Pastor's Note



ST. JUDE (THADDEUS), APOSTLE

The Church's Year of Grace for 2018 is drawing to its close and the chief thought which the Church's liturgy puts before us in these last weeks is the glorious Second Advent of Christ. The Feast of the Kingship of Christ (today in the 1962 Missal, the Last Sunday of the Year in the 1970 Missal) anticipates the definitive, absolute triumph of Christ at the end of Time. The Feast of All Saints on November 1st celebrates the Church of the Heavenly Jerusalem.

On the Calendar of Saints today is also the Feast of two of the Twelve Holy Apostles: SS. Simon and Jude. Their Feast is not commemorated this year, however, because it falls on Sunday.

In Catholic devotion St. Jude retains a beloved place as the "Saint of the Impossible", on account of the proven power of his prayers on behalf of those who invoke him with humble faith.

St. Jude was a brother to the Apostle James the Less, a relative of Jesus. His mother was Mary, a sister or cousin of the Blessed Virgin; his father Alphaeus was related to St. Joseph. One of the seven "Catholic Letters" in the New Testament was written by St. Jude. Popular devotion honors him as the helper in 'hopeless cases'. Simon and Jude first preached the Gospel in countries widely distant from one another, Simon in Egypt and Jude in Mesopotamia. It is said that later both went to Persia and after extensive missionary work were put to death for the faith. (Pius Parsch, <u>The Church's Year of Grace</u>, Vol V, A.D. 1958)

A beautiful prayer to St. Jude is found in the *Raccolta*:

O glorious Saint Jude Thaddeus, by those sublime prerogatives, wherewith thou was ennobled in thy lifetime, namely, thy kinship with Our Lord Jesus Christ according to the flesh, and thy vocation to be an Apostle; by that glory which now is thine in heaven as the reward of thine apostolic labors and thu martyrdom: obtain for us from the Giver of every good and perfect gift all the graces whereof we stand in need in order to treasure up in our hearts the divinely inspired doctrines which thou has transmitted to us in thy Epistle; that is to say, to build our edifice of perfection upon our most holy faith, praying by the grace of the Holy Spirit; to keep ourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of Jesus Christ unto eternal life: to strive by all means to help them that go astray; exalting thus the glory and majesty, the dominion and power of Him who is able to keep us without sin and to present us spotless with exceeding joy at the coming of our divine Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

We are well aware indeed of our helplessness in the face of the larger forces governing over us. What consolation indeed to know that we have recourse to the Saints who are now eternally happy in heaven, whose own wills are freely and fully aligned with the divine will, and who are so eager to do us good in order that we may join them in the New and Eternal Jerusalem.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28th, 2018: *STEWARDSHIP (PART III)*

Today's column is the third in the reprinting of my four-part series on the Biblical basis for the Fifth Precept of the Church, "You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church." Today, we look at the encounter of the Rich Young Man with Jesus in Matthew 19:16-26 (RSV):

16 And behold, one came up to Him, saying, "Teacher, what good deed must I do, to have eternal life?" 17 And He said to him, "Why do you ask Me about what is good? One there is who is good. If you would enter life, keep the commandments." 18 He said to him, "Which?" And Jesus said, "You shall not kill, You shall not commit adultery, You shall not steal, You shall not bear false witness, 19 Honor your father and mother, and, You shall love your neighbor as yourself." 20 The young man said to Him, "All these I have observed; what do I still lack?" 21 Jesus said to Him, "If you would be perfect, go, sell what you possess and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." 22 When the young man heard this he went away sorrowful; for he had great possessions. 23 And Jesus said to His disciples, "Truly, I say to you, it will be hard for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven. 24 Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God." 25 When the disciples heard this they were greatly astonished, saying, "Who then can be saved?" 26 But Jesus looked at them and said to them, "With men this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

The central point of this episode is that Jesus calls the rich young man to embrace Him as the highest Good (cf. John Paul II, *Veritatis Splendor*, chapter 1). Hence, Jesus' initial reply in v. 17, "*One there is who is good*," i.e., God Himself (cf. Lk 18:19). Even though this upright young man observed the majority of the Ten Commandments, his attachment to his wealth precluded a perfect observance of the First and Tenth Commandments (the prohibitions against idolatry and material covetousness). We should not misunderstand Jesus' focus on possessions as a *universal* call for the abolition of private property and wealth. Rather, we should receive it as a clear statement on the *hierarchy of goods*. Jesus teaches quite plainly that spiritual goods trump temporal goods in value. Money should not be cherished more than God.

Accordingly, Jesus' words find their fullest meaning in the Religious/Monastic Life, as well as certain forms of apostolic life, where a total or near-total personal relinquishment of material wealth is constitutive to the rule of life, in imitation of Jesus' own life (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 915-916, 932). This counsel/call was given to the Apostles and other associates in their band. These accepted Jesus' call for the sake of a higher end, and He promised them abundant heavenly rewards surpassing whatever they sacrificed out of love for Him (vv. 27-30).

How do Jesus' words apply to us? Exactly in the sense I have given above, namely, that we are called to value spiritual goods above earthly ones. This is where the truth of the Church's Fifth Precept dovetails with the truth of Jesus' counsel. <u>We should provide for the needs of our own parish Church, because she supplies us with the majority of our spiritual goods in this life.</u>

Offering a tithe of 5-10% of one's income manifests concretely that we believe that God is more important than our personal wealth. Stewardship-level giving is therefore an act of thanksgiving to God for the spiritual goods of our parish Church, and secondly, a means of ensuring that the temporal necessities of her mission are duly met. Trust in God's goodness and love to give you the grace to make a worthy offering. In this passage, Jesus tells the Apostles what Gabriel tells Our Lady, "with God all things are possible" (v. 26; cf. Lk. 1:37).



EPISTLE: From the Letter of Blessed Paul the Apostle to the Colossians, 1. 12-20.
