## **Pastor's Note**



## HYMNS OF **OUR LADY**

**T**he figure of Our Lady stands out very prominently in these days of Advent. Her two

great privileges, upon which all of the other honors and titles we give to Mary are based, the IMMACULATE CONCEPTION and the DIVINE MATERNITY shine luminously in this preparation phase of the Christmas Cycle.

In our spiritual preparation for the Christmas Feast it might be helpful for us to consider the hymns of Mary. The first hymn to consider is the one sung by Our Lady herself, her Canticle of Praise in St. Luke's Gospel-the Magnificat. Here we see the purity of Mary's heart as she gives God the praise for fulfilling the Scriptural promises of redemption. I recommend committing Our Lady's Magnificat to memory. Here is a translation from a musical setting to the Magnificat which I remember singing in the Seminary schola:

My soul doth magnify the Lord, and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Saviour; for He hath regarded the lowliness of His handmaiden, And, behold, henceforth all generations shall call me blessed.

For He that is mighty hath magnified me, and holy is His Name, and His mercy is on those who fear Him throughout all generations. He hath shone the strength of His arm: He hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts:

He hath put down the mighty from their thrones, and exalted the humble and meek. *He hath filled the hungry with good things and* the rich he hath sent empty away. He remembering His mercy hath holpen His servant Israel, as He promised to our

Forefathers, Abraham and his seed forever.

In the liturgy of the Divine Office the *Magnificat* is sung every evening at Vespers, making use of the inspired words of Mary to thank God for another day of redemption. The Magnificat is also an especially beautiful prayer to recite as a private thanksgiving upon receiving Holy Communion.

Another hymn of Our Lady is the Marian Antiphon used from the First Sunday of Advent until February 2nd, the Alma Redemptoris. Here is a translation of that Antiphon:

Loving Mother of the Redeemer, Gate of Heaven and Star of the Sea, come quickly to the aid of thy people, fallen indeed but striving to stand again. To the wonderment of Nature thou wert the Mother of thy Holy Creator without ceasing to be a virgin, and heard from Gabriel that greeting "Hail". Have pity on us sinners.

A third hymn of Our Lady for our meditation is one of the Marian hymns sung throughout the year on the feast-days of Our Lady, including the feast we have just celebrated, the Immaculate Conception. It is titled O Gloriosa Virginum.

O Most Glorious of Virgins, exalted among the stars, thou didst nurse at the breast the Little One who created thee.

Thou dost give back to us through thy loving Child what Eve through God's curse had lost for us: thou openest the gates of heaven that Eve's sorrowing children may enter.

Thou art the Royal Door for the heavenly King and the Shining Palace for the light from above. Rejoice, ransomed world, that through the Virgin life has been given to us.

This hymn was the particular favorite of St. Anthony of Padua and it was the hymn he tried to sing on his deathbed, June 13th, A.D. 1231.

# SCRIPTURE STUDY

## SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY THIRD SUNDAY IN ADVENT: PHILIPPIANS 4, 4-7.

**T**he third Sunday of Advent, *Gaudete* Sunday, takes its thematic cue from the St. Paul's Epistle to the Philippians, also quoted in the Introit of the Mass: "*Rejoice in the Lord always.*" Although we have not arrived at the Christmas feast, the Church bids us to be joyful, because we are now very close to the 25th. *Gaudete* Sunday is to Christmas what a familiar landmark is to a happy destination during a long journey. The landmark or rest stop is not the destination itself, but its proximity to it can give us a taste of the joy we experience once we have finally arrived. Today's liturgical respite is a welcome grace if we are taking the call to repentance seriously during this semi-penitential season, and striving to pay greater attention to the spiritual life.

The Church bids us to rejoice, because she knows our needs. The collect for today's Mass characterizes our condition well: "the darkness of our minds." This phrase can refer to many things, such as despondency, confusion, sadness, and especially sin: all of these things are comparable to darkness. They weigh on our daily and hourly thought patterns from time to time, affecting other aspects of life. Given this common reality, how and why should we rejoice? What is the corrective to this darkness? We look again to the collect. The answer is the illumination of "the grace of [Christ's] visitation," i.e., the joy of Christmas. We beseech God to "incline [His] ear" and grant us the light of the coming feast day. We can already relish the joy of Christmas if we are praying for it in the way that today's collect and epistle show us.

The collect's image of God inclining His ear to us can be likened to speaking with someone at a noisy restaurant or party: seeking to block out extraneous noise, the person with whom we are speaking leans in closer to us in order to hear and comprehend us completely. Of course, God is always fully attentive to us, knowing our needs even before we ask (cf. Luke 12:30). Nevertheless, this kind of image of God inclining His ear to us is exactly what Jesus has done and continues to do for us by His assumption of a full human nature from Mary.

This is the light of Christmas. In the Incarnation, Jesus *inclines Himself* to our heartfelt prayers and our burdens, shouldering them on our behalf as true God and true Man. Knowing such solidarity in Jesus is indeed cause for rejoicing today as we near Christmas, for it is at the heart of the feast.

In today's epistle, St. Paul instructs his readers that "*the Lord is nigh*." The Second Coming becomes the motivation for rejoicing, as well as the motivation for the prayer method that he describes in the following verses: "*Be nothing solicitous: but in every thing, by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your petitions be made known to God*." In other words, we must channel our sadness and anxieties into prayers that trust in God's inclined ear. Such prayer is thankful for God's fatherly compassion and His attentiveness to our needs.

When we pray with this kind of faith, it does not necessarily solve our problems, nor erase normal and healthy levels of concern, but it can foster interior peace. St. Paul continues: "*And the peace of God, which surpasseth all understanding,* [*shall*] *keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus our Lord.*" In other words, we are no longer carrying the burden confusedly and alone (in the "*darkness of our minds*"). Rather, we can rest assured in God's merciful providence over us. This peace is itself a great joy, and thus, another authentic reason to rejoice as we prepare to celebrate Christmas.
