Pastor's Note

"GLORY TO THE BLOOD OF JESUS"

As we continue to give special consideration during this Month of July to the Mystery of Christ's Most Precious Blood as the Price of our Redemption, we do well to think on the concept of "atonement". It is central to the religious faith of Christianity. Without it Christianity collapses in on itself and ends up—at best—as a merely ethical attitude towards life, rich in cultural patrimony to be sure but nonetheless incoherent at its core.

The Death of Jesus Christ by Roman crucifixion is first and foremost a theological Mystery, contradicting and confounding all human understanding. Any other insight we can derive about the human condition from the unjust putting-to-death of Jesus is secondary and incidental to the Mystery.

Jesus Christ's death on the Cross was an Atonement for sin-guilt. It was a vicarious universal expiation, a satisfaction for all the sins of mankind. We can never repeat this enough: Jesus Christ, though He was Himself innocent and just, free from any sin whatsoever, He became sin for us." What a statement! "He became sin for us."

God became man in order to carry out an atoning sacrifice for the sin-guilt of all mankind. Jesus willingly sacrificed the life of His human nature to appease the Justice of God. His terrible death on that Cross was therefore a saving death—for us. He died there on Mount Calvary so that we would not have to die the eternal death. Simply put, without the Atonement there could be no supernatural life in Heaven for us. As with the people in the Bible before Christ, when you died you went down to *Sheol*, that is, to the netherworld, the place of the dead.

Without the Atonement, Divine Mercy would be only a fiction, a euphemism for a general amnesty covering up injustice, along the lines of the thief who exclaims, "I love committing crimes, God loves pardoning them—indeed things are admirably arranged!

With the Atonement, however, the scales of Justice have been balanced, and so therefore the Divine Mercy is offered to the presently guilty in the world for a time, in order that they may repent before their bodily death decides the matter once and for all. The last thing we ever need to worry about is sin going unpunished.

On the site of the former Nazi concentration camp at Dachau there is a Carmel of nuns who dedicate their cloistered lives of prayer and sacrifice in atonement for the unspeakable crimes committed there between 1933-1945. This Carmel was established in the 1960s. It is dedicated to the Most Precious Blood of Jesus. Its mission?

All sufferings of the world should be incorporated in Jesus Christ, in this Jesus who conquered death by shedding His Blood on the Cross, and in whom alone all concentrated sufferings of all time can be reconciled and changed. The love of Jesus Christ shows the triumph over the infernal hatred of all times, a triumph of divine love in which all can participate already in faith. ("The Meaning of Praying Service of the Carmelites at Carmel Precious Blood, Dachau") (Fr. Higgins)

SCRIPTURE STUDY

COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL SUNDAY, JULY 8th, 2018: SECRET PRAYER FOR THE 7th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

(Missale Romanum 1962)

Jor today's meditation on the Collects of the Roman Missal, we consider the *Secreta* for today's Mass of the Seventh Sunday after Pentecost (*Missale Romanum* 1962). Below is the English translation of this prayer in the *Campion Missal and Hymnal*:

"O God, Who hast sanctioned the diversity of offerings by the perfection of one sacrifice, receive the sacrifice offered Thee by Thy devoted servants, and sanctify it as Thou didst sanctify the gifts of Abel, that what each one hath offered to the glory of Thy majesty may profit for the salvation of all. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

This prayer claims that God has authorized the form and substance of Old Testament sacrificial worship by means of Christ's sacrifice, even though that had yet to occur in linear time. Christ's offering of Himself as Priest and Victim on the Cross is the basis and fulfillment of all the sacrificial offerings of the covenants that preceded it. Likewise, this ascription clause refers to the individual spiritual sacrifices of the baptized joined to Christ's one offering at Mass (cf. Rom. 12:1). All individual sacrifices in linear time, both of the Patriarchs and of all the baptized, converge upon the one sacrifice of Calvary (cf. Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 1085).

On this basis, then, the petition asks God to receive and sanctify our sacrifice as He did that of Abel. This rehearses what the priest will pray in the Canon, wherein Christ as Priest-Victim on the altar is linked to His mystical types in the Old Testament, such as Abel. But this portion of the Canon, like our Collect today, refers not only to Christ's offering, but also to our offerings joined to Christ's. Fr. Milton Walsh explains this beautifully in his book on the Roman Canon: "We are asking the Father to accept our sacrifice, and, insofar as it is Christ's sacrifice, it has already been accepted. The point of uncertainty is our part in the offering and the extent to which we imitate and internalize

Christ's self-offering...These Old Testament heroes are brought forward as models of the inner dispositions with which we should approach God" (cf. Walsh, In Memory of Me, p. 129).

According to today's *Secreta* prayer, then, as well as the Canon, each of the baptized offers something upon the altar in union with Christ, and should seek to please Him in his or her sacrifice, as did the Patriarchs of old.

What exactly do the baptized offer to God at the Mass? In what precisely does baptismal priesthood consist? Catechism no. 901, which quotes the Second Vatican Council's Dogmatic Constitution on the Church, Lumen Gentium no. 34, speaks to this matter: "Hence the laity, dedicated as they are to Christ and anointed by the Holy Spirit, are marvelously called and prepared so that even richer fruits of the Spirit maybe produced in them. For all their works, prayers, and apostolic undertakings, family and married life, daily work, relaxation of mind and body, if they are accomplished in the Spirit - indeed even the hardships of life if patiently born - all these become spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. In the celebration of the Eucharist these may most fittingly be offered to the Father along with the body of the Lord. And so, worshipping everywhere by their holy actions, the laity consecrate the world itself to God, everywhere offering worship by the holiness of their lives." [emphasis mine]

This conciliar teaching echoes the substance of our *Secreta* prayer rather well, including its result clause. The baptized can bring spiritual benefit to the Mystical Body, insofar as their sacrifices are worthily joined to Christ in his Church's divine worship. May we ever orient the whole of our lives to Christ on the altar of heaven and the altar of our parish Church.

Through our Lord.

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
