

JANUARY IS THE MONTH OF THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

"TIME HOW SHORT, ETERNITY HOW LONG..."



In a recent essay which appeared in the *New York*Times Magazine by Geoff Dyer
(On Photography, January 8th, 2017), the author reflects on the quick passage of time through the artifact of a found family photograph of himself as a little boy of six with his parents, both

now deceased, in the English countryside, 1963.

"...How precociously bored [this little boy] looks, possibly because back then an afternoon was so vast it constituted a significant portion of life. Now that I'm aboard what Martin Amis called the bullet train of the 50s, an afternoon flashes by so quickly it could probably be photographed with little or no blurring. I'll actually be 60 next year, and so, looking at this picture, I think again of something the poet George Oppen said to Paul Auster about getting old: 'What a strange thing to happen to a little boy.' That, surely, is among the wisest things ever said by anyone about aging."

We cannot avoid the unpleasant feeling of being on a "bullet train" as we go on in life, but our Catholic sense of religion ought to help us counter-balance the ache of time-how-fleeting with the great thought of eternity. Each day we have the opportunity to fill the every-day with the living Christ's redemption of it.

Here follows some suggestions derived from Catholic devotional piety:

Beginning and end of the day:

(On waking) I will raise myself up from this bed of sleep, to adore my God and to labor for the salvation of my soul: may I rise on the Last Day to everlasting life.

(On going to bed) O Lord, grant us this night a peaceful rest, and if we must be wakeful—cheerful, mindful only for our salvation.

The three-fold recitation of the *Angelus* prayer—Morning, Noon and Evening, places Time at the service of Christ's eternity:

(The Morning Angelus): The Resurrection of Christ.

(The Noon Angelus): Christ Mounts the Cross/ Christ triumphantly Ascends into Heaven (noon is the traditional hour for it). (The Evening Angelus): The Annunciation to Mary.

Along these lines different hours of the day recall specific incidents in the Life of Christ and in the Life of the Apostolic Church.

9:00 AM: The Hour of the Coming of the Holy Ghost on Pentecost (Acts 2:15).

12 Noon: Christ mounts the Cross on Good Friday (Matt. 27:45); Christ speaks to the Samaritan Woman at Jacob's Well (John 4:6).

1:00 PM: Healing of the Official's Son (John 4:52-54), "The Hour of Answered Prayers".

3:00 PM: The Hour of Divine Mercy, Christ dies on the Cross (Luke 23:44-45).

4:00 PM: The Hour of the Call of the First Disciples (John 1:39).

5:00 PM: The "Eleventh Hour" of the work-day, the Hour of Last Repentance (Matt. 20:6. 10).

The more we are able to turn our minds to Christ in the course of the day the less hostage we are to wistful longing for what is swiftly passing on our journey here below.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

THE COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL: HOLY FAMILY SECRETA, JANUARY 22nd, A.D. 2017

Jor this week's meditation on the Collects of the Roman Missal, we continue our study of the collects for the Feast of the Holy Family (MR 1962). This week, we examine the Secreta, or "Secret" prayer said quietly by the priest prior to the Sursum Corda dialogue and the Sanctus (this prayer is known as the "Prayer over the Offerings" in the MR 1970). Below is the unofficial translation provided in the Angelus Press edition of the Roman Catholic Daily Missal:

"We offer unto Thee, O Lord, this propitiatory Sacrifice, humbly entreating Thee: that through the intercession of the Virgin Mother of God, with blessed Joseph, Thou wouldst firmly establish our families in Thy peace and grace. Through the same our Lord, etc. Amen."

Broken down into its five-part structure, the Collect looks like this:

- 1. O Lord (address),
- 2. N/A (usually an acclamation of God, but not in this case),
- 3. firmly establish our families in Thy peace and grace (petition),
- 4a. we, who offer this propitiatory Sacrifice, humbly entreating (first motive for petition),
- 4b. through the intercession of Mary and Joseph (second motive for the petition),
- 5. Through the same our Lord (concluding doxological formula).

Re-fashioned into a syllogism, we may interpret the Collect like this:

- A) If Christ, offered on the altar, is a Sacrificial Victim of peace,
- B) And if Mary and Joseph's intercessions are joined to this Sacrifice,
- C) Then God will establish our families in His peace and grace.

The Collect proposes an intrinsic connection between the power of the Eucharistic Sacrifice and the domestic peace for which we pray. The prayer begins with the words "Placationis hostiam offerimus tibi," and ends with "familias nostras in pace et gratia tua firmiter constituas." It begins and ends with peace. We offer to the Father Christ who is the sacrificial Victim who effects peace between God and man by His saving Death and Resurrection (Placationis is a term implying reconciliation and peace). On the basis of the peace we have with God in Christ (cf. Rom. 5:1-5), we hope to receive from the Father the graces needed for making our families communities of His peace.

While peace stands on either end of this Collect, in the center of this prayer, we find the figures of Our Lady and St. Joseph and their intercession linked to the Sacrifice of Christ. Herein the Church professes her splendorous doctrine of the Communion of Saints: wherever Christ is, most especially in the Eucharist, there also are His saints, worshipping Him, acting as mediators of His grace, and praying for the salvation of the world. As the Book of Revelation shows, the Communion of Saints - in Heaven, in Purgatory, and on earth- is actively participating in the offering of the Mass [for a succinct introduction to this teaching, read the section on the Liturgy in the Catechism, as well as Scott Hahn's *The Lamb's Supper*]. According to this Collect, Our Lady and St. Joseph are intimately associated in the Sacrifice of Jesus for the gifts of domestic peace and grace, in particular. What a joyful doctrine! Whatever joys and sorrows we are experiencing in marriage and family life, let us entrust them all to the Father through the love of the Holy Family. Let us trust that God will give us graces with which to cooperate in strengthening bonds of charity in our marriages and families.

For I also am a man subject to authority, having under me soldiers; and I say to this: Go and he goeth; and to another: Come, and he cometh; and to my servant: Do this, and he doeth it. And Jesus hearing this marveled, and said to them that followed Him: Amen I say to you, I have not found so great faith in Israel. And I say to you, that many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven: but the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into the exterior darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. And Jesus said to the centurion: Go, and as thou hast believed, so be it done to thee. And the servant was healed at the same hour.

OFFERTORY: Psalm 65. 117. 16-17 The right hand of the Lord hath wrought strength: the right hand of the Lord hath exalted me: I shall not die, but live, and shall declare the works of the Lord.

SECRET May this offering, O Lord, we pray Thee, cleanse away our sins, and sanctify the bodies and minds of Thy servants for the celebration of this sacrifice.


