### THE SAINT ELIZABETH CENTER IS <u>SOLD</u>!

At long last, the closed parish building of the St. Elizabeth Center has been sold. On July 6th, 2016, the house was purchased by Karen Osborne for <u>\$750,000</u>. After subtracting the real estate broker's commission and other expenses accrued to the parish as the seller, the parish account has realized <u>\$710,000</u>. This sum will replenish the considerable funds we had to expend in order to repave our parking lots last fall and will allow us to begin planning to make the lower church hall handicapped accessible from the Oak Street parking lot. Karen Osborne plans to restore the house and allow for use as a Community Center for Newton Upper Falls.

According to the terms of the sale, 8 parking spaces at the top of the Linden Street parking lot now belong to the St. Elizabeth property/260 Elliot Street and not to the parish, so we will no longer be able to use those for church parking. We are hopeful that this sale is a win/win/win for the parish, the buyer, and the neighborhood.

# SCRIPTURE STUDY

### SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST I Corinthians 10:6-13

Today's Epistle provides a meditation on the sin of covetousness, which, as we know, concerns two of the Ten Commandments (numbers 9 and 10). As St. Paul explains, "Let us not covet evil things, as they also coveted. Neither become ye idolators" (vv. 6-7). Citing the Golden Calf incident (as well as other moments of grave moral failure in the desert from the Book of Numbers) he links the Israelites' covetousness and subsequent grave sin, as well as consequent punishment (vv. 7-10; cf. Ex. 32). Thus, there is an intrinsic link between covetousness on the one hand, and idolatry and sexual immorality, on the other hand. One could say the same thing about covetousness and stealing, as well. Adultery, idolatry, and stealing do not drop out of the sky, but are preceded by a mortally sinful degree of covetousness.

The Epistle today also shows us that there is an intrinsic link between grave sin and divine correction. St. Paul explains that this Biblical example is a warning to the New Covenant people: "these things happened to them in figure, and they are written for our correction" (v. 11). We know that suffering is not always a punishment for sin, as we learn from the Book of Job, or the story of the Blind Man in St. John's Gospel (cf. Jn. 9:2-3). At the same time, however, the Bible contains several occasions of divine punishment clearly meted out as a consequence for serious sin (and usually after great long-suffering on the part of God, and many warnings).

How are we to counteract this pernicious sin of covetousness, and thus, avoid worse kinds of sin? The Collect for today's Mass gives us some help here. In the petition, we ask God that he may "make [us] ask such things as please [Him]." We need the grace of God to purify and transform our desires. Even more fundamentally, God would have us desire Him and His love more than any created thing. As St. James explains, "you covet and cannot obtain; so you fight and wage war. You do not have, because you do not ask. <u>You ask</u> <u>and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, to spend it on</u> <u>your passions</u>" (cf. Jam. 4:2-3, RSV, emphasis mine). In contrast to this, our fundamental attitude in prayer should be that which we learn in the Act of Charity: "O my God, <u>I love Thee above all things</u>, because Thou art all good and deserving of all my love, etc." (emphasis mine). This prayer teaches us the positive dimension of the First Commandment.

In light of this basic prayer, as well as today's Collect, what kinds of things may we ask of God that are pleasing to Him? If, in every prayer, we sincerely seek to be pleasing to God, and to ask things that we know are pleasing Him, we are on the right path. For example, if we ask for the gifts of wisdom and understanding when we read the Bible and study the teachings of the Church, God will grant this request. We learn this from the life of Solomon (cf. 1 Kings 3). Had the authorities in Jerusalem sought such gifts of wisdom and understanding, they might have recognized Christ in their midst. As it is, Our Lord laments their ignorance and blindness in today's Gospel: "If thou also hadst known, and that in this thy day, the things that are to thy peace: but now they are hidden from thine eyes" (cf. Lk. 19:42).

This Gospel shows us that Christ is grieved when man fails to take advantage of the graces available to him! Jesus would have us delight in Him and His immeasurable love for us (cf. Ps. 37:4). Let us concentrate on improving the quality of our prayers by asking God to make us more receptive to and cooperative with the graces He already so generously provides. If we do this, we will begin to experience greater victory over the sin of covetousness. In light of the final verse of today's Epistle, let us ask God for the strength to endure temptation, as well as the grace to be delivered from it (v. 13).

Now all these things happened to them in figure, and they are written for our correction, upon whom the ends of the world are come. Wherefore he that thinketh himself to stand, let him take heed lest he fall. Let no temptation take hold on you, but such as is human: and God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that which you are able; but will make also with temptation issue, that you may be able to bear it.

GOSPEL: Luke 19: 41-47 **A**t that time, when Jesus drew near to Jerusalem, seeing the city, He wept over it saying: If thou also hadst known, and that in this day, the things that are to thy peace: but now they are hidden from thy eyes. For the days shall come upon thee, and thy enemies shall cast a trench about thee, and compass thee round, and straiten thee on every side; and beat thee flat to the ground, and thy children who are in thee; and they shall not leave in thee a stone upon a stone, because thou hast not known the time of thy visitation. And entering into the temple, He began to cast out them that sold therein, and them that bought, saying to them: It is written, My house is the house of prayer, but you have made it a den of thieves. And He was teaching daily in the temple.
