Pastor's Note

CHURCH AND PARISH NEWS

⅓ would like to use the space this week to convey various pieces of news happening in the parish life:

First of all, I want to convey the happy news that **Fr. John Tokaz**, **OFM Cap** from the Capuchin Friars' community in Jamaica Plain will once again able to assist me by offering one of the Sunday parish Masses on a regular basis. Fr. John has been undergoing cancer treatment since February. His cancer is now in remission, however, and he is feeling well enough to resume public ministry.

We continue to enjoy the summer assistance of **Fr. Desire Salako**, **SMA**. Fr. Salako is the pastor of a far-flung mission parish in northern Liberia, which was at the epicenter of the Ebolaplague outbreak in 2014. In our August bulletins I intend to share with you some of the pictures Fr. Salako has brought with him of this Liberia mission. On the last Sunday in August (as we did last year) Fr. Salako will preach a Mission Appeal at all the Masses and we will take up a Second Collection to the benefit of Fr. Salako's missionary work.

Each year we are scheduled to receive an outside Missionary Preacher for a special Mission Appeal. This year Mary Immaculate of Lourdes has been assigned a missionary from the **Missionary Society of St. James.** As you may recall the St. James Society was founded by Boston's Cardinal Cushing in the 1960s to send priests on-loan to countries in Latin America. This Mission Appeal will take place at all the Masses for **Sunday, September 11th, 2016.**

Another missionary work in association with our parish is the **Mission of Our Lady of Mesopotamia** for Iraqi Christian refugees. Mary Immaculate of Lourdes has been the hostparish in the Archdiocese of Boston for these Iraqi Catholics of the Syriac-rite since 2012. The Mission has been undergoing some fundamental re-organizing in recent months. Cardinal Sean has taken the Mission under his protection and appointed a Boston priest Fr. Michael Harrington as their Administrator while the complexities of canon-law are sorted out. The eventual goal is to have an Arabicspeaking priest with faculties from the Archdiocese of Boston serve the pastoral needs of the members of this Mission. Also, lay-leader of the Mission Mr. Sermed Ashkouri is studying for the permanent diaconate in the Latin (Roman) rite here in Boston, and is sponsored by our parish. The next Mass for the Mission of Our Lady of Mesopotamia will be on Saturday, August 13th, at 5:30 PM.

CHANGES IN THE PARISH GARDENS

You will have noticed a number of changes in the look of the parish gardens this summer. We have moved the smaller statue of Our Lady from the hillock between the rectory and the former St. Elizabeth Center and placed it in the Children's Garden. In its place we had the larger white stone of Our Lady and its pedestal re-located by Deveney Monument Company from the edge of the Oak St. Parking Lot.

The space between the church walk and the picnic tables has been re-purposed as a children's play area with swing sets, slides and a children's fort. Many thanks to parishioner **Joe Monahan** for coming up with the idea, planning it, and working on its installation together with his young son **Nicholas.** Many thanks also to parishioners **Ron Goguen** and two of his sons **Tom** and **Peter** for their labor in preparing the ground for the play-area and the new shrine of Our Lady.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST II Corinthians 3:4-9

Today's Epistle draws a sharp contrast between the Old Covenant and the New Covenant in respect to their degrees of glory. This passage comes within a broader appeal St. Paul makes for the authenticity of his apostolic ministry to his flock in Corinth. On a first reading, it might appear to some as if St. Paul is denigrating the Old Covenant. In light of the rest of the New Testament, however, St. Paul's description of the Old Covenant as a "dispensation of death" and a "dispensation of condemnation" (vv. 7, 9, RSV), speaks very specifically to the inability of the Mosaic Law to justify sinners, and by extension, the inability of animal sacrifices to atone for sins. He argues this case strongly and very systematically in his epistles to the Romans, the Galatians, and the Hebrews.

Indeed, St. Paul highlights the inherent dignity of the Old Covenant when comparing it to its fulfillment in Christ. By referring to the visible holiness of Moses' face in the Exodus, he presents the excellence of the Old Covenant as an established fact from the pages of divine revelation (v. 7; cf. Ex. 34). In comparing the glory of the Old Covenant to the infinite glory of the New Covenant, however, he heightens his hearers' sense of how much *more* splendrous is the New Covenant. Understood another way, since liturgical and moral holiness were so crucially important for the Israel, it is only logical that they would be more so for the Church, which holds that the God of Sinai himself chose to take flesh and "tabernacle" among man (cf. Jn. 1:14).

This thought should give us pause whenever we genuflect sloppily or absent-mindedly. We must not forget that Our Lord chooses to veil himself in the Blessed Sacrament, in a way that is analogous to Moses, rather than let us see the fullness of His glory here on earth. We cannot presume to think that we, as the people of the New Covenant, could have looked directly on the face of Moses without pause.

Even the Apostles Peter, James, and John were afraid at the Transfiguration (cf. Mt. 17:6). St. John fell flat on his face when he saw Christ while "in the Spirit on the Lord's day" on the island of Patmos at the beginning of Revelation (cf. Rev. 1:9-20).

Our Collect for today's Mass acknowledges the kind of humility we need to serve God in the splendor of the New Covenant. It recognizes that it is God's "gift...that [His] faithful people do unto [Him] worthy and laudable service." This is worth pondering as we offer our preparatory prayers before Mass, lest we fall into the trap of pride, like the Pharisee of the Gospel reading two weeks ago, who ended up praying to himself, not to God (cf. Lk. 18:9-14). Our Introit Antiphon for today's Mass likewise reminds us of our dependence upon God to offer "worthy and laudable service." These verses begin every service in the Divine Office of the Roman Rite: "O God, come to my assistance; O Lord, make haste to help me" (cf. Ps. 69/70:2). We need God's grace even just to begin.

The Secret Prayer, like the Introit and the Collect, also leads us to cast ourselves entirely upon the mercy of God, so that we may offer acceptable sacrifice: "Graciously look upon the offerings...[so] that while they obtain pardon for us, they may give honor to Thy name." What a simple and direct petition. We ask God to regard the offering graciously, for only by His gracious regard, His "serene and kindly countenance," can our worship have any efficacy and value (pardon for us, and honor for God, the hoped-for outcomes of the petition). Fortunately, we can trust that this will be the case with the Host and Chalice, because they are the eternal Offering of Christ, and the Heavenly Father is always pleased with his Son (cf. Lk. 3:22).



LATIN MASS PROPERS: TWELFTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Psalm 69: 2-3 Incline unto my aid, O God: O Lord, make haste to help me: let my enemies be confounded and ashamed, who seek my soul. *Psalm* 69: 4 Let them be turned backward and blush for shame, who desire evils to me. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT Almighty and merciful God, of whose gift it cometh that Thy faithful people do unto Thee true and laudable service; grant, we beseech Thee, that we may run without hindrance toward the attainment of Thy promises. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: 2 Corinthians 3: 4-9 Brethren: Such confidence we have through Christ towards God. Not that we are sufficient to think anything of ourselves, as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is from God. Who also hath made us fit ministers of the new testament, not in the letter, but in the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit quickeneth. Now if the ministration of death, engraven with letters upon stones, was glorious, so that the children of Israel could not steadfastly behold the face of Moses, for the glory of his countenance, which is made void: how shall not the ministration of the spirit be rather in glory? For if the ministration of condemnation be glory, much more the ministration of justice aboundeth in glory. GRADUAL: Psalm 33: 2-3 I will bless the Lord at all times; His praise shall ever be in my mouth. V. In the Lord shall my soul be praised: let the meek hear, and rejoice. ALLELUIA: Psalm 87: 2 Alleluia, alleluia. V. O Lord, the God of my salvation, I have cried in the day, and in the night before Thee. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: Luke 10: 23-37 At that time, Jesus said to His disciples: Blessed are the eyes that see the things which you see. For I say to you, that many prophets and kings have desired to see the things that you see, and have not seen them; and to hear the things that you hear, and have not heard them. And behold a certain lawyer stood up, tempting Him, and saying: Master, what must I do to possess eternal life? But He said to him: What is written in the law? How readest thou? He answering, said: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbour as thyself. And He said to him: Thou hast answered rightly: this do, and thou shalt live. But he, willing to justify himself, said to Jesus: And who is my neighbour? And Jesus answering, said: A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among robbers, who also stripped him, and having wounded him went away, leaving him half dead: and it chanced that a certain priest went down the same way, and seeing him, passed by. In like manner also a Levite, when he was near the place and saw him, passed by. But a certain Samaritan being on his journey, came near him, and seeing him, was moved with compassion, and going up to him, bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine; and setting him upon his own beast, brought him to an inn, and took care of him: and the next day he took out two pence, and gave to the host, and said: Take care of him, and whatsoever thou shalt spend over and above, I, at my return will repay thee. Which of these three, in thy opinion, was neighbour to him that fell among robbers? But he said: He that shewed mercy to him. And Jesus said to him: Go and do thou in like manner.

OFFERTORY: Exodus 32: 11, 13, 14 Moses prayed in the sight of the Lord his God, and said: Why, O Lord, is Thy indignation enkindled against Thy people? Let the anger of Thy mind cease; remember Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, to whom Thou didst swear to give a land flowing with milk and honey: and the Lord was appeared from doing the evil which He had spoken of doing against His people.

SECRET Mercifully regard, we beseech Thee, O Lord, the sacrifices, which we lay upon Thine altar: that they may obtain pardon for our sins, and give glory to Thy name. Through our Lord.

COMMUNION: Psalm 103: 13, 14-15 The earth shall be filled with the fruit of Thy works, O Lord that Thou mayest bring bread out of the earth, and that wine may cheer the heart of man: that he may make the face cheerful with oil; and that bread may strengthen man's heart.

POSTCOMMUNION May we be quickened, O Lord, by participation in this holy mystery, and may it grant us both the expiation of our sins and the strengthening of our souls. Through our Lord.




