jesus also echoes Mary's fiat ("May it me done to me according to your word" cf. 1:38). Such trust is neither blind nor merely idealistic. Rather, it is motivated entirely by the supernatural virtue of hope, which is the "confident expectation" that God will fulfill His promises and give us the grace to keep His commands (cf. CCC no. 2090).

Our Lord lovingly offers Himself to the Father in view of the <u>certain</u> promise of the resurrection. As He Himself boldly claims in St. John's Gospel, "I lay down My life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from Me, but I lay it down on My own.

I have power to lay it down, and power to take it up again. This command I have received from My Father" (cf. Jn. 10:17-18). Jesus commends Himself entirely to the Father, fulfilling His command perfectly, because He is fully infused with divine hope, the hope which clings to resurrection victory.

In describing Our Lord's burial, St. Luke links Our Lord and St. Joseph of Arimathea by referring to them both as "righteous." The centurion calls Jesus "righteous" after observing his death (v. 47). St. Luke then presents St. Joseph to us as a "righteous man...who, though he was a member of the council, had not consented to their plan of action" (vv. 50-51). Additionally, we are told that he "was awaiting the *kingdom of God"* (v. 51). This concords with the other evangelists' accounts which mention that he was a secret disciple (cf. Mt. 27:57, Jn. 19:38). There is even a very old tradition that St. Joseph of Arimathea may have been one of Jesus' uncles. This is not totally implausible, since half of Jesus' disciples were likely related to Him in some way as cousins. Thus, there is a real poignancy in contemplating the scene of Our Lord's burial conducted by His disciple-uncle and the holy women disciples.

As we meditate on the mystery of Our Lord in death, we are instructed by this prayer from the Byzantine Divine Liturgy, which references the teaching of St. John of Damascus: "When Your Body was in the tomb, and Your soul in the abyss, when You were in paradise with the thief, You were at the same time, O Christ, as God, upon Your throne with the Father and the Spirit, infinite and filling all things." The Catechism further summarizes the teaching of St. John of Damascus on this subject in paragraph 626. Here, we read that Jesus' death does not separate His two natures. Christ remains one divine Person with two full natures, human and divine (cf. On the Orthodox Faith, 3,27; CCC no. 626). Consequently, because Christ is still the divine subject of His human nature, He rises from the dead necessarily. As St. Thomas Aquinas explains, "divine power preserved Christ's body from corruption" (cf. STh III, 51, 3, quoted in CCC no. 627).

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


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
