## JANUARY IS THE MONTH OF THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

### Pastor's Note



*(Front Cover: The Nativity scene as it is set up in the sanctuary space of our lower church hall. ### CHRISTIAN UNITY

Each year, between January 18th and 25th, we mark the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. This an ecumenical gesture of good-will towards all other Christian denominations and separated churches who are not in communion with us but whose corporate reunion is a desirable goal.

The Octave is buttressed by two historical Catholic liturgical feasts. The 18th of January is, historically, the Feast of the Chair of St. Peter at Rome (now celebrated on February 22nd in both the Traditional Latin Mass and Novus Ordo) and the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul the Apostle. Peter and Paul are the Princes of the Apostles—together they represent the

fullness of the Apostolic authority and teaching. (According to tradition, the “Apostles’ Creed”, with its 12 Articles of Faith, is a summary of the teaching points of these two great Apostles.) To have their feasts at either end of the Octave for Christian Unity underscores the importance of a reunion based upon the original oneness of the Apostolic Catholic Church.

Christian Unity, therefore, is not something which can be achieved in the manner of a political coalition-building. It does not mean a kind of United Nations version of all of the different kinds of groups who call themselves Christian. Rather, it is an actual reconciliation of now-separated Christians to all of the central doctrines of Christianity in its pure Catholic form. This, obviously, is something which requires a tremendous miracle of grace.

Human effort, however, does have a secondary part to play. Some historians have made the case that the real driving force behind the event of the Second Vatican Council in the early 1960s was to find new ways to heal the Protestant/Catholic divide and break the theological impasse. On the positive side, much of this good will has been reciprocated by Protestant denominations. A lot of ancient prejudices have broken down. Religious bigotry and theological hatred, the *odium theologicum*, that is, the justification of human hatred based on theological beliefs, is as disrespectable as racial bigotry.

Nonetheless, it is a great mistake to think that **theological differences don't really matter** and that we should all just declare unity and be one. The doctrine-optional-church-community-of-free-association can appeal to many people as the solution to divisions among Christians. It is not a solution: it is a temptation. Christian Unity will not be achieved by Catholics diluting their own Catholicism.

And I say to you, that many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven: but the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into the exterior darkness: there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth. And Jesus said to the centurion: Go, and as thou hast believed, so be it done to thee. And the servant was healed at the same hour

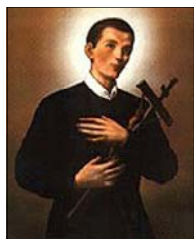
