

Pastor's Note



LITURGICAL RENEWAL AND THE SUNG MASS

An outstanding feature of the Liturgical Renewal

Movement which became part of the liturgical reforms of the Second Vatican Council is the emphasis on the sung Mass. For example, the New Order of Mass promulgated by Pope Paul VI in 1970, eliminated the strict delineation between the sung Mass and the "read" Mass. The New Order of Mass allows for and encourages as much of the Mass to be sung as is practicable at a Mass celebrated with the people.

According to Musicam Sacram (Instruction on Music in the Liturgy, 5 March, 1967):

"Liturgical worship is given a more noble form when it is celebrated in song, with the ministers of each degree fulfilling their ministry and the people participating in it." (MS 5)

[and]

"One cannot find anything more religious and more joyful in sacred celebration than a whole congregation expressing its faith and devotion in song. Therefore the active participation of the whole people, which is shown in singing, is to be carefully promoted as follows: (a) It should first of all include acclamations, responses to the greetings of the priests and ministers and to the prayers of litany form, and also antiphons and psalms, refrains or repeated responses, hymns and canticles. (b) Through suitable instruction and practices, the people should be gradually led to a fuller indeed, to a complete—participation in those parts of the singing which pertain to them. (c)Some of the people's song, however, especially if the faithful have not yet been sufficiently instructed, or if musical settings for several voices are used, can be handed over

to the choir alone, provided that the people are not excluded from those parts that concern them. But the usage of entrusting to the choir alone the entire singing of the whole Proper and of the whole Ordinary, to the complete exclusion of the people's participation in the singing, is to be deprecated." (MS 16)

To these ends in the celebration of our Traditional Latin Mass on Sundays, where we always have either a *Missa Cantata* or a Solemn High Mass, I want to lay emphasis on the participation of the people in the singing of the Mass. Our Latin Mass Choir is here to lead the sacred music and to keep us on the right notes. They are not here to completely exclude us. The people (the assembly of the Christian faithful) are meant to join in the singing not only of the responses (such as "et cum spiritu tuo" to "Dominus vobiscum") but also of the Propers and Ordinary Prayers of the Mass as well.

I have asked our music director Bobbie
Hoffmann to use more Chant Mass settings on
Sundays in order to accustom ourselves to
singing the Ordinary Prayers (Kyrie, Gloria,
Credo, Sanctus-Benedictus, Agnus Dei.) I am
also putting out photocopies of the Sunday
Antiphons proper to the day (Introit-OffertoryCommunion) in the hopes that more people will
try to join in the singing of them or at least be
following what is being sung more closely.
Mother Church does not give us this sacred
chant for it to become an easy listening channel
of mysterious mood music. We have to try to
enter into it and even to lend our voices to it.

St. Augustine's famous saying, "He who sings, prays twice" was in this context. It is not just that we are singing at Mass that is praiseworthy, but rather that we are singing the prayers of the Mass itself.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

THE COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL: SEPTEMBER 10th, 2017 SAINT JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

Jor this week's meditation on the Collects of the Roman Missal, we consider the Collect for the Feast of St. John Chrysostom (MR '70), celebrated on September 13. Below is the Collect's official ICEL translation in the third typical edition of the *Roman Missal* (2010):

"O God, strength of those who hope in You, who willed that the Bishop Saint John Chrysostom should be illustrious by his wonderful eloquence and his experience of suffering, grant us, we pray, that, instructed by his teachings, we may be strengthened through the example of his invincible patience. Through our Lord, etc."

Broken down into its five-part structure, the Collect looks like this:

- 1. O God, strength of those who hope in You (address),
- 2. Who willed that the Bishop Saint John Chrysostom should be illustrious by his wonderful eloquence and his experience of suffering (ascription),
- 3. Grant us, we pray, that, we may be strengthened (petition)
- 4. Through the example of his invincible patience, instructed by his teachings (motive for the petition),
- 5. Through our Lord, etc. (concluding doxological formula).

Re-fashioned into a syllogism, we may interpret the Collect like this:

- A) If God made St. John Chrysostom shine both as an example of fortitude amid suffering and a teacher of sacred doctrine,
- B) And if we are rooted in his teaching and draw inspiration from his invincible patience,
- C) Then God will give us the strength we need to persevere in faith and hope amid our trials.

For the past two weeks, we have looked at the Collects for the feasts of two great Western Fathers and Doctors. This week, we consider St. John

Chrysostom, one of the greatest of the Eastern Fathers and Doctors. In the Byzantine Rite (the Rite which developed in Constantinople, where Chrysostom was Patriarch), he is lovingly known as "our father among the saints".

We can note firstly that the notion of strength, or the virtue of fortitude, is found both in the



address and the petition. We ask for strength from God who is Himself "the strength of those who hope in You, in te sperantium fortitudo." When the Church prays, she teaches us to have filial confidence that our petitions will be fulfilled on the basis of God's character and His works. Such confidence is the virtue of Christian hope. God does not withhold strength from those who seek it Him. Furthermore, we may hope to receive strength, because God has given us a strong saint on whom to rely. God willed St. John Chrysostom to "be illustrious" (clarescere), that is, "to shine" in two respects: holiness of life and the teaching of the faith.

Indeed, as the accounts of his life show, he is a brilliant example of unconquerable patience (i.e., fortitude amid suffering). For example, many in the imperial court resented him for his robust moral teaching, especially the Empress Eudoxia, who exiled him twice (he eventually died in exile). St. John's courage reveals God's grace at work amid history's recurring clashes between Church and Crown/State.

Additionally, our saint "shines," because he has bequeathed to us some of the most lucid teaching and preaching that has ever been delivered and penned in all of Church history. "Chrysostom" is a Greek title meaning "golden-mouth," popularly applied to him because of his gifts in preaching and teaching. When you read him, it is like he could have spoken it yesterday. So clear, so strong—I encourage anyone and everyone to pick up Chrysostom for spiritual reading. May his invincible patience and purity of doctrine give us strength to persevere in hope.





And they that are Christ's have crucified their flesh with the vices and concupiscences.

Behold the birds of the air; for they neither sow nor do they reap, nor gather into barns, and your heavenly Father feedeth them. Are you not of much more value than they? And which of you, by taking thought, can add to his stature one cubit? And for raiment why are you solicitous? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they labor not, neither do they spin; but I say to you, that not even Solomon in all his glory was arrayed as one of these. Now if God so clothe the grass of the field, which is today, and tomorrow is cast into the oven, how much more you, O ye of little faith! Be not solicitous therefore saying: What shall we eat, or what shall we drink, or wherewith shall we be clothed? for after all these things do the heathens seek. For your Father knoweth that you have need of all these things. Seek ye therefore first the Kingdom of God, and His justice; and all these things shall be added unto you.

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
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
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
