# **Pastor's Note**

# THE GREAT MESSIAH

J would like to dedicate today's space to reprinting the *Boston Pilot* column of the late David Goldstein, a Jewish convert to Catholicism, regarding the prophecies of the Old Testament of the Bible which clearly point to Jesus of Nazareth as the long-awaited Great Messiah of the Jewish people. It is very edifying for us to ponder this list especially as we are trying to prepare ourselves for the Advent of the Lord. The source is *My Boston Pilot Column* (*A.D. 1962*), which is the book-edition of Mr. Goldstein's columns in our Archdiocesan newspaper over many years.

<u>Twenty-five Prophecies of Jesus of Nazareth</u> The evidence of the coming, as well as of the life and death of Our Lord, is recorded, as you know, in the Old Testament inspired writings of God's foretelling historians. They announced that the Messiah (Christ) was to be racially of Adam (Gen. 3:15); religiously of Moses (Deut. 18:15); nationally of Jacob/Israel (Gen. 49:24); tribally of Judah (Gen. 49:10); and ancestrally of David (Ps. 131:11). Here are 25 Old Testament prophecies regarding the Messiah that were uttered centuries before His birth.

- 1. God would send a Prophet who would speak for Him (Deut. 18:15)
- 2. A messenger (St. John the Baptist) would prepare the way. (Mal. 3:1)
- 3. Would be born in a stated number of weeks (Daniel 9:25-26).
- 4. The "seed" (Christ) would be born of a woman (Gen. 3:15).
- 5. Born of a Virgin Mother (Isaiah 7:14).
- 6. Born in Bethlehem (Micah 5:2).
- 7. Born of the Royal House of David (Jer. 23:5, Is. 11:1).
- 8. Born under the Star of Jacob (Numbers 24:17).
- 9. Born at the time of the Second Temple (Haggai 2:10).

- 9. Born at the time of the Second Temple (Haggai 2:10).
- 10. Born when the scepter (authority) was taken away from Judah (Gen. 49:10).
- 11. Would be called a Nazarite (Judges 13:7).
- 12. Called the "Emmanuel", God-with-us (Is. 7:14)
- 13. Called "God the Mighty", "Prince of Peace" (Is. 9:6).
- 14. Be the Good Shepherd (Is, 40:10-11).
- 15. Kings would come with presents to adore him (Ps. 71:10).
- 16. Would flee into Egypt (Hosea 11:1).
- 17. Would be silent before his accusers (Is. 53:7).
- 18. Would be hailed as a king, while riding an ass through Jerusalem (Zech. 9:9).
- 19. Would be a Man of Sorrows (Is. 53).
- 20. Would be betrayed (Ps. 40).
- 21. Would be sold for thirty pieces of silver (Zech. 11:13).
- 22. Would suffer willingly for our sins (Is. 50:6).
- 23. Would be led like a sheep to the slaughter (Is. 53:7).
- 24. Would be subjected to the piercing of his hands and feet (Ps. 21:17).
- 25. Would be resurrected from the dead (Is. 11:10).

I submit that no more convincing evidence has ever been presented of the coming, life, and death of any individual in the history of the world, than are recorded in these 25 prophecies that were foretold centuries before the birth of

Our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. If only a few of these prophecies were fulfilled, they would be evidence sufficient to prove Christ to be what He is, the "Emmanuel": God-with-us; God-the-Mighty; the Prince-of-Peace; our Messianic Lord." —David Goldstein

# SCRIPTURE STUDY

## SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY SECOND SUNDAY IN ADVENT: ROMANS 15, 4-13.

●ne of the major recurring themes in St. Paul's epistles is the unity of Jew and Gentile in Christ and in the Church. It is difficult for us who are removed from the situation of the early Church by 2000 years to comprehend how important (and divisive) this issue was in the pastoral ministry of the Apostles, and especially St. Paul. The issue centered on whether it was possible for Gentiles to become Christians without first embracing Judaism, including circumcision and the dietary laws (cf. Acts 15:1-29).

Despite the unanimity of the Apostles on this question, namely, that it indeed was possible for Gentiles to become Christians without first becoming Jews, various false teachers and other people held views on the matter that were divergent from the apostolic teaching (we see this, for example, in the epistles to the Galatians and Colossians, as the commentaries point out). This created problems in fledgling church communities from time to time, and especially for those churches that were likely a mixture of Jews and Gentiles, such as the church in Rome. St. Paul addresses this issue in our Epistle reading today, underlining for his readers the consistent witness of the Scriptures to God's election of the Gentiles along with the Jews as members of the covenant people. He demonstrates this by citing multiple passages that testify to this truth, and exhorts them to foster communion of mind in the truth. The Introit for today's Mass celebrates this great truth of the salvation of the Gentiles explicitly.

The beginning of today's selection from Romans highlights the importance of prophecy in Sacred Scripture as it relates to its application today in the lives of believers. What does Scripture do for us? Why is it given to us?

1. For learning: we come to know the truth about God and ourselves. If we are not paying attention to the message of Scripture, we are seriously missing out on many graces that God desires to give us, which serve to enhance our openness to the graces of the Sacraments. St. Jerome famously tells us that "*ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ.*" One could even go further and say that ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of self, insofar as Christ fully reveals what it means to be human, as the Second Vatican Council so wonderfully teaches: "In reality it is only in the mystery of the Word made flesh that the mystery of humanity truly becomes clear" (Gaudium et Spes no. 22).

- 2. For patience: Reading the life of Christ and the lives of his saints in the Old and New Testaments fortifies our spiritual lives. Scripture encourages us to continue carrying our cross and press on in virtue.
- 3. For comfort: God's promises concerning our redemption and salvation, which are found throughout the whole of the sacred text, are completely trustworthy. Consequently, reading Scripture in faith engenders real consolation, not the vague and unreliable notions of good feelings that we hear about so often in the Holiday Season.
- 4. For hope: Ultimately, such authentic comfort nurtures the theological virtue of hope, because it issues from the Holy Ghost, the Inspirer of Sacred Scripture, who is the Comforter (cf. Jn. 14:16).

As you read Scripture, ask God to enlighten you, and to make these above-mentioned points more and more real in your life. The following is an Anglican Use collect that incorporates elements from today's Epistle:

"Blessed Lord, who hast caused all holy Scriptures to be written for our learning; Grant that we may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that by patience and comfort of Thy holy Word, we may embrace, and ever hold fast, the blessed hope of everlasting life, which Thou hast given us in our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen."
