

MASS OFFERINGS AND MASS INTENTIONS: MARY IMMACULATE OF LOURDES PARISH, 2018

J want to use this week's Pastor's Note to summarize the current procedure I have in place regarding requests for Masses to be offered for specific intentions.

At present I handle all of the Mass requests myself and keep the Mass Books in my office. We receive your Mass requests variously from envelopes dropped off at the parish office, envelopes deposited together with the Sunday Offertory, phone messages, letters or parish emails. Once the request gets to me, if the request is for a public announced Mass I enter it into the parish's Daily Mass Record: if, however, it is for an unannounced Mass, I either fit it into the Daily Mass Record as a Mass *Intention of the Donor* or I send it on to be said by a priest elsewhere. Fr. Salako has indicated to me that Mass stipends from here would be very helpful for the support of his missionaries.

The custom of the faithful asking for Masses to be offered for their specific intentions and of giving a modest offering for the priest who celebrates it is a praiseworthy one. The requested Mass stipend (offering) for a Mass is set in the Archdiocese of Boston at \$10, whether the Mass be announced or unannounced. A priest is allowed to receive 1 Mass stipend a day (\$10). If he says more than one stipend-Mass on a given day, he is not allowed to receive those further offerings. They are directed instead to the support of the church in other areas. Any offering amounts we may receive in excess of the \$10 stipend for a requested Mass are treated as donations to our parish.

We have many public Masses each week at Mary Immaculate of Lourdes and we are, for the most part, able to accommodate the Mass intention requests we receive. In order to do this, however, we have to make use of the provision Cardinal Seán has allowed for up to two parish Masses per-week being reserved as "Collective Intention" Masses. These two Masses are the Sunday 10:30 AM Latin Mass and the Saturday 9:00 AM Latin Mass. We are a parish church with a single resident parish priest: we are not a shrine with several priests offering Masses, nor do we have connections with any Traditional Latin Mass group to take on any of our Latin Mass-only Mass intention requests which we are unable to satisfy in a timely fashion here. (The requested stipends for Traditional Latin Mass communities are \$20 or more in many places, so we cannot simply send them on as we do with the S.M.A. Fathers.)

There are particular Mass times each week which are always reserved hence unavailable for any other Mass-intention request. These are the Sunday 7:30 AM *Pro Populo* and the Monday 7:30 AM *Purgatorial Society of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes*. Also, I am now reserving the Holy Day Masses for *Pro Populo* and the *Holy Day Intention of the Parish*. THIS INCLUDES THE MASSES OF CHRISTMAS EVE AND CHRISTMAS DAY. If someone requests an intention for one such unavailable Mass, I will include their request as a *Memento* (secondary intention) at that Mass but book the stipend Mass intention itself at the nearest

available date.

With regard to our Mass intention request procedures the following pointers might be helpful:

- Please write a contact phone number or email address on the Mass intention envelope in case we have any questions about the request.
- The Mass Card station set up in the vestibule of the rectory is for your convenience, so that you can choose a Mass card and make a request even when the office is closed on Sundays. It is presumed that a card is being chosen at the same time a Mass request is being placed. I ask that people not "stockup" with Mass cards to bring home and then use as the occasion demands. This causes us to have to replenish our inventory more than we otherwise would have to, and it increases the risk that the eventual giver of the Mass card might forget to actually have the Mass said!
- I reserve the right to decide if the request for an announced Mass intention is inappropriate for a public Mass: it may be too personal, too expressive of a person's opinions on divisive "issues of the day", too likely to cause misunderstanding or *admiratio* (i.e., attracting undue attention), etc. In such case I will list the Mass in the bulletin as *Intention of the Donor*.
- With multiple Mass requests at once, unless they indicate specific future dates, if they all cannot be satisfied here at the parish in a timely manner, I will send the remaining stipends to Fr. Salako's S.M.A. Mission.

I hope that this summary of our Mass Intention procedures will clarify how it all "works" within our parish office.

THE BEST HOMAGE TO MARY: LOVING GOD AND NEIGHBOR

(From Pope St. Paul VI's "Message to the Mexican People", 1970)



Christians can do no less than to show solidarity in seeking a solution to the situation of those to whom the bread of culture has not yet come nor the opportunity of honorable and justly remunerated work. They cannot

For this reason, on this celebrated feast [Our Lady of Guadalupe], We urge you from Our heart to give your Christian life a clear social sense—as the [Second Vatican] Council has asked-that you may always be in the front line in all efforts to attain progress, and in all the initiatives for improving the situation of those who suffer want. See in each person a brother or sister—a brother or sister in Christ—in such a way that the love of God and the love of neighbor become united in the same love, alive and operative, which is the only thing that can redeem the miseries of the world, renewing it in its most profound root, the human heart.

SCRIPTURE STUDY

COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL SUNDAY, DECEMBER 9th, 2018:

Third Sunday of Advent: Missale Romanum 1962

"Incline Thine ear, we beseech Thee, O Lord, to our petitions: and, by the grace of Thy visitation, enlighten the darkness of our minds: Who livest and reignest, etc. Amen."

Today's Collect invites us to consider more deeply how Christ's Nativity saves us. In order to get to that point, however, we must first identify *that from which* Christ saves us.

The second petition of this Collect asks God to *"enlighten the darkness of our minds."* Remember that the Collects always assume that those praying are baptized (the sacramental seal or character of Baptism is ordered to divine worship). Therefore, this darkness cannot refer to Original Sin, or the lack of faith that precedes baptismal regeneration. It refers, rather, to the way in which the *baptized* are struggling to refute the error of the devil in temptation, and to repel his attacks against faith.

At the root of every sin is an error of some kind prompted by the devil. We see this in the Garden of Eden, when the devil questions God's words and twists Adam and Eve's understanding thereof: "Did God say, 'You shall not eat of any tree of the garden'?" (Cf. Gen. 3:1ff., RSV). The Catechism of the Catholic Church, in its coverage of the First Commandment, likewise identifies error as the root of every sin:

2087: "Our moral life has its source in faith in God who reveals His love to us. St. Paul speaks of the 'obedience of faith' as our first obligation. He shows that 'ignorance of God' is the principle and explanation of all moral deviations. Our duty toward God is to believe in Him and to bear witness to Him." 2088: "The first commandment requires us to nourish and protect our faith with prudence and vigilance, and to reject everything that is opposed to it."

In other words, the "*darkness of our minds*," is our ongoing struggle against the error of the devil: distorted notions about our good and loving God and who we are in relation to Him, and of the other revealed truths of our Catholic faith.

The hope our Collect proposes is "the grace of [Christ's] visitation." This refers both to the Nativity, as well as to the personal presence of Christ in the soul through sacramental grace. The two are closely related. In regard to the former, the grace of Christ's visitation is precisely the mystery of the Incarnation.

Christ is a divine Person with a full human nature (He is not a human person). Only a *divine* Person can save the human race from sin, and Christ does so by assuming (taking upon Himself) a perfect human nature, so as to transform and redeem fallen human nature. The forgiveness and grace that Christ offers from His Cross and Resurrection now make it possible for man *not* to be a slave to sin or the error that undergirds sin (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 1741-2). Christ's Nativity is the manifestation of this truth of the Incarnation: a divine Person has come in the flesh to save us! We can enter more deeply into this truth every Christmas, because we rely continually upon this divine Savior to save us from error and sin.

And this is itself the second way of interpreting the phrase "*the grace of Thy visitation*." Our increased participation in Christ's divine life in our souls *does*, in fact, save us. The more we grow in our understanding of our Catholic faith, the more we will know Christ Himself, and be conformed to His image. In this way, we can say that Christ is "*born*" in our souls each Christmas. Consequently, we can have confidence in the divine truth that forcefully asserts itself against the blasphemous errors underlying sin (cf. Bl. Columba Marmion, *Christ in His Mysteries*, pp. 10-13).


