
#### Parish Mission Statement

# MORE PICTURES FROM FATHER SALAKO IN LIBERIA

Two weeks ago I shared with you that Fr. Desire Salako had been transferred from his Mission in Liberia to the office of Father Provincial for the African Mission Fathers new Benin-Niger Province. Here are some photos of the dedication of the new out-station chapel of St. Elizabeth, the farewell to him from his parishioners in Sennequellie, and a picture of school-children. The donations we gave to Fr. Salako this summer allowed him to pay the year's school fees for the children orphaned by Ebola and who are being cared for by the parish.

Last year, after consulting with the Parish Finance Council, I had promised Fr. Salako that we would give him the deposit money from the pending sale of the St. Elizabeth Center to his missionary work. This week I sent him a parish check for \$35,000 via the SMA headquarters in New Jersey.

## SCRIPTURE STUDY

### SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY RESUMED 5th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST COLOSSIANS 3:12-17

**A** few weeks ago, we heard St. Paul's exhortation in his Epistle to the Ephesians to "put on the whole armor of God" (cf. Eph. 6:11, RSV). Today, we hear the same command "put on," but with a different set of objects: "Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience" (v. 12, RSV). Two other passages come to mind where the same verb "put on" is utilized. In his Epistle to the Galatians, St. Paul says the following about believers and the sacrament of baptism: "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ have put on Christ" (cf. Gal. 3:27, RSV). In his Epistle to the Romans, St. Paul views the moral life as union with the Person of Jesus, using the same language as in Galatians: "But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires" (cf Rom. 13:14, RSV).

We saw a few weeks ago with St. Jerome's commentary on Ephesians that the call to suit up in the armor of God can be summarized simply as putting on Christ Himself. Thus, the spiritual and moral life of a Christian (described by St. Paul in today's Epistle) flows out of an ontological reality, i.e., union with Jesus on the level of being. In other words, a baptized person's union with Christ in baptism gives him a share in the divine life of the Trinity. From this share in the divine life, he can become holier, that is, more and more like Jesus. In short, these passages above show that St. Paul envisions the Christian life as a totality of union with Jesus: every aspect of our life is lived with, through, and for Him, precisely because we are in Him. To live otherwise is to work directly against the graces of all the sacraments we have received, especially Baptism and the Eucharist. To fail to strive for holiness in every area of life is to stifle the grace of the sacraments, to put obstacles in the way of their full effect on us.

Perhaps the most obvious area of life where

the grace of the sacraments is meant to bear fruit is the area of forgiveness, which St. Paul highlights in vv. 13-14 of today's Epistle. This is the only way we can begin to "let the peace of Christ rule in [our] hearts, to which indeed [we] were called in the one body" (v. 15, RSV). Practicing forgiveness constitutes an invitation/call to experience and share Jesus' love for us in concrete circumstances, not theoretically: "as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive" (v. 13, RSV). The Incarnation and the Passion are by their very nature concrete, not theoretical. On this basis, St. Paul's moral exhortations are not theoretical, either, but based solidly on the sacred humanity of Our Lord. Accordingly, we can see then that today's Epistle paints a portrait of Jesus Himself. Think of the devotion to Our Lord's Sacred Heart: "Jesus, meek and humble of heart, make my heart like unto thine." St. Paul is essentially commanding us to clothe ourselves with the mind, heart, and temperament of Jesus.

In addition to the indispensable grace of the sacraments, the living out of today's Epistle requires sustained effort in daily prayer. We will not grow to be like Jesus if we do not make a concerted effort to pray daily. Likewise, reading and knowing the Scriptures is a pillar of the spiritual life: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly," St. Paul commands us (v. 16, RSV). It does not read, "let the word of Christ dwell in you occasionally," or "whenever you have a left-over scrap of time." As EWTN's Fr. Larry Richards says, "No Bible, no breakfast; no Bible, no bed." Not a bad rule to live by.

In the end, what could truly matter more than being ready each day for the life of heaven? Through our participation in the sacramental life of the Church, and through prayer, Scripture, and the practice of Christian virtue, everything in our life should tend towards that joyful embrace with the Lord, waiting expectantly for the words, "Well done, good and faithful servant...enter into the joy of your master" (cf. Mt. 25:21, RSV). To think and live in this manner is truly to put St. Paul's command in v. 17 into practice: "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (RSV).

# LATIN MASS PROPERS: FIFTH RESUMED SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

INTROIT: Jeremias 29: 11, 12, 14 The Lord saith: I think thoughts of peace, and not of affliction: you shall call Me, and I will hear you; and I will bring back your captivity from all places. *Psalm* 84: 2 Lord, Thou hast blessed Thy land: Thou hast turned away the captivity of Jacob. *V.* Glory be to the Father.

COLLECT In Thine infinite goodness, we beseech Thee, O Lord, to watch over Thy household, that even as it relies solely upon the hope of Thy heavenly grace, so it may ever be defended by Thy protection. Through our Lord.

EPISTLE: Colossians 3: 12-17 Brethren: Put ye on as the elect of God, holy and beloved, the depths of mercy, benignity, humility, modesty, patience: bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if any have a complaint against another: even as the Lord hath forgiven you, so do you also. But above all these things have charity, which is the bond of perfection: and let the peace of Christ rejoice in your hearts, wherein also you are called in one body: and be ye thankful. Let the word of Christ dwell in you abundantly, in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms, hymns and spiritual canticles, singing in grace in your hearts to God. All whatsoever you do in word or in work, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, giving thanks to God and the Father by Jesus Christ our Lord.

But while men were asleep, his enemy came and oversowed tares\* among the wheat, and went his way. And when the blade was sprung up and had brought forth fruit, then appeared also the tares. And the servants said to him: Wilt thou that we go and gather it up? And he said: No, lest perhaps, gathering up the tares, you root up the wheat also together with it. Suffer both to grow until the harvest, and in the time of the harvest I will say to the reapers: Gather up first the tares and bind it into bundles to burn, but the wheat gather ye into my barn.



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
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

St Mary's Cemetery in Needham, founded in the 1870's, is the parish cemetery of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes. The Cemetery is a reverent resting place for those awaiting reunion with the Risen Lord. The decision to pre-plan and purchase interment rights is a responsible and thoughtful gesture, sparing loved ones the stress of making difficult decisions during a time of grief and loss.
