
#### Parish Mission Statement

### Pastor's Note

# CREMATION IS NOT THE CATHOLIC WAY

Last month the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith in Rome issued an instruction "regarding the burial of the deceased and the conservation of the ashes in the case of cremation." This Instruction is entitled: Ad resurgendum cum Christo ("To Rise with Christ"). While re-affirming the Catholic Church's traditional practice of intact-body burial (the "pious practice of burying the dead"), the document also censured the practice of not burying the urn of a person's cremated remains.

Speaking to reporters, Gerhard Cardinal Muller the Prefect for the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith declared: "Belief in the resurrection of the flesh is fundamental. A human cadaver is not trash, [an anonymous burial or scattering of ashes] is not compatible with the Christian faith."

Such a clarification from the CDF is very welcome. The message is that while cremation may be permitted for a Catholic, the urn with the cremated remains must be treated with the same reverence as if it were still an intact body, and properly interred, with memorialization.

Cremation's increased popularity in the United States these days has been in no small part due to aggressive marketing of the practice as a cheaper and quicker way of disposing of the dead. It feeds into the American denial-of-death and sits well with New Age spirituality. Most Catholics today lack the point of reference for gauging just how strongly the Church has opposed the practice of cremation. Here is an example taken from *The Catholic Encyclopedia Dictionary (by Donald Attwater, 2nd Revised Edition, 1949):* 

**Cremation** is the destruction of the body after death by fire, the ashes usually being

preserved; strictly forbidden by the Church which enjoins burial of the body out of reverence to what was in life the temple of the Holy Ghost (I Cor. 6:19) Nevertheless, cremation is not intrinsically wrong, and so may be allowed by ecclesiastical authority for a grave reason, e.g. public health. The Church legislates strictly against it, in addition to the above reason, because its practice has become associated with atheists and materialists, who use it as a manifestation of their disbelief in human immortality and resurrection, and because it is a custom repugnant to Christian tradition and to the universal mind and practice of Christian people.

All of these things are still true today. What has changed is that ecclesiastical authority has relaxed its strictures against cremation—in some part a concession to human weakness because some Catholic people were going to do it anyways once cremation got a hold in popular custom. It does not follow, however, that the Church has done an about-face and therefore now "approves" cremation, as if it were just as good as intact-body burial.

In my role as a priest, when this subject comes up, I never hesitate to remind people that cremation is *not* the Catholic way, that it is an unnecessarily wanton and violent destruction of the human body which should be allowed to dissolve back peacefully into the earth until the day of resurrection. In contrast to the customs of the pagan cultures all around them the Jews of antiquity, and the Christians following them, shunned the practice of cremation. If someone has pre-planned a funeral with cremation for himself, I would urge that person to change those plans. And if you are the one responsible for paying and handling the funeral of a loved one, you should not consider yourself morally bound by the deceased's wishes for cremation. In the next life, the soul of that deceased person will understand, seeing things with an absolute clarity which he did not see on earth.

# SCRIPTURE STUDY

### SUNDAY EPISTLES STUDY RESUMED 6th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST I THESSALONIANS 1:2-10

**M**any scholars agree that 1 Thessalonians is the oldest New Testament document, pre-dating even the writing of the Gospels. We do well to remember that the first generation of Christians did not have a Bible as we understand it, but only the books of the Old Testament, and then a Gospel here or an Epistle there. The teaching and institutions of Jesus were passed on through Apostolic Tradition, out of which issue the books of the New Testament and their canonical compilation (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church nos. 75, 83). As Catholic Biblical scholar Scott Hahn has pithily explained, "The New Testament was a sacrament before it was a document." The foundation of our faith is not the written word, but rather the sacramental reality of the Word-madeflesh and His Church, to which the Scriptures bear witness (cf. In. 1:14). 1 Thessalonians is the first of such written witnesses to the life of the early Church.

St. Paul oftentimes begins his Epistles with prayers for the particular recipient Church (or individual), as well as praise for their growth in discipleship. Such is what we hear in today's passage. In v. 3, St. Paul praises the Thessalonians for their faith, hope, and charity (the three theological virtues infused in us by baptism-cf. Catechism nos. 1266, 1840-1). In vv. 6-9, St. Paul also relates that they have a noted reputation among other Churches in the region because of their wholehearted conversion to Christ, and their joyful commitment in the midst of suffering. This is an important point, for it reminds us that Christianity is not an exercise in dilettantism, on the one hand, or an opportunity for radical crusading, on the other. Our Christian witness will be authentic and reputable when we ourselves are humble, joyful, faithful, and persevering.

The lives of the saints can provide just the encouragement we need when we face temptations and other kinds of challenges to our Christian way

of life. St. Paul shows us today that the saintly reputation of the Thessalonians had a good effect on their fellow Macedonian Christians (and many others, as well). So too, the luminous lives and reputations of saints can strengthen us in our commitment to Christ and his Church.

In this vein, it is a good and wholesome practice for us to become well acquainted with our *ancestral* saints, for our special kinship with them offers us a deep sense of Christian solidarity, fellowship, and identity, especially when we need it most (i.e., during temptations and persecution). Unless we are ethnically Jewish, all of our ancestors were at one time pagan until an apostle or evangelist established a mission, and they, like the Thessalonians, "turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God" (v. 9, RSV). Church history is rich in its tradition of saints who evangelized various parts of the world, like our archdiocesan patron, St. Patrick.

Here at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes, we are especially conscious of the on-going mission of the Church in areas of primary evangelization, because of our strong relationship with Fr. Desire Salako, SMA, and his mission in Liberia, and now in Benin. During the Commemoration of the Living in the Canon of the Mass, the priest acknowledges the prayerful intentions of the laity in the Mass: "paying their homage to You, the eternal God, living and true." This line is a direct quotation from v. 9 of today's Epistle (cf. Milton Walsh, In Memory of Me, p. 64). This is an appropriate time in the Mass to offer a special prayer intention for Fr. Salako's mission of primary evangelization in Africa and his flock of new Christians. May the Lord strengthen all of us, so that we may remain faithful to him and the mission of his Church.

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

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
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
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
