



## **Pastor's Note**

### THE PARISH ALTAR RELICS

**A**s many people have noticed, our high altar has a number of reliquaries displayed. In the photo to the right you can see a large reliquary which contains a first-class relic of St. Bernadette Soubirous, the visionary of Lourdes. Here follows a guide to all of the displayed relics.

At the base of the statue of Pope St. John Paul II there is a reliquary which contains several saints' relics: *St. Dominic, St. Catherine of Siena, St.* 

Raymond Peñafort, and St. Albert the Great. The next three reliquaries, each in front of a candlestick, are: 1) Pope St. Pius X (who was the reigning Pope when this parish church of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes was dedicated), 2) St. Maria Goretti, Virgin and Martyr for the holy virtue of purity, and 3) St. Elizabeth Queen of Portugal, the namesake and grand-niece of St. Elizabeth of Hungary, who was given special grace to re-establish peace where there had been division and of mitigating the fury of war.

On the other side of the tabernacle are another three reliquaries, each in front of a candlestick: 1) *Padre Pio of Pietrelcina*: the relic is piece of one of his bandages which would bleed from his stigmata whenever he said Mass. 2) *St. Bernadette Soubirous*, the visionary of Lourdes and 3) *St. Catherine Labouré*, who received the vision of Our Lady which has become the Miraculous Medal. Finally, at the base of St. Michael's statue is another reliquary with several saints: St. Catherine of Siena, St. Rita of Cascia, St. Rose of Lima, St. Philomena, and St. Thérèse of the Child Jesus.

Inside the altar stone itself are the relics placed there at the time of the altar's consecration, symbolically buried inside the stone as if buried in a tomb. In this way the practice of the early Church of saying Mass over the tombs of its martyrs during the long ages of persecution by the Roman Empire is perpetuated. Unfortunately, there is nothing we have in our parish archives which tells us whose relics are inside our altar sepulchre. When the priest kisses the altar stone as he begins the offering of Mass it is very good for us to remember that he is not only reverencing the altar as it signifies Christ, but he is also venerating the tombs of the martyrs. The free-standing altar we use for most of our Novus Ordo Masses has an altar stone as well: it was taken from the original altar in the downstairs church, which now serves as our parish hall.

What is the purpose of giving such honor to the earthly relics of the Saints? One important reason is to increase our faith in the Resurrection to come. God will raise both their bodies and ours back to life on the Last Day. Another reason is to increase our faith in the power of the Saints' intercession on our behalf, now that they share in Christ's Victory in heaven. During Christ's lifetime supernatural power went forth from His Sacred Humanity and healed those who approached Him. So too, the Saints who enjoy God in heaven share in something of that same supernatural power which went forth from Christ by their relics. Their bones, ashes, clothes, or other objects used by them-by divine permission these relics may (and do!) "work wonders on earth". They "exorcise devils, heal the sick, restore sight to the blind, cleanse lepers, drive away temptations and bestow on all the excellent gifts which come from the Father of light" (Matins, Divine Office, Feast of the Holy Relics).

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# SCRIPTURE STUDY

#### COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 16th, 2018: EMBERTIDE IN SEPTEMBER (Missale Romanum 1962)

"Grant unto us, we beseech Thee, almighty God, that fasting from food we may be filled with Thy grace, and by abstinence may become stronger than all our enemies. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

Over the summer, my cousin and his wife mentioned one evening over dinner that they fast at seasonal intervals for health reasons. Intrigued, I mentioned how the Church has a similar practice in her ancient, apostolic tradition of the twelve Ember days. Four times each year, roughly around the beginning of each new season, there are three days within a week especially devoted to prayer and fasting. The intention: to sanctify, in advance, each month of the coming season.

While fasting and abstinence can yield health benefits, Christian fasting, by contrast, focuses primarily on spiritual health. The Collect above specifies this quite clearly: our efforts to minimize our intake of food is meant to have an inverse spiritual effect of expanding our capacity to receive divine grace.

It is this fact alone that allows for the second (rather astonishing) petition of the Collect to make any sense at all: "[that] by abstinence [we] may become stronger than all our enemies." The enemies under consideration here are not the demons proper, but rather, our vices, as well as the temptations which the demons precipitate. Our penances are the means by which our souls can receive more of the power of God's grace, according to the first petition. <u>And it is this</u> grace which slays our vices and fortifies our souls against the temptations wrought by the demons, rendering us "stronger than all our enemies." As Jesus said, "apart from <u>Me</u> you can do nothing" (cf. Jn. 15:5, RSV, emphasis mine). [Warning: we should never be so foolish as to think that we can face the devil head-on by our asceticism].

In view of this, consider the following remarks of St. Paul on God's grace in the face of human weakness: "Three times I begged the Lord about this, that it should leave me; but He said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness.'...for when I am weak, then I am strong" (cf. 2 Cor. 12:8-10, RSV). This frank admission helps us to interpret Jesus' words to the disciples in their proper sense: "But this kind is not cast out but by prayer <u>and fasting</u>" (cf. Mt. 17:21, Douai-Rheims, emphasis mine). Fasting, while sometimes indispensably important in the spiritual struggle, is never an end in itself, but strictly a means to receiving more of God's grace for victory.

Penance is a *de-facto* part of Christian life, as we read in the Catechism of the Catholic Church no. 1435: "Taking up one's cross each day and following Jesus is the surest way of penance." Hear it: The surest way of penance. In order for us to make this daily opportunity for holiness more fruitful, however, we also need to engage in other voluntary penances at regular intervals. The fasting of Embertide, while optional, may still prove to be of welcome assistance in our normal spiritual struggle outside of Lent, because we truly need all the means of grace the Church provides for us. Observing Embertide in some fashion, therefore, whether by fasting or some other penance, will help us to bear whatever cross we already have to bear a little more bravely than before. This itself is highly meritorious when done in union with Christ, and can greatly sanctify our daily habits.

By the word of the Lord the heavens were established; and all the power of them by the spirit of His mouth. ALLELUIA: Alleluia, alleluia. *V*. O Lord, hear my prayer; and let my cry come to Thee. Alleluia.

GOSPEL: Matthew 22:34-46 **A**t that time, the Pharisees came to Jesus, and one of them, a doctor of the Law, asked Him, tempting Him: which is the great commandment of the Law? Jesus said to him: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with thy whole heart, and with thy whole soul and with thy whole mind. This is the greatest and first commandment. And the second is like to this: Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. On these two commandments dependeth the whole Law and the prophets. And the Pharisees being gathered together, Jesus asked them, saying: what think you of Christ, whose son is He? They say to Him: David's. He saith to them: How then doth David, in spirit, call Him Lord, saying: the Lord said to my Lord: Sit on my right hand until I make Thy enemies Thy footstool? If David then call Him Lord, how is He his son? And no man was able to answer Him a word; neither durst any man, from that day forth, ask Him any more questions.

**OFFERTORY:** Daniel 9: 9, 10, 18, 19 I, Daniel, prayed to my God, saying: Hear, O Lord, the prayers of Thy servant; show Thy face upon Thy sanctuary, and favourably look down upon this people, upon whom Thy name is invoked, O God.

**SECRET** We humbly implore Thy majesty, O Lord, that the holy mysteries we are celebrating, may free us both from past sins and future transgressions. Through our Lord.
