Pastor's Note

SEPTUAGESIMA: THE EASTER CYCLE BEGINS

Ten weeks from today is Easter Sunday. On this Sunday of Septuagesima we begin the Easter Cycle of the Church's

Year of Grace. Now therefore is the time for us to begin our own personal remote preparations for the penitential season of Lent.

Ash Wednesday falls on March 6th. In order to make a good Lent we ought to have laid out our Lenten program and resolutions ahead of time.

A good Lent is a "Forty Days" attuned to the Church's well-developed traditions of communal observance. First and foremost is the tradition of attending daily Mass from Ash Wednesday through Easter Week. Even if a person is prevented from physically attending the daily Mass, it is still possible to unite oneself to these Masses by following the Mass readings at home from day to day and joining one's intention to the Mass of the day, making also a Spiritual Communion.

Second, we ought to avail ourselves of the opportunity to take part in a communal exercise of spiritual renewal. Here at our parish of Mary Immaculate of Lourdes we have our well-established practice of a weekly Lenten mission on Friday nights with Stations of the Cross and a Sermon Series. This year's Lenten Mission theme is entitled: Lourdes and the World of Second Empire France. Each Friday we will consider the events of Lourdes in their social reality of the France at that time. The Friday Mission will be held over six Fridays, from Friday after Ash Wednesday, March 8th, to Friday in Passion Week, April 12th, from 7:30-8:30 PM. Please join us and spread the word of invitation to others.

Third, we ought to be conscientious about observing the laws of fast and abstinence during Lententide. The two tables below list the regulations according to the current discipline of the Church (obligatory) alongside the older, stricter discipline (which may be observed by anyone out of personal devotion):

CURRENT DISCIPLINE

Days of Abstinence
Begins on one's 14th
birthday.
Ash Wednesday and the
Fridays of Lent.
Obliges abstention from
flesh meat.

<u>Days of Penance</u> Applies to all the Faithful. Lent and Fridays outside of Lent.

Days of Fast
Everyone aged 18-59.
1 full meal permitted, two
other meals may be taken
which, when combined,
are less than a full meal.
Ash Wednesday and Good
Friday.

(The obligation to do penance is lifted on Fridays which are also celebrated as a solemnity: e.g., Christmas Day).

OLDER DISCIPLINE Days of Abstinence Applies on one's 7th birthday. **Complete Abstinence on** all Fridays of the year, Ash Wednesday, and the Vigil of Christmas. **Partial Abstinence (meat** and soup, or gravy made from meat permitted once a day at principal meal.) Lent, Ember Days of Wednesday & Saturday, Vigils of Pentecost & Assumption. Abstinence dispensed on Holy Days of Obligation.

Days of Fast
Everyone aged 21-59.
Days of Lent from Ash
Wednesday on, Ember
Days, Vigils of Christmas,
Pentecost and the
Assumption.
One full meal permitted,
with 2 smaller meals.

Fourth, we ought to make extra efforts in the area of almsgiving and almsdeeds. At all of the Masses on Ash Wednesday, the Offertory Collection will be for Catholic Charities.

And, finally, fifth, there is the project of our own efforts to grow in our Christian life—"to turn away from sin and receive the Gospel." Each of us should plan for our own personal sacrifice together with our own personal project during these coming days of Lent. This ought to include sacramental confession, extra time for private prayer and spiritual reading.

Thus a "good Lent" includes both participation in communal Christian observances as members of the Body of Christ and discreet personal efforts to cleanse our souls for the celebration of the Easter feast.



- 23. WE BELIEVE THAT THE CHURCH IS NECESSARY FOR SALVATION, because Christ who is the sole Mediator and Way of salvation, renders Himself present for us in His Body which is the Church. But the divine design of salvation embraces all men; and those who without fault on their part do not know the Gospel of Christ and His Church, but seek God sincerely, and under the influence of grace endeavor to do His will as recognized through the promptings of their conscience, they, in a number known only to God, can obtain salvation.
- 24. WE BELIEVE THAT THE MASS,



CELEBRATED BY THE PRIEST REPRESENTING THE PERSON OF CHRIST BY VIRTUE OF THE POWER RECEIVED THROUGH THE SACRAMENT OF ORDERS, AND OFFERED BY HIM IN THE

NAME OF CHRIST AND THE MEMBERS OF HIS MYSTICAL BODY, IS IN TRUE REALITY THE SACRIFICE OF CALVARY, rendered sacramentally present on our altars. We believe that as the bread and wine consecrated by the Lord at the Last Supper were changed into His Body and His Blood which were offered for us on the Cross, likewise the bread and wine consecrated by the priest are changed into the Body and Blood of Christ enthroned gloriously in heaven, and we believe that the mysterious presence of the Lord, under what continues to appear to our senses as before, is a true, real and substantial presence.

25. CHRIST CANNOT BE THUS PRESENT IN THIS SACRAMENT EXCEPT BY THE CHANGE INTO HIS BODY OF THE REALITY ITSELF OF THE BREAD AND THE CHANGE INTO HIS BLOOD OF THE REALITY ITSELF OF THE WINE WHICH OUR SENSES PERCEIVE. THIS MYSTERIOUS CHANGE IS VERY APPROPRIATELY CALLED BY THE CHURCH **TRANSUBSTANTIATION**.

Every theological explanation which seeks some understanding of this mystery must, in order to be in accord with Catholic faith, maintain that in the reality itself, independently of our mind, the bread and wine have ceased to exist after the Consecration, so that it is the adorable Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus that from then on are really before us under the sacramental species of bread and wine, as the Lord willed it, in order to give Himself to us as food and to associate us with the unity of His Mystical Body.

26. THE UNIQUE AND INDIVISIBLE EXISTENCE OF THE LORD GLORIOUS IN HEAVEN IS NOT MULTIPLIED, BUT IS RENDERED PRESENT BY THE SACRAMENT IN THE MANY PLACES ON EARTH WHERE MASS IS CELEBRATED. And this existence remains present, after the sacrifice, in the Blessed Sacrament which is, in the tabernacle, the living Heart of each of our churches. And it is our very sweet duty to honor and adore in the Blessed Host which our eyes see, the Incarnate Word Whom they cannot see, and Who, without leaving Heaven, is made present before us.

GOSPEL OF SAINT JOHN



COLLECTS OF THE ROMAN MISSAL David Allen

FEBRUARY 17th, 2019: St. Bernadette
Missale Romanum 1962 (MR '62)

for this week's meditation on the
Collects of the Roman Missal, , we consider
the Collect in the MR '62 for our parish's

secondary patroness, St. Bernadette Soubirous, who was known in the convent as Sister Mary Bernard. The following translation of this Collect is taken from the Angelus Press edition of the Roman Catholic Daily Missal:

"O God, protector and friend of the humble, Who filled Thy servant, Mary Bernard, with joy by the apparition and the conversation of the Immaculate Virgin Mary: grant, we pray, that by the simple way of faith we may be counted worthy to see Thee face to face in heaven. Through our Lord, etc. Amen."

Our Collect recalls the joy of the apparitions at Lourdes, especially the joy of Mary's self-disclosure as "the Immaculate Conception," but also of Mary's words to Bernadette of the happiness of heaven. The Collect's petition recalls this latter item, for we ask God that we might see Him "face to face in heaven."

Entering into the happiness of heaven depends ultimately upon God's grace, but it also involves our free cooperation. Church teaching on justification and final perseverance is clear on these points (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* nos. 1987-2029). This section of the *Catechism* is particularly rich and well worth reading, if we want to understand the "nuts and bolts" of how it is that God saves us. At the same time, salvation always remains a mystery of faith and grace that ultimately transcends human understanding, which is why it demands, on our part, the continual exercise of faith, hope, and charity.

These three theological virtues which we receive from God in Baptism constitute the substance of the Christian life. The exercise of these virtues in daily life, which we may term the "simple way of faith," in the words of the Collect, unfolds in this manner: (1) assenting to and receiving the truth and content of divine revelation [faith], (2) on the basis of this divine revelation, entrusting ourselves to Christ and His grace for daily life and for eternal life [hope], and most importantly, (3) carrying out the commands of love for God and neighbor [charity].

The Catechism beautifully describes the dynamic work of these theological (i.e., supernatural) virtues in our daily life. In particular, we do well to understand how indispensable they are to the observance of the first three Commandments, which are the most important of the ten, since they relate directly to our relationship with God (cf. Catechism nos. 1810-1829, 2087-2095). These two sections of the Catechism, like the one referenced above, are also worth reading and re-reading (perhaps a good Lenten exercise!), since the fruitful exercising of these virtues constitutes the essence of daily life in Christ, as was mentioned above. There is no relationship with Christ or growth in holiness apart from these three virtues. This is also why saying the three classic prayers entitled the "Acts" of Faith, Hope, and Charity, is such a good exercise in our daily prayer (almost every prayer book or hand-Missal has them).

Living the "simple way of faith," then, is nothing less than our ongoing cooperation with these graces of Baptism. It truly is that simple, in that respect. This is what will lead us to see Christ face to face in heaven. St. Bernadette was given a foretaste of this when she beheld Our Lady, for Mary indeed reflects the glory of God's face in heaven in the way that the moon reflects the light of the sun. The rest of her life, however, was filled with challenges and weighty sufferings, for which reason she bravely increased in faith, hope, and charity, particularly on her sick bed. Thus, she is an example to us of how to live in God's grace in the midst of the hardships of this world. May St. Bernadette help us by her prayers to grow in the graces of our Baptism, and so reflect God's glory like she and Our Lady do.

And every one that striveth for the mastery refraineth himself from all things: and they indeed that they may receive a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible one. I therefore so run, not as at an uncertainty; I so fight, not as one beating the air: but I chastise my body, and bring it into subjection, lest perhaps when I have preached to others, I myself should become a castaway. For I would not have you ignorant, brethren, that our fathers were all under the cloud, and all in Moses were baptized, in the cloud and in the sea: and all did eat the same spiritual food, and all drank the same spiritual drink: (and they drank of the spiritual rock that followed them: and the rock was Christ). But with most of them God was not well pleased.

GRADUAL: Psalm 9. 10-11, 19-20 A helper in due time in tribulation: let them trust in Thee who know Thee: for Thou hast not forsaken them that seek Thee, O Lord. *V*. For the poor man shall not be forgotten to the end: the patience of the poor shall not perish forever: arise, O Lord, let no man prevail. TRACT: Psalm 129. 1-4 Out of the depths I have cried to Thee, O Lord: Lord, hear my voice *V*. Let Thine ears be attentive to the prayer of Thy servant. *V*. If Thou, O Lord, wilt mark iniquities: O Lord: O Lord, who shall abide it? *V*. For with Thee there is merciful forgiveness, and by reason of Thy law I have waited for Thee, O Lord.

GOSPEL: Matthew 20. 1-16 at that time Jesus spoke to His disciples this parable: The kingdom of heaven is like to a householder who went out early in the morning to hire labourers into His vineyard. And having agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And going out about the third hour, he saw others standing in the market place idle, and he said to them: Go you also into my vineyard, and I will give you what shall be just. And they went their way. And again he went out about the sixth and the ninth hour; and did in like manner. But about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing, and he saith to them: Why stand you here all the day idle? They say to him: Because no man hath hired us. He saith to them: Go you also into my vineyard. And when evening was come, the lord of the vineyard saith to his steward: Call the labourers and pay them their hire, beginning from the last even to the first. When therefore they were come that came about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first also came, they thought that they should receive more: and they also received every man a penny. And receiving it they murmured against the master of the house, saying: These last have worked but one hour, and thou hast made them equal to us that have borne the burden of the day and the heats. But he answering said to one of them: Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst thou not agree with me for a penny? Take what it is thine and go thy way: I will also give to this last even as to thee. Or is it not lawful for me to do what I will? Is thy eye evil, because I am good? So shall the last be first, and the first last. For many are called, but few chosen.



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


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
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
