
Parish Mission Statement

Pastor's Note

WORLD MISSION SUNDAY AND THE "LIFE ISSUES"

J begin this week's Pastor's Note with an update on Fr. Desire Salako, S.M.A. As we were able to see from the pictures he shared with us over the summer, Father and the people from one of the 52 out-stations of his mission parish in Liberia built a new chapel for their worship. With the help of the offerings he received from Mary Immaculate of Lourdes parish he was able to buy suitable vessels and religious ornaments for the altar. Last month Fr. Salako and his parishioners celebrated the dedication of their new church as the chapel of St. Elizabeth.



Since then, however, Father Salako has had to leave his pastorate in Liberia at the request of his Superior in Rome in

order to assume a new duty as Father Provincial for a newly-formed province of his missionary congregation, the Society of African Missions. This province includes his home-country Benin, Niger and the Central African Republic. He must see to the care of 71 S.M.A. Fathers and the formation of seminarians for future missionary priests. This, obviously, is a heavy responsibility and we hope to remain in contact with him in order to be of continued help to his mission.

Today we celebrate World Mission Sunday in the Church and take up a Collection which goes to support the Society for the Propagation of the Faith. Our attention to the missionary efforts of the Church in poor countries also offers us an opportunity to consider the relation of the Church's Social Doctrine and Love for the Poor to the issues around Respect for Human Life. In the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* the morality of social justice is addressed under the headings of the Second of the Two Great Precepts of Charity (Love of Neighbor) and the Seventh of the Ten Commandments ("Thou Shalt Not Steal"), particularly under the headings: *IV. Economic Activity and Social Justice (PAR 2226-2236); V. Justice and Solidarity Among Nations (PAR 2437-2442);* and *VI. Love For The Poor (PAR 2443-2449).*

It is sometimes objected that linking the defense of unborn children's right-to-life with other issues of social justice is a way of weakening the Church's position on the immorality of abortion. This would certainly be true if a person were trying to justify his indifference to the evils of the abortion industry by claiming that he is very involved in other social justice issues concerning the poor. But it is also not permitted a Catholic to be indifferent to the whole body of the social doctrine of the Church on the excuse that combating abortion is the only moral issue that really counts.

Everything counts! The moral principles which animate the Church's Defense of the Unborn are the same moral principles which animate the Church's Defense of the Poor against the injustices they face and the degradation of their human lives.

Let us consider, for example, this section from the *Catechism*:

[Human] misery elicited the compassion of Christ the Savior, who willingly took it upon Himself and identified Himself with the least of His brethren. Those who are oppressed by poverty are the object of <u>a preferential love</u> on the part of the Church which, since her origin and in spite of the failings of many of her members, has not ceased to work for their relief, defense, and liberation though numerous works of charity which remain indispensable always and everywhere. SCRIPTURE STUDY

SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY TWENTY-THIRD SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST PHILIPPIANS 3:17-21, 4:1-3

Perhaps the most prominent part of today's passage from Philippians is a brief catechetical point regarding the resurrection of the body (one of the articles of the Apostles' Creed which we hold by faith). St. Paul explains that "we await a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will change our lowly body to be like His glorious body, by the power which enables Him even to subject all things to Himself" (vv. 20-21, RSV). These verses are a perfect preview to next week's commemoration of Christ the King in the 1962 Missal. Our Lord Jesus Christ is the Lord of the cosmos, and human history. No matter how godless the world becomes, or how difficult and burdensome our individual lives become, He is still on his throne (as if anyone or anything could seriously challenge that!).

Sadly, many people in affluent Western culture haven't the slightest idea of how to approach the issues of death or dying, or what to think regarding an afterlife (or if there even is one). This is rooted in their lack of faith in Christ as their Risen King. They do not know Him as their "personal Lord and Savior," as our Evangelical brethren would rightly put it. Our Christian faith, by contrast, gives us a robust picture of what awaits those who are Christ's, namely, bodily resurrection to life. It is on the basis of this promise that St. Paul pleads with his flock in 4:1, "Therefore...stand firm in this way in the Lord, *my beloved*["] (RSV, emphasis mine). What we hold by faith must influence how we live, and by extension, our outlook on eternity. Thus, for example, while we grieve deeply for our beloved dead, and pray diligently for their blessed repose, the Church would also have us stand firm in the promise of their bodily resurrection.

In view of the approaching month of November devoted to prayer for the faithful departed (and just for the sake of comparison with today's passage), let us turn to the following catechesis of St. Paul to the Church in Thessalonica, which is worth quoting in full:

"But we would not have you ignorant, brethren, concerning those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with Him those who have fallen asleep. For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, shall not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord Himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the archangel's call, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first; then we who are alive, who are left, shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air; and so we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore comfort one another with these words." (cf. 1 Thes. 4:13-18).

Thus, St. Paul gives here a fuller treatment of the doctrines of bodily resurrection and the Last Judgment than that which is set forth only briefly in today's passage from Philippians.

While bodily resurrection escapes our personal experience in this life, it is a truth grounded in the certainty of Biblical faith. Our Lady, the Apostles, and many others *saw* the Risen Lord. Our Lady possesses a risen body now along with her Son. *All* people will see this Risen Christ again, as St. John tells us in the book of Revelation: "*Behold*, *He is coming with the clouds, and every eye will see Him, every one who pierced Him*" (cf. Rev. 1:7, RSV).




