SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EASTER James 1:17-21

As often happens in the Mass Propers, the prayers and readings complement one another in their message. Today's Collect and Epistle, for example, share a similar theme. St. James teaches us that "[e]very good endowment and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change" (Jas. 1:17, RSVthis translation will be used throughout this column). Our Collect reflects St. James' teaching when it prays, "that amid the changes of the world, our hearts may there be fixed where true joys are to be found." Both texts prompt us to consider seriously the supreme and unchanging Good that is God Himself, in comparison to all other joys in life which are fleeting.

At the same time, we must be careful to note that St. James affirms the goodness of creation, ascribing its goodness to God. This is a fundamentally Biblical worldview rooted in Genesis 1. Catholic life reflects this "both/and" reality. We adore God alone, who *transcends* all passing things, and yet we find His goodness and wisdom *in* all created things and enjoy them with thanksgiving (cf. 1 Tim. 4:3-5). We feast *and* we fast. We seek God apart from the goods of this world, and we experience His love through them, as well. Both approaches have their proper place; both are essential to living the Gospel.

The verse quoted above which opens our Epistle reading today comes at the end of an important argument St. James makes regarding temptation, namely, that temptation is a result of disordered passions and sin, not God (vv. 13-16). When we suffer temptation, we err if we "blame God." In his providence, God allows temptation, although He himself is not its origin or cause (v. 13). In fact, God would see us profit by it. As St. James explains in v. 12, "Blessed is the man who endures trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life which God has promised to those who love Him." Therefore, let us not be unduly discouraged when tempted, as if God has the deck stacked against us. Let us rather be encouraged by His mercy, which is shown so clearly in two things: 1) God has made us his very own children "*by the word of truth*," (v. 18) that is, the Gospel message, and 2) He gives us "*every perfect gift*" of grace in the sacraments, so that we may persevere in the path of holiness as His children.

St. James then proceeds to offer timely and practical counsel, which can help us in this struggle to persevere. He writes, "Let every man be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger" (v. 19). How many sins issue from doing the opposite of what St. James tells us in this verse? We sometimes speak unwisely and precipitously. Many of us struggle to listen well. Tempers can flare in an instant at the smallest inconvenience, and yet St. James tells us that this last kind of behavior in particular "does not work the righteousness of God" (v. 20). In other words, we are not giving God His due (the virtue of justice) when we are quick to wrath. Anger is sometimes justified and warranted. Precipitous anger, however, is not a commendable virtue, because it fails to acknowledge the supreme justice, wisdom, and providence of God.

Mary is our best example for observing St. James' counsel. She "receive[d] with meekness the implanted word" (v. 21). Our Lady "kept" God's words, "pondering them in her heart" (cf. Lk 2:19, 51). Hence, she was "quick to hear" and "slow to speak." How commendable it is to read and meditate on the Gospel of each day, even for just 10 minutes. If we want to be good disciples, let us make a commitment to sit quietly and listen to Jesus, allowing His glorious words to speak to our hearts directly and personally. Let each of us give the Sacred Scriptures the faith, time and attentiveness they deserve, and we will see how "living and active" God's words really are (cf. Heb. 4:12).
