

SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY FIRST SUNDAY IN ADVENT: ROMANS 13, 11-14

As we begin another liturgical year, our weekly Scripture meditations will now center on the Epistles of the lectionary of the 1962 Roman Missal (a lectionary is the collection of all the Scripture readings for Mass). These Sunday readings are printed in our weekly bulletin, and so, they are handy for all parishioners, regardless of what form of the Mass they may attend from week to week. Studying the Scriptures used in Mass has a deep rationale, rooted in the Apostolic tradition: encountering Jesus in His word prepares us to encounter Him fully in the Sacrament. We saw this two weeks ago in the encounter of Jesus and the disciples on the road to Emmaus (cf. Luke 24:13-35). Do you want a richer and more worthy reception of Holy Communion? Listen to, relish, and act upon the words of Jesus and his Apostles proclaimed at each Mass.

Today's selection from Romans is a privileged reading, because it contains part of the very passage that an angelic voice directed St. Augustine to read when he hit rock bottom, and which opened him up to his conversion. God indeed speaks to our needs and our sadness through the Scriptures! Given this example from the lives of the saints, it is a fitting reading for beginning Advent, because a worthy celebration of Christmas demands worthy repentance on our part. Only sober conversion yields authentic Christmas joy, the joy of Jesus' love for us sinners.

In order to unlock the meaning of today's passage, it is helpful to know first how this passage is linked to what St. Paul is saying immediately before. In 13:8-10, he is exhorting the Roman Christians to observe the command to love one's neighbor. As he explains, "The commandments...are summed up in this sentence, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law" (cf. 13:9-10, RSV). It is this idea, namely, that loving one's neighbor fulfills the law, which St. Paul uses to justify the continuation of his

argument, which is where today's passage begins. Today's reading begins with, "knowing that it is now the hour," but the lectionary omits two important words which link this passage to the previous one: "Et hoc," literally, "And this," which precede the word "knowing." "And this" refers back to the command to love one's neighbor, which St. Paul says is critically important in view of the present "hour." This is the sense in which the New American Bible translates v. 11: "And do this [that is, loving your neighbor] because you know...it is the hour now for you to awake from sleep." What is this hour for which we need to be awake?

St. Paul directs our eyes toward the Second Coming: "For salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed" (v. 11, RSV). The time within which Christ could come at any moment is already here, so we need to be occupied with loving our neighbor. This message fittingly matches the Gospel for today's Mass from St. Luke, which centers on the Second Coming. We are also mindful of Jesus' words from St. Matthew's Gospel: "Who then is the faithful and wise servant, whom his master has set over his household, to give them their food at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom his master when he comes will find so doing" (cf. Mt. 25:45-46, RSV).

Thus, St. Paul prompts us to "rise from sleep," that is, from the sleep of sin, and examine whether or not we are "walking honestly, as in the day." While daytime here is a metaphor for upright behavior, we can interpret it further as referring to the Day of Jesus' Second Coming and the Last Judgment. Are we ready for this Day? Are we striving to be saints? St. Paul helps us to examine our conscience by providing a list of sins, "the works of darkness," which we are to "cast off," including "rioting, drunkenness, chambering ("promiscuity" in the NAB), impurities, contention, envy" (v. 13). These are all ways in which one is decidedly not loving one's neighbor.

In contrast, St. Paul tells us to "put on the armor of light," by which he means, "put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ" (vv. 12, 14). By this, he means we are to immerse ourselves in Him and His grace. As the commentary in the Ignatius Study Bible notes, the language of "putting on Christ" is a way of expressing a "renew[al]" of the original "putting on" of Christ in Baptism. As Catholics, we have the distinct

privilege of having weekly and even daily opportunities through the sacraments for doing this very thing. Before Christmas, let us all make a good confession. Let us immerse ourselves in the embrace of Jesus' forgiveness, which restores and strengthens the grace of our Baptism.
